

Tax income for the Robert Lee Independent School District will gain slightly more than \$2,000 this year, according to a statement released this week by H. S. Lewis, Sr., tax assessor-collector.

Petitions are being circulated requesting a special election to be called to vote on a \$300,000 bond issue for a new Coke County Court House.

Several important matters concerning the proposed new court house were discussed at a conference of the Commissioners Court and Citizens Advisory committee last Friday. The project has met with favorable reaction from all parts of the county, since it has been definitely announced that a new court house can be built without any tax increase.

Petitions are being circulated here at the locker plant and Brown & Clark station. There are also petitions in Bronte and Silver.. As set out in the petition the proposition to be voted upon is as follows:

"Shall the Commissioners Court of Coke County, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of said county in an amount of \$300,000.-00, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed 21/2% per annum, and maturing serially in not to exceed 15 years from the date there of for the purpose of providing funds to erect a Court million dollars of valuation and House for the County, and whether or not taxes shall be levied annually on all taxable property mainder of about \$1,800,000.00 is in said County sufficient to pay

> Judge Jeff Dean says sufficient taxes are already being levied to pay off the bonds in 15 years. He points out that the present Permanent Improvement Fund (some times referred to as court house & jail) carries a levy of 25 cents on \$100 valuation. Since this year's county total valuation is over \$25 million dollars, the fund will have an income of more than \$60,000.

Hospital bonds, upkeep of county buildings and other items totalling \$23,000 were paid out of this fund last year, indicating there will be ample funds to retire the court house bonds.

Columbian Securities Corp. has agreed to purchase the bonds at an interest rate of 2.35%. An average of \$20,000 per year would pay off the bond principal, while interest charges will decrease from year to year from the first year maximum of \$7,050.

Wyatt C. Hedrick of Ft. Worth has been engaged as architect with Harry Weaver of Robert Lee as his associate.

The proposed building will have ample room for all county offices on the ground floor. Second floor not as large as the main floor, will provide a court room, jury dormitories, lawyer's rooms, etc. Rest rooms, a heating and cooling system and storage space will be included in the basement.

Since the amount of bonds were determined along with other matters, the Citizens Advisory Committee probably wound up its job at the Friday meeting. Members of the committee inc'ude R. C. History of Coke County

INSTALLMENT 29 Sun Oil Company's third pool opener in Coke County, No. 1 P. W. Millican, flowed 575.9 barrels of 45.4 gravity oil in its official 24-hour test last week. The potential gauge probably set a new record for Coke County. It was through a quarter inch choke from Strawn lime at 5,952-5,971

feet. Gas-oil ratio was 1,075-1. Subsequent drilling has made the Millican field the third largest in Coke County. It contains

approximately 40 producers. The Fort Chadbourne field, one of the great oil fields in West Texas, borders Coke County on the northeast. The majority of the field lies in Runnels County, but 12 producers have been completed in Coke County. The field extended over seven miles in length in the county and has recorded no dry holes. The future of this field, indeed, is very

Another new field is the West Fort Chadbourne field located two miles west of the main Fort Chadbourne pool. Production is obtained from the Strawn lime as it is in the regular Fort Chad-

bourne field. Ten wells have been completed at this time. A small pool was discovered by Union Oil Company of California in their No. 1 Daisy McCutchen. The test spudded Friday, May 19, 1950. It was five miles due east of Robert Lee. On July 11, 1950, No. 1-B Daisy McCutchen struck oil and flowed at the rate of seven barrels per hour. No. 1-B McCutchen was "completed for an official flow of 179.2 barrels of 42.6 gravity oil." This completion was the first in the county to be completed from the Cisco sand. Union's second well, No. 2-B Daisy McCutchen was comrleted naturally at a depth of 3,966-3,978 feet for "1,320 barrels

of 44.6 gravity oil." The McCutchen field has 12 producers. Sun completed two new disreveries south of their Jameson field during the fall of 1951. The first well, No. 8 Ralph Harris was completed from a ney pay section, the Caddo lime, at 6,771-6,775 feet. The well flowed over

100 barrels of high gravity oil for its potential test. The second well was a 3/8 mile o'fset from No. 8 Ralph Harris. This well, Sun No. 1 Blanks-Perkins Unit, failed to find commercial production in the Caddo. But it made a good producer in the Strawn sand at 6,011-6.022 feet. "The well flowed 124.56 barrels of 45.6 gravity oil in 24 hours." These two producters have prospects of developing in-

to larger fields in the future. The last major discovery was made by Chester Hunter early in 1952 in his No. 1 Stagner on the west side of the Jameson field. This test located a new pay just above the Strawn lime reef from which the other wells produced. No. 1 Stagner flowed "140.8 barrels of 47.8 gravity oil" on a 24hour potential test from 5,925-6,095 feet in the Strawn sand. Sun Oil Company had been drilling through this new sand section and knew it was productive, but they did little to produce from it until the Stagner well came in. By the end of April, 1952, they had completed over 11 wells in the new sand section. The Jameson field has over 126 lime wells and 11 sand wells in it at this time. "Sun opened the field December 6, 1946, and on the Febru-

ary proration schedule had 126 lime wells with a total daily al-

lowable of 12,242 barrels. Although Coke County has only a few minor discoveries, they are worthy of being mentioned. The Arledge field, of all the minor discoveries apparently has the best chance of further development. Sun Oil Company's No. 1 J. W. Arledge was "fiveeighths of a mile south of the Coke-Nolan County line." It was eight miles east and a mile north of Allen Jameson No. 1, the opener of the Jameson field. Early in January, 1948, the test struck oil at 6,60s feet in the "Marble Falls section of the Pennsylvanian." lime. No. 1 Arledge flowed "176 barrels of 47.8 gravity oil" on its official 24 hour test. The second well resulted in obtaining a daily average of only 4.2 barrels of oil. The third test was a gas well. On a test that lasted 15 hours and ended early in the morning of June 2, 1948, No. 3 Arledge flowed 16.3 barrels of high grade distillate through a choke that measured only 3 16 of an inch. The gas-oil ratio was 31,000-1. After the third test, Sun moved out of the Arledge
