#### **COW'S DEATH DUE TO RABIES**

O. B. Jacobs recently lost a cow from rabies, according to the diagnosis of a San Angelo veterinarian. The three-year-old Jersey had been owned in the Waxahachie locality before being brought to West Texas and sold to Mr. Jacobs.

It is thought the animal had become infected there. Rabies germs may be carried as long as three months before they become active, according to persons who have made a study of the disease. The cow had a 10-weeks old calf which has not been affected.

County Agent Jack Waide announces that bulletins concerning rabies may be obtained at his office or at Key Feed Store or Farris Drug.

Some persons have suggested that a mass vacination of Coke County dogs be undertaken at this time. Your opinion in this matter should be expressed to Ballots Ready the county agent.

Rabies is uncurable. Utmost danger of dogs becoming infected is that they are liable to bite human beings.

Definite action in the matter of building a new court house in Coke County took place last Friday when representatives of the Bronte Lions Club and the Robert Lee Board of Community Development met with the Commissioners Court.

Talk has been general the past few months that now is the time to build a new court house, since increasing oil valuations will make the project possible without an increase of taxes. Some enthusiastic persons had stated they meant to circulate petitions whose ship was also docked at in the near future to bring the

Believing that the matter should have some preliminary study, the group last Friday passed a motion requesting the Commissioners Court to determine the size of building that would be suitable and cost of same. Included in the project will also be modern swimming pools to be constructed in both Bronte and Robert Lee.

Judge Jeff Dean announced that the present 25 cent levy in the Permanent Improvement Fund (Court House & Jail) is bringing in sufficient revenue to retire the bonds. He said there is a present annual surplus of about \$23,000 in the fund and taxing valuations will go higher next year because of continued oil development.

The Commissioners Court will proceed as rapidly as possible in getting necessary information, and plan to inspect new court houses over the state. Coke County's court house was built in 1881.

WHEREAS, there has been presented to this Court the petition of Bryan Yarbrough and 104 other persons, representing themselves to be resident, qualified electors of Commissioners' Precinct No. 1 of Coke County, Texas, who own taxable property in said Precinct and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, praying that this Court order an election in Commissioners' Precinct No 1 of Coke County, on the question of the issujance of \$245,500.00 of Road Bonds, which said petition was heretofore filed in this Court; and

WHEREAS, heretofore on the 3rd day of July, 1954, the Commissioners' Court passed an order fixing a time and place for a hearing on said petition, to-wit: July 19, 1954, and directed the County Clerk to issue a notice of such time and place of hearing to inform all persons concerned of their rights to appear at such hearing and to contend for or protest against the order of such election; and

WHEREAS, the County Clerk has heretofore duly executed said notice by posting true copies of said order of hearing in three public places within said Commissioners' Precinct No. 1 of Coke County, Texas, and another copy thereof at the Courthouse door of said County for ten days prior to the date fixed for the hearing, and said notice has also been published in a newspaper of general circulation in said Commissioners' Precinct No. 1 of Coke County, Texas, namely the Robert Lee Observer, one time on the 9th day of July, 1954, which was at least five days prior to the date fixed for said hearing; and

WHEREAS, this Court, having met at the time and place set for the hearing of said petition, proceeded to hear such petition and all matters in respect to the proposed bond election, to hear the contentions for and protest against the calling of such election, and it is found by the Court that the said petition is signed by at least 50 of the qualified electors who own taxable property in Commissioners' Precinct No. 1 of Coke County, Texas, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, and that the notice required by law to be given of said hearing has been given; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the hearing held on said date and from the evidence submitted at said hearing, the Court has determined that the proposed improvements would be for the benefit of all taxable property situated in such Commissioners' Precinct No. 1 of Coke County, Texas, and that it is desirable and necessary to issue bonds of said Commissioners' Precinct No.

1 of Coke County in the amount of \$245,500.00, to construct said improvements and that said election should be ordered; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners' Court further finds that the amount of said proposed bond issue, together with all outstanding bonds heretofore issued on the faith and credit of Commissioners' Precinct No. 1 of Coke County will not exceed onefourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of said Pre-



The first farming in Coke County was in the Wildcat, Edith, Hayrick and Sanco sectors. Gold may once have been A Mr. Cotton farmed the first ed in Coke County, but all land to "fall to the plow" in the western half of Coke County. His farm was small, perhaps 30 acres, and was in the Wild Cat cotton records for the past eight sector.

> Ran and Jim Stewart had the first cultivated "patches" in the Edith sector. They were very small, perhaps fifteen or twenty acres.

A number of patches in the Hayrick community were planted to cane about the time of the organization of the county.

A few farmers planted a little wheat and corn in the early days,

plows. Fields were from five to thirty acres. A thirty-acre field was considered a big field.

The number of farms and the number of acres in cultivation increased steadily until about 1920. The high prices of 1919 and following World War I, led to an over-production of cotton. Following the embargo on cotton, in 1920, and the rapid fall in price which followed the embargo, cotton began declining and declined steadily until the higher prices during the last World War. There was a slight increase in cotton acreage during the war, but the increase was only temporary and was decreased again as soon as the price decline began. Following are



WHEREAS, this Court, having met at the time and place set for the hearing of said petition, proceeded to hear such petition and all matters in respect to the proposed bond election, to hear the contentions for and protest lots the words: against the calling of such election, and it is found by the Court that the said petition is signed by at least 50 of the qualified electors who own taxable property in Road District No. 3 of Coke County, Texas, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, and that the notice required by law to be given of said hearing has been given; and

Notice of said election shall be given by publication of a copy of this order in a newspaper of general circulation in Road District No. 3 of Coke County, Texas, for three successive weeks before the date of said election, and in addition thereto, there shall be posted copies of this order at three public places in said District, and one at the Counthouse door of the County for three consecutive weeks prior to said election.

8. The County Clerk is hereby ordered and directed to post said notices and to cause same to be published as hereinabove directed. Further orders by this Court are reserved until the returns of said election executed by the duly authorized election officers, are received by this
