TOR SUN PIPE LINE **EXPANDING ITS** SILVER PLANT

An expansion program to cost Colorado City \$175,000 has been started by Sun Goodfellow Pipe Line Company's crude oil pumping facilities at Silver.

West Texas Utilities is constructing 12 miles of electric power line to deliver 33,000 volts which will be required to operate Sun Pipe Line's new electric pump station.

In addition to electrifying its crude oil pump station, Sun Pipe Line will erect an additional 81,-000 barrels of storage, along with ipelines and other tangible fa-

Mr. Carwile died on Saturday at 4:45 p. m. He was born in Vaiden, Mississippi, October 9, 1881. On July 4, 1904, he married Miss Fannie Lee Varner, also of Vaiden and in 1906 they came to Coke County, Texas.

Survivors include his wife; six sons, Herman of Carlsbad, New Mex., Homer of Robert Lee, Henry and J. L., Jr., both of Sanco, Wilson of Athens, Texas and Bill of Ft. Worth; one daughter, Effie of Sanco; one brother, George Carwile of Winona, Mississippi; and 11 grandchildren. (The family has received word that the brother, George, passed away on Sunday, April 18th, at 3:20 p. m. and was buried in Winona, Miss. on Monday.)

Pallbearers were Bryan Gartman, Harvey Reid, Melvin Childress, Teddy Pitcock, Ira M. Bird and Nolan Pentecost.

Mr. Carwile came to West Texas on the advice of his doctor. He, his wife and infant son, Herman, came by train to San Angelo in August, 1906. At that time that was the "end of the railroad." They came to Robert Lee in a covered wagon with a Mr. Thompson.

Mrs. Carwile recalls many things about their first days spent in West Texas. The large jack rabbits were thought to be young deer, mesquite trees looked like peach trees, prairie dogs were numerous and sleep was interrupted by howling wolves.

The Carwiles spent the first night in the Valley View community in the Jim Walton home. They lived near Robert Lee for 3 or 4 months and the remainder of the approximately 48 years in Texas have been spent in the Sanco community. Mr. Carwile farmed most of his life.

At this time, the family lives on the old Gladney place where his son, Henry, has, for several years, taken charge of the farming and cattle and sheep raising.

Mr. Carwile became a member of the Baptist Church in about 1916. He has always been faithful in attendance and has served in various capacities in the church. In 1947 he was ordained deacon and served to the best of his ability in spite of failing health.

Mr. Carwile's quiet but constant faithfulness, understanding, and honesty has been a continuous source of encouragement and inspiration to his neighbors and friends, pastors and family. Rev. Bloodworth's words, "a great man has fallen, a good man is gone" is a fitting tribute to the life of Mr. Carwile.

Mrs. Bob Fields (Dale Cowley) was released from Coke County Memorial Hospital where she had been a patient the past month. Her many friends will be happy to learn that she is well on the road to recovery.

History of Coke County

INSTALLMENT NINE

OLD FORT CHADBOURNE

The United States Government built the fort, federal and state troops inhabited it, Indians roamed about it, the railroad and first highway missed it, now oil fields are all about it, and "Old Fort Chadbourne"-though in ruins - still holds its place on the map and in the hearts of many old and new West Texans.

Coke Countians treasure old Fort Chadbourne, even in its ruined state - its traditions, its many-times-retold stories of heroism, of joyous occasions when the strains of martial music rang through the oaken rafters and awoke the echoes in the old hills, of stark tragedies enacted along the old trails and in the wooded areas of its environs and almost in the very shadow of its thick stone walls.

According to information in a letter from the office of the Adjutant General in Washington, Army records show that:

Fort Chadbourne, Texas, was established October 28, 1852, for the protection of settlers against hostile Indians... It was abandoned by United States troops March 23, 1861, upon the approach of the Civil War, and was again occupied May 25, 1867. It was finally abandoned by U. S. troops between December 1 and 18, 1867.

The ruins of old Fort Chadbourne occupy a beautifully situated spot in the northeast corner of Coke County, on a flat, wooded promontory on the east bank of Oak Creek, thirty miles above its juncture with the Colorado River.

The route to the site of the old fort may be reached by traveling along Highway Seventy, north from San Angelo or south from Sweetwater to a point nine miles north of Bronte and six miles south of Blackwell where Highway 158, "The Butterfield Trail" intersects Highway 70. Turning eastward at that point, one travels approximately three miles to a bridge across Oak Creek. As he approaches the bridge, he notes a large marker in a shady spot beneath the oaks near the roadside. A plaque on the granite stone reads:

Route of the Southern Overland Mail Line. One mile southeast to Fort Chadbourne, a station on the Butterfield Mail and Stage Line, which linked St. Louis and San Francisco, 1858-61. The fort was established in 1852, occupied until its surrender to State forces in 1861, and garrisoned at times after the Civil War.

Very soon after crossing the bridge, the traveler sees a road leading off the highway to the right, to a gate and a cattle guard and thence southeastward into the Wylie ranch.

On a bronze plaque on a monument near this entrance into the Conda Wylie ranch and the site of old Fort Chadbourne, one reads the intriguing inscription and concise history of the pio-

Fort Chadbourne, established by the United States Army Oct. 28. 1852, as a protection to frontier settlers against Indians, named in honor of Lt. T. L. Chadbourne, killed at Resaca de la Palma, May 9, 1846, occupied by federal troops 1852-1861; 1865-67

Butterfield Overland Stag route, 1858-61.

Fort Chadbourne was one of ten forts constructed to protect settlers from the Indians.

Just when the sweeping Comanche forays actually started is not known, but they seem to have been at their worst in the late 1840's and early 1850's. A favorite time for the raids seemed to be during September's growing moon, reaching the climax during the moonlight nights, and returning "in the waning light of the bloody Comanche moon."

After 1848 and the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo, conditions in the Southwest changed rapidly. By that treaty the United States agreed to restrain the Indian raids, and 'the Comanche Moon was regularly dimmed with a ring of blood."

Captain Whiting, reporting his inspection of the frontier in January, 1850, recommended heavier garrisons and the location of additional forts. In March he made a supplemental report, urging outposts "where the In dians live, instead of where the eitizens live." His suggestions met with reasonably quick response and the ten forts, including Chadbourne, were construct-

The site of Fort Chadbourne was never owned by the United States Government, but was held under a ninety-nine year lease on the site, which is located on the Felix Sosa Survey, No. 302, in Coke County. In addition to the lease, the Government paid for surface damages: "Agreement: J. M. Harves to Richard A. Howard and John Twohig," dated March 29, 1850, and recorded April 15, 1854, Bexar transcript of Runnels County, p. 230. Lt. Harves agreed to pay \$4,000 for wood, timber, posts, and hay taken or used from the Felix Sosa Survey, No. 302.

The stone buildings at Fort Chadbourne, when the fort was completed, included officers quarters, a hospital, barracks for enlisted men, and mail station.

The mail station was built of rough undressed slabs of limestone, while the fort buildings, in greater part, were finished with cut or dressed limestone blocks, all skillfully joined.

These buildings had shingle roofs, the shingles being cut by the troops on the San Saba river more than one hundred miles away. The rafters were of hewn oak, while the floors rested on heavy, hewn cedar sills.

The quartermaster's building was of hewn logs with a canvass roof, as were the messhalls and kitchens, the bakery, the guardhouse, and the laundry quarters.

Windows also were of canvass. The mail station, which occupied a large stone building behind a row of fort buildings on the north side of the parade ground, has been described in some detail. It was, evidently, once "a comfortable and commodious house," the walls were "twenty inches in thickness." while one of the rooms was "twenty-eight feet long by eigheen feet wide and had a large fireplace in one end."

The base of supplies for Fort Chadbourne was San Antonio, two hundred fifteen miles away. Before the Butterfield Overland and important station on the Mail was put into operation, a

supply train left Fort Chadbourne once a week for Fort Mason, one hundred twenty miles southeast, to receive the mail.

Colonel J. K. F. Mansfield reported in 1856 that the fort had had eighteen commanders in less than four years.

Among the officers stationed at Fort Chadbourne prior to the Civil War (1852-1861) were the following: Captains John Beardsley, Arthur T. Lee, William R. Montgomery; First Lieutenants James C. Snelling, Thomas G. Pitcher; Second Lieutenants R I. Dodge, R. G. Coles; Colonel John Garland; Major Pitcairn Morrison; Lieutenant Colonel W. Seawell. All of these served in the Eighth United States Infantry. Also First Lieutenants James Longstreet and George E. Pickett, who became famous as Confederate leaders in the rebellion. Miles W. Koogh (later killed while serving as Captain of Seventh United States Cavalry at the Battle of Little Big Horn, Montana territory on June 25, 1876) was at Fort Chadbourne in 1867. Captain Henry E. McCullogh and his First Texas Cavalry were there for a time at the outbreak of the Civil War.

Many famous "historic characters," including "Robert E. Lee, Earl Van Dorn, Colonel Johnston," and others, "sojournfor a time" at Fort Chadbourne.
