Crew To Make New Survey Of Coke County

Exploration Surveys, Inc., of Dallas has sent a crew here to make a survey of entire Coke County. Headquarters have been established in the building formerly occupied by the school tax office.

M. E. Taylor, party chief, arrived in Robert Lee Friday with his wife and son, Johnny Wayne. They have established their home in one of the A. B. Sheppard apartments.

Taylor recently returned from Cuba where he made oil surveys in the ocean. He had previous assignments in Brazil and Canada, and last year did considerable work in Oklahoma.

Bill Moore and W. Bryant are surveyors with the party, and Bill Crabtree is a meter operator. There are also two rodmen.

Mr. Taylor says his company will compile a gravimetric survey of Coke County from one end to the other. They measure gravity at close intervals and a contour map will be prepared. There will be no drilling.

Elevation markers are to be established every quarter mile. The party will work along the roads first and then move back into the fields.

The survey is expected to take from 8 months to one year.

Rites Held For W. G. Byrd, 83, Coke Pioneer

Funeral services for W. G. Byrd were held in the First Baptist Church in Silverton at 3 p. m. Sept. 20, and interment was made in the Silverton Cemetery. Mr. Byrd passed away Sunday, September 19, in the Silverton Hospital after a short illness.

Services were conducted by Rev. G. A. Elrod, pastor of the church and was assisted by Willie Williams, a long time friend of the Byrd family and a brother of Mrs. J. W. Byrd.

Wiley G. Byrd was born Nov. 29, 1870 in Gonzales County, Tex. He was the only child of James and Eliza Byrd. With his parents he moved to what is now Coke County while only a small lad and grew to manhood here. In 1891 he was married to Miss Eva Nunn and to this union six children were born.

They are as follows: Mrs. Della Word, Silverton, Tex., John Byrd, Happy, Tex., Mrs. Jesse McCracken, Silverton; Brown Byrd, Pomona, Calif., Mrs. Lila Austin, Robert Lee, Mrs. Lois Dixon, Bronte, Tex., all of whom survive. He was a member of the Missionary Baptist Church and had been a member of the Odd Fellow Lodge for many years. For the past few years, he had been recognized as the oldest settler in Coke County to attend the annual homecoming at Edith.

He ranched in Coke County until his retirement in 1945 when he purchased a home in Silverton and moved there. His son, J. W. Byrd, was appointed administrator of his estate.

Besides his wife and six children he is survived by sixteen grand children and 18 great grand children.

ABILENE SOPHS TO OPEN GRID SEASON HERE

Robert Lee Steers were hoping for a victory Thursday night of this week when they opened the home football season against Abilene High School Sophomores.

The Sophs have a big, rugged squad which is expected to improve rapidly as the season advances. They were defeated 31 to 7 at Bronte last week.

Coach James Mancill has been working hard with his Steers, following their setback at Bronte two weeks ago. Mancill still can't get over the poor defensive showing against the Longhorns, and has finally decided that it was due to lack of experience.

Most of the squad of 20 is in good physical shape. T. C. Brown still has an ailing foot, but is expected to see action against Abilene, and Halfback Fred Ashworth has a sore side which may be due to a cracked rib. Lynn Davidson's knee is still bothering him somewhat.

The Steers displayed plenty of offensive strength against Bronte and are expected to continue as a high scoring outfit. They have a varied attack, with Fullback Sherman Williams plunging through the line, while Davidson, Sammy Joe Duncan and Ashworth are showing up well as halfbacks.

Ben Bessent, shifted from end to quarterback this year, is doing a good job and is accurate in his passing. Look for the Steers to use more passes in the future. The Steers and their coach will eat supper after the Abilene game as guests of the newly formed Quarterback Club.

Mancill watched several District 6-B teams in action the past week and reports Hobbs, Hermleigh, Trent and Loraine are all strong. Bronte plays at Melvin this Friday and two conference scraps are coming up. Hermleigh goes to Hobbs and Loraine takes on Trent.

JUNIORS LOOKED GOOD

Robert Lee 7 and 8 graders won a 28-14 victory at Bronte Tuesday night and a return game is scheduled on the Robert Lee field next Tuesday, Oct. 5.

Twenty six players were used in the local Junior High lineup, and the first stringers showed considerable advantage over the Longhorn Calves.

Sam Ed Skipworth, a 7th grader, quarterbacked the first squad. His passes directed to Jerry and Paul Tinkler, at the end positions, were highly successful.

Robbery Nets \$129 At McCabe Station

History of Coke County

INSTALLMENT 30

Seaboard Oil Company and Southern Minerals discovered a small Ellenburger pool 10 miles southeast of Robert Lee. Their test, No. 1 M. G. Reed was located on an 8,500 acre block of leases. No. 1 Reed discovered oil early May 5, 1948, in the Ellenburger at 6,200 feet. The well was completed for a daily flow of "176 barrels of 47 gravity oil and 236 barrels of salt water." The salt water ruined the well, and it was abandoned at a later date. Two more tests near No. 1 Reed were dry.

Shamrock Oil Company began a wildcat in March, 1948, seven miles southeast of Robert Lee on the Wendland ranch. The well was about three miles northwest of Seaboard and Southern Mineral's No. 1 M. G. Reed. No. 1 H. G. Wendland also struck oil in the Ellenburger. It produced 254.4 barrels of oil that tested 47.1 gravity during a 24-hour test that ended Monday morning (May 31, 1948.) Another well

proved to be a dry hole. Drilling was then discontinued permanently. No. 1 Wendland now pumps around 27 barrels of oil per day.

Alan Guiberson staked a northern Coke County wildcat during March, 1948. The test, No. 1 Jack Lassiter, was two miles southwest of No. 1 Arledge, discovery well of the Arledge pool. No. 1 Lassiter hit oil at 6,495 feet in the Marble Falls. It was completed for an initial potential of 221 barrels of high gravity oil. Three other tests were drilled close to No. 1 Lassiter, but they were dry holes. Drilling was then discontinued.

Union Oil Company made a minor discovery in January, 1951, four miles east of Robert Lee when their No. 3 Jim McCutchen produced 20 barrels of oil an hour during a drillstem test between 3,985-4,000 feet. The pay section was the Cisco sand. The well produced 278 barrels of high gravity oil during an official test that lasted 24 hours. No. 4 Jim McCutchen was completed early in February for a 24-hour potential flow of 275 barrels of oil. Two more wells were drilled by Union, but they were dry holes. Drilling was suspended in the Jim McCutchen field.

Sun Oil Company made a minor discovery early in March, 1951, when their No. 2 H. L. Bloodworth wildcat struck oil in the Strawn sand at 5,625 feet. The well flowed 55 barrels of high gravity oil on its official 24 hour test. Location of No. 2 Bloodworth was two miles east of the Jameson field. A second well, No. 1 J. S. Walker, was a dry hole. Sun then moved their rig out of the Bloodworth field. Only the future knows what lies ahead for these small fields. Some will die out, while others will possibly have future development.

Religious Fanatics

The church of Christ often has been accused of being religiously fanatic.

Often this charge is made because we teach that the Bible is the only God-given creed by which Christians are governed. (Tim. 3:16-7, Romans 1:16-8, Rev. 22:18-9, etc.) Many insist that human creeds, manuals, and disciplines should be binding on Christians. WHICH TEACHING IS THE FANATIC ONE?

The church of Christ urges calling Bible things by Bible names. (Isa. 62:2 & Acts 11:26, James 2:7, I Peter 4:14, etc.) Many impose human titles on Biblical things and insist that their brethren do likewise. Which of these two doctrines is the fanatic one?

The church pleads for the same simple worship that was used in New Testament times. (Acts 20:7, I Cor. 10:16-7, Eph. 5:19, Col. 3:16, etc.) Many force innovations into the worship and bind additions on their people that the Lord never authorized. Are we fanatic because we teach what the Lord taught?

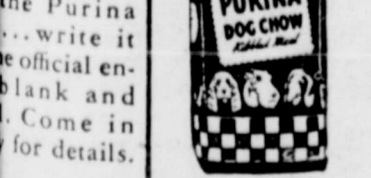
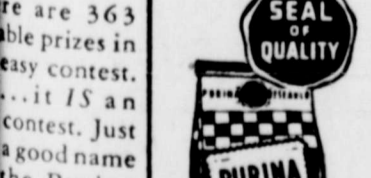
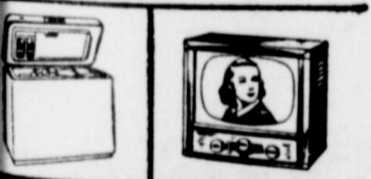
