History of Coke County

INSTALLMENT SEVENTEEN THE FENCING WAR

"Oh, it's squeak! squeak! squeak!"

And they pen the land with wire.

They figure fence and copper cents

Where we laughed around the fire.

Job cussed his birthday, night and morn

In his old land of Uz,

But I'm glad I wasn't born No later than I wuz."

—Charles Badger Clark, Jr.

Pandemonium, in the literal sense of the word, broke loose in the Coke area with the advent of fencing activities. There was strong talk and stronger action. It would seem that nobody was pleased. In an interview with the Observer in April, 1938, J. H. Smith, now deceased, who first came into the Coke area in the middle "Seventies, described the tenor of the times thus:

"Those were the days when one man fenced thousands of acres of pasture land, and others cut the wire—when every man 'toted' a gun, and no man's life was safe.

The cowboy was disgusted with fencing. He liked the old

free life on the open range. He was accustomed to taking the shortest route when he went any where. Now he found fences in his way, but he had a plan. He began carrying wire cutters along, and when a fence got in his way, he just cut it and went on his way.

Ran Stewart fenced a water hole on free land, so his family would have water fit to use. Someone pulled up the posts. He rebuilt the fence, and the procedure was repeated. Finally, Mr. Stewart lay for the culprit, thinking he would catch a cowboy, and he did, but the guilty man was not "just a cowboy," he was the foreman of a nearby ranch.

According to Monroe McCutchen, it was a common occurrence for a man to build fence all day, and return to his job the next day only to find that someone had cut the wire and pulled up the posts during the night.

The men who were opposed to barbed wire "organized fence-cutting mobs." L. B. Harris had fenced twelve sections of land on the Colorado River.

"One night in the fall of 1883, the fence cutters cut some forty miles of this fence between every

post. The Harrises were getting ready to fence some land about four miles west of Robert Lee. They had a huge pile of cedar posts—"a pile as large as a two-story house," and "a lot of barbed wire." It was south of the Russell Crossing in a bend of the river on what is now the Russell farm, when the free range advocates burned it.

"They burned ten thousand cedar posts. They piled two car loads of barbed wire on top of the posts, and it was melted and ruined. The total loss was six thousand dollars.

The last time fence cutters attempted to destroy L. B. Harris's fence, they were caught in the act by Ralph and Wayne Harris, who were driving up some horses and came along as the wire cutters cut the wires between two posts. Someone whistled, and Wayne Harris answered the whistle, at the same time "pulling out his six-shooter and cocking it.

"The horse he was riding was gun shy, so he began to dance. Being angered at the horse, he hit him over the head with the pistol which went off. The wire cutter began to run, and the horses started after him."

The Harrises followed the horses. After a while the wire cutter turned, and the horses, followed by Ralph and Wayne, went on down the fence. The next day one of the wire cutters went to the Harris ranch and said to Wayne Harris,

"I hear you have forty men armed with shot guns riding the fence at night." Wayne replied, "Yes, how did you know?"

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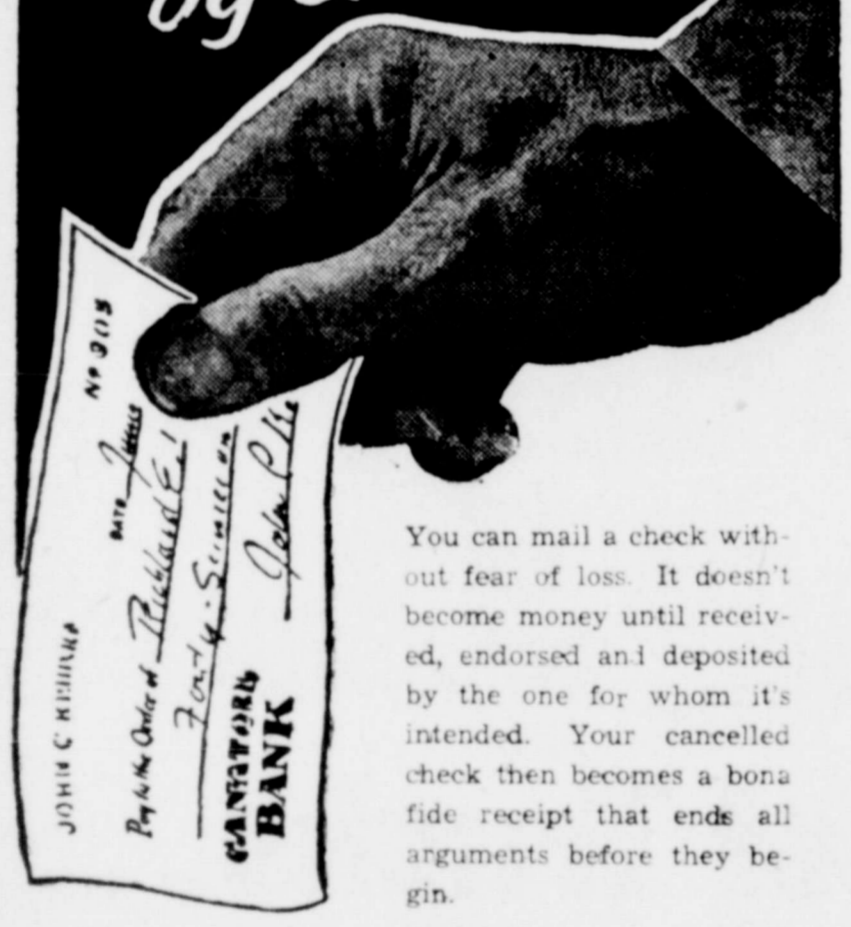
