### UNITED WAR FUND DRIVE GETS **UNDER WAY IN CASTRO COUNTY**

The United War Fund drive got under way in Castro County this week when quotas and chairmen for each community were announ ed by the County Chairman, Earl Harrison, and Secretary-Treasurer, J. W. Webb. Castro County has en asked to raise a minimum of \$2,500.00 in the 1944 War Fund campaign.

In urging community chairmen nd workers to meet or exceed their quotas, County Chairman Harrison declared that every person in the county should be contacted and given an opportunity to contribute to this war relief fund, whether quotas had been cribed or not. In calling for all out support of the drive, Mr. Harrison pointed out that aside from financing U. S. O. centers for the benefit of our boys in service, this fund was also relied upon for local war relief, and many other charitable causes including support of organizations caring for dependants of naval casualties, Allied war relief, war prisoner fund (American) and many other types of alleviating suffering among war stricken peoples in every theatre of action.

Although no report was available for publication it was stated that ready response is being met with by solicitors in every section of the county and that indications are that Castro County citizens will again meet the challenge in doing thir part in keeping the faith with our boys and girls in active service, and in extending a helping hand to suffering humanity wherever it can be reached.

Mrs. B. J. Brannan, County Chairman, announced a state-wide LAST RITES FOR program this week for honoring exans in our armed forces. She declared that all clubs and civic organizations in the county would be solicited to assist in this beautifying campaign in the planting of men serving in our armed forces. Following is a letter from state office explaining in detail the proposed Development program:
"The latest project of the Advisory Board for the Texas Roadside

Development Program was pre-sented to the State Highway Commission in Austin on March 29. The new plan is designed to hon

or the Texans in our armed forces by a planned planting program of hardy flowering shrubs and trees. In presenting this plan to the ighway Commission and D. Greer, State Highway Engineer, It was pointed out that the plan in volved two definite steps:

Step One calls for the citizens each county to select a tree or shrub to be used throughout the county. Any one of several methods might be used to arrive at a decision. It is posible that an open county wide election might be held in which each individual might cast cast his ballot for the plant of his choice. Another county might select its plant by having various organ-izations in the county turn "campaign managers" and sponsor different plants, then eliminate until one final, unanimous choice has been made. Public schools, parent teachers clubs and County Home Demonstration Clubs are expected to take leading parts in this process. The idea, Mrs. Sorrell stressed, is for every Texan to partici-

In heavy rainfall terfitories it is used as a winter cover crop and as a pasture. Land on which vegetaple crops have been grown needs winter cover to protect it from wind erosion. A legume cover crop has the advantage of building up more available nitrogen in the soil when turned under as green man-

There is a feeling among farsighted farmers that more attention should be paid to maintaining soil fertility on irrigation land. The use of commercial fertilizers has already shown their value in producing higher yields and quality of vegetables and in some cases phosphate fertilizers have been beneficial in alfalfa production.


