Because of the proximity of this site to the Coke County area, it would seem highly probable that remnants of this expedition explored the Coke area during the six weeks that the Mendoza-Lopes party remained at the site on the Col "met representatives of many tribes" and "baptized many In dians" during that time. The Mendoza-Lopes expedition with its memorials became the basis of extensive plans to occupy the areas explored by it-plans which were nullified by the appearance of the French on the east coast, which claimed the attention of the viceroy and his co horts.
La Salle landed on the Texas coast in December, 1684. This "French menace" aroused interest in Texas for a time; however, it was not until after a French post had been established at Natchitochas on Red River, that the Spaniards built a number of missions in Texas, including one in East Texas in 1716, and a "presidio and a mission at th
site of San Antonio" in 1718 . site of San Antonio" in 1718.
"The Seven Years' War re moved France from the American continent," thus removing her from the Texas picture; however, Texas was a wilderness when the Spaniards first heard of it, and three hundred years after the first Spaniards set foot on its soil, it was still a wilderness.
