The UCRA board discussed perma- OPENS FEB. 1 nent repairs for the Mountain Creek Reservoir spillway at Robert Lee and engineers will make further study of the project.

Mr. Allen reported a recent payment of \$64,844 to the Treasurer of the United States, the amount to be applied on cost of the recently completed North Concho Dam at San Angelo. In all the UCRA will contribute about \$900,000 to the project over a period of years, one-third of which has now been paid.

The UCRA advanced \$235,000 to finance the recently completed Bronte water supply, including a pipeline from Oak Creek Lake and a new filtering plant. Bronte is paying back the loan at the rate of \$700 per month and has already returned \$4,900. Robert Lee is repaying its loan from UCRA at the rate of \$350 per month, and its total payments to date amount to \$10,850. Neither Bronte nor Robert Lee are charged any interest on the UCRA loans.

Mr. Allen said the UCRA found it necessary to issue \$50,-000 in revenue bonds to finance the Bronte project. These bonds are now being retired by the monthly payments of the two
