FARMING "ON THE LEVEL"



"Farming on the level" belps to maintain or to increase production of the Food for Victory crops, and at the same time often conserves time and tractor fuel, according to Paul H. Walser, state coordinator for the Soil Conserv tion Service, and a member of the Texas USDA War Board.

This photograph shows a farm being operated on the level, o on the contour, in order to conserve goth soil and moisture. The additional moisture held in the field may mean the margin between crop failure and a fair harvest. In addition to increasing production, contour cultivation in some areas has required ten per cent less time and 17 per cent less tractor fuel to produce an acre of corn when compared to non-contoured fields. This means a saving of seven hours of time and 15 gallons of fuel for a field of 30 acres. Contour cultivation, Walser pointed out, should be used in combination with other conserva on practices, including a good crop rotation. Guide lines for contour cultivation should be run by someone experienced in the use of a level.

It's a mighty fine thing when a great industry has the gumption to do a job like that on its own initiative. And if Sam Abernethy was right, the brewers should be mighty successful . . . because they're running their business the way the public wants to see it run.
