



Flow was through a 24-64-inch choke with 400 pounds casing and 650 pounds tubing pressure from 328 perforations at 6,104-6,226 feet. The casing is set at 6,235 feet, one foot off the bottom. Having a gas-oil ratio of 1,272-1, the well was treated with 8,400 gallons of acid.



WHITT GETS PRODUCER Ashland Oil & Refining Co., Midland No. 1 F. A. Whitt Alex Barnhill Survey, Jameson Strawn Field, 21/2 miles north west of Silver has been completed as a new producer.

It flowed 342.6 barrels of 45.6 gravity oil in 24 hours through 12-64 choke with 400 pounds on casing and 920 pounds on tubing from 96 perforations at 6,071-6.118 feet. Total depth was 6,183 feet, and casing was set on bottom. Gas-oil ratio was 1,500-1.

FINAL NO. 3 CHAPPELL

Jameson-Strawn Field in the northwestern part of the county gained a new oiler with the completion of Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. No. 3 Jessie E. Chappell, Section 1, Block 15, SP Survey.

No. 3 Chappell gauged 123.44 barrels of 47 gravity oil per day, flowing through a 16-64-inch choke with 300 pounds casing

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and 420 pounds tubing pressures. Production is from 120 perforations at 6,146-6,224 feet, treated with 1,500 gallons of acid. The casing is set at 6,297 feet. Total depth was 6,341 feet, plugged back to 6,250 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 1,362-1.
