## History of Coke County

THIRD INSTALLMENT Drouths (Continued) Many old-timers discuss th drouth of 1885-86-87, and several of the older citizens interviewed have recalled that drouth as the worst they remember. Holden described that drouth, which 1887 dates "as June, 1 in the history West Texas." He refers s the fact West many old settlers dated vents as transpiring "before the vents as transpiring before", It was a colossal calamity, disastrous for West Texas as was the Civil War with all its privations.
Many people left the country as a result of the drouth, and the frontier receded.
Quite a number of people had come to the area that is Cok County (then a part of Tom Green County) by the early 1880's, and many more had come by the middle and late Eighties A considerable number of thos early settlers upon whose mem ories the drouth or 80 was in delibly stamped are still living. Amelia Caraway, who came here in 1883 with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Caraway, vividly
calls the drouth. She said, Me had a waterspout ving in the early part of June, and overflowed the land adjac ent to it. Some young men who helped to get us out of our home which was surrounded by the flood waters, and to get us to higher ground. That was the last the summer of 1887 . By late
the summer of 1885, it was awfully dry; during 1886 conditions were terrible, and by the spring of
1887 they were just about 1887 they were just about un we didn't. Many cattle starved ed to death. It was not uncom mon to see the bones of many around what had been a wat ering place. Mrs. J. I. Eva Vestal, daughter of Vestal and formerly wife of the ate Coke County Treasurer C L. Hughes, also remembers the drouth. She said,
The country was not eroded as now. The creeks were shallow and had few deep holes at any time. By late summer, 1886, they were all dry. There were no wells, no windmills, no surface tanks. Loose cattle were everywhere. There was nothing much to eat and nothing to drink. Many cattle starved. Everywhere you looked you could see dead leaving. There were nearly leaving. There was nothing father said we would have My leave, so we headed for Missouri in a covered wagon pulled by our en. It took us six weeks to make the trip. The heat was terrible. Once we drove all day with no water for the oxen. We had some water in a jug for us to drink Very late in the day my father sighted a pool of water in a draw about the size of a bed. About the time he saw the water, he oxen smelled it and were crazy for it. They wheeled and rused toward the water. The bank of the draw was about this high (measuring three or four feet) and straight off
Frother jumped out, ran in
them, hitting them over the head until he got them stopped long enough to get them loose from
the wagon, which by then, was the wagon, which by then, was

About a month later, an edi torial in the Standard lamented And still it raineth not Oh that we might grasp within ou tapering fingers the cord that by pulling would open the flood so quick it 'ud make the weather
lerk's head swim. The drouth, which lased twen $y$-three months, was finally bro ken in the spring of 1887, whe a few April showers were fol May.
At that time The Standard reorted:
We have had copious rains, which, coming just at the righ time,
But the drouth of $1885-86-87$ was not the last by any means, In fact, four years later, in 189
drouthy conditions returned plague the residents. The rain fall for that year was even less than it was in 1886, but since most of the rain that did fall came in the spring and early summer, grass grew and some crops were made.
