Editorial

THE GOVERNOR'S RACE

Voters are becoming fed up with the campaign for governor between the two runoff candidates, Gov. Allen Shivers and Judge Ralph Yarborough. The people are also confused as to the issues. Charges and counter charges, accusations and denials have been hurled back and forth in reckless abandon. You listen to one of them and he sells you, but good. Next thing you catch the other candidate on radio or TV and by heck you decide this is the guy that must be elected if we are to save our great and glorious State of Texas and its millions of wonderful people.

The Observer don't mind these kind of rough and tumble campaigns, but you just can't believe all you read and hear. Figure out some conclusions for yourself.

We feel that Allan Shivers has made a good governor, but its time for him to step down. At the end of this year he will have served 51/2 years and if reelected he will be in there 71/2 years. He is getting too big a hold on the state. He is getting the power that he craves and it's not going to be good for ALL the people.

And another thing, many of us have not got over the 1952 campaign when Shivers turned traitor to his party. If he wants to vote with the Republicans he should get over there with them, and not run as a Democrat.

REPAIRS MADE ON SPILLWAY

Spillway repairs on Mountain Creek Dam here were completed last week. The job was given a final inspection by Engineer S. C. Cooper, who wil recommend final approval by Directors of the Upper Colorado River Authority.

The contract was handled by Fern Havins of Robert Lee and his associate, Cecil Gilbert, San Angelo. Their bid of \$16,490 was about \$2,000 under the next bidder. Home labor was used and material purchased locally. The job was completed without delay, indicating that the contractors knew their business.

The project involved construction of a concrete apron 500 feet in length at the lower end of the spillway, designed to prevent further washing. The apron included a 4-foot head wall, and the toe wall extended down to rock. Concrete was re-inforced with 18,000 pounds of steel set in one-foot squares.

Eighteen inch rocks were used in rip-rapping the ends of the spillway outside the concrete

ROAD BONDS IN PRECINCT NO. 1 **CARRY 196 TO 65**

Voters of Precinct 1 of Coke County favored a \$245,000 road bond issue in Saturday's special election. At the same time a \$49,500 issue in Precinct 3 failed to carry by the necessary twothirds majority.

Commissioners Court met Monday to canvass the returns, and voted to sell the Precinct 1 bonds to Columbian Securities Corp. of Texas. The issue is to draw 2.35% interest. They have a 15-year maturity date, with an option to be paid off after 10

Gordon Charlton, representing the bond company, advised county officials to levy only 12 cents this year, and the amount may be smaller in years to come.

Failure of Precinct 3 to vote the bonds means that a 3-mile stretch of proposed paving leading north of Highway 158 at Pecan Church will be left out of the program for the present. However, Commissioner Ed Hickman stated he would construct the best road possible from available

Included in the Precinct 1 project is 5.85 miles of new paving from Silver south to the river, a new high water bridge over the Colorado at that point, and 8.55 miles of new paving leading south toward the highway west of Edith. Also included in 12 blocks of paving in Robert Lee which lead to the hospital and the school house.

W. W. Greif & Associates, engineering firm of McCamey, has been in charge of surveys for the precinct road districts. A. G. Blucher has returned to Robert Lee and will serve as resident engineer.

Mr. Blucher says engineering data has been completed on the stretch from Silver to the river. It has agreed that also specifications for the river bridge and the paving in Robert Lee be prepared as soon as possible, so that ted. Mrs. S. J. Precinct 1 bonds carried by 75% of the vote, while in Precinct 3 there was a majority of one vote for the bonds.

Main purpose of the bond issue was to connect up the rapidly expanding oil fields in the northwest corner of the county.


