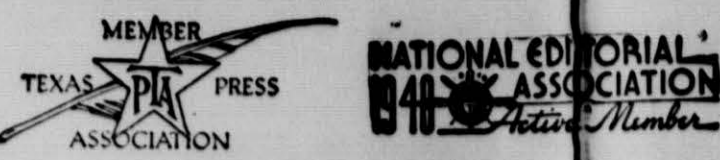

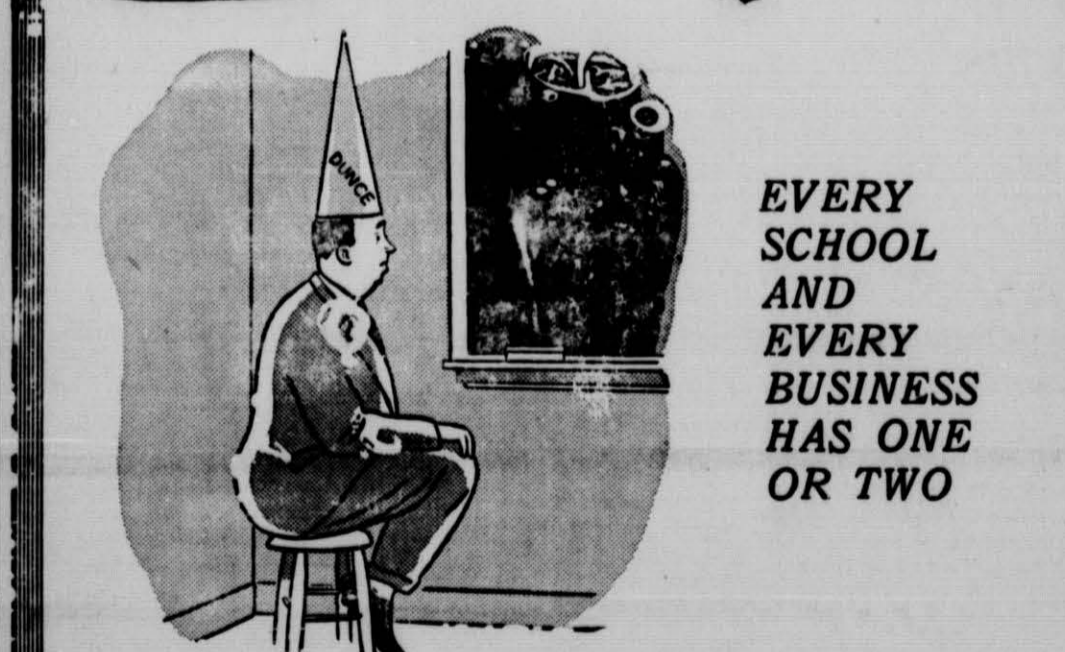

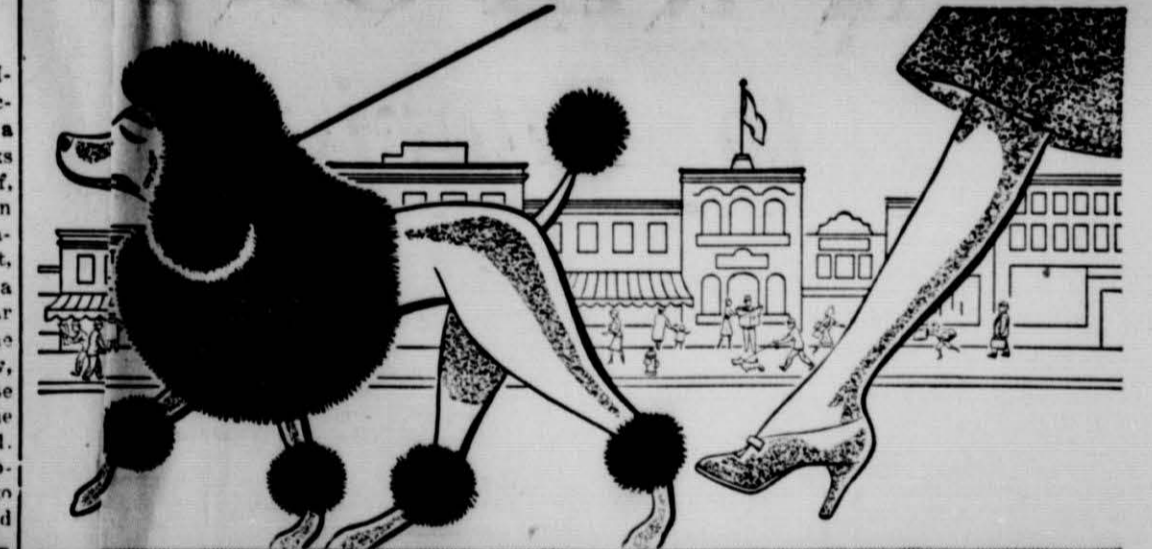

AAA Announces Killed Meats

While there are thousands of Texas farm and ranch families with access to cold storage and freezer lockers, there still remain thousands more who must wait until cold weather sets in before they have home-killed meat for the table. Dimmitt is among those communities, however, which has a storage and freezer locker—Wilson Grocery maintaining the local cold storage locker plant.

Variety in preparation, even of the same food, keeps appetites keen, so farm and ranch families should plan for all possible ways of preserving their meat, says Grace I. Neely, specialist in food preservation for A. & M. College Extension Service.

She suggests curing hams and bacon and storing them in cotton seed oil; making a generous supply of sausage—canning some, according to the family's preference; making pickled pigs feet and head cheese; and canning or freezing pork roasts.

The loin, sometimes called the choice cut of any animal, can be cured and made into Canadian bacon. Or it can be canned or rotets or frozen for pork chops, the specialist say.

Beef can be preserved in as many different and interesting ways as pork. Just now, chili seems to be one of the most popular canned beef products in Texas. Chili made from goat meat is also winning favor, as evidenced by orders for over 2,000 cans of chosen chili to be shipped to Eastern states this year by home demonstration club. Information on canning, curing or freezing of meat can be obtained from the A. & M. College Extension Service at College Station.

Expert Advice Given on Home Tree Payments

Take it from a landscape specialist—every farmer in Texas should be familiar with the Triple A's 1941 provisions for a payment of \$15 to each farm for the planting and maintaining of trees. This payment can be earned over and above the regular soil building allowance.

Sadie Hatfield, specialist in landscape gardening for the A. & M. College Extension Service, points out that in every section of Texas trees are needed for shade for the home, the livestock and poultry, and for windbreaks. In some of the wooded sections of Texas this natural protection is still strongly felt.

Along the coast and in warm sections of Texas it is easy to grow a windbreak or tamarix, which is commonly called athol, athel and ever-green salt cedar. Then, there are so many varieties of pine trees that there are some pines suited to all sections of Texas. The AAA will pay at the rate of \$4.50 per acre for the planting of pine trees.

On the Western Plains and in the Panhandle of Texas, hard-wood deciduous trees are used in combination with pines and other evergreen trees. AAA payments or hardwood tree are made at the rate of \$6 per acre. Among the trees well adapted to the semi-arid portions of the state are desert willow, salt cedar, elms, ash, honey locust, Russian olive, jujubes and red cedar, as well as western yellow pine and Austrian pine.

Thus, under the AAA provisions, planting of two and one-half acres of hardwood tree or tree and one-third acre of pine trees would earn the maximum of \$15, which is available in addition to the soil-building allowance for the arm. Additional tree planting could earn additional payment under the soil-building allowance. For the cultivation of forest tree planted between July 1, 1937 and January 1, 1941, the AAA will pay \$1.50 per acre a part of the soil-building allowance or the arm.

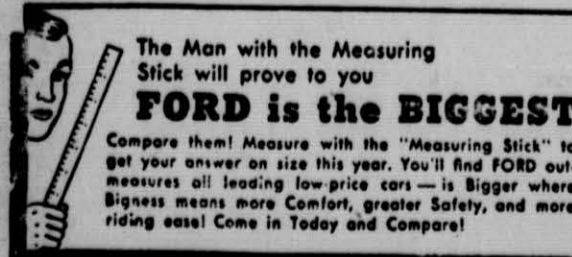
