CONTRACT LET FOR HOUSES AT NEW GAS PLANT

A contract for constructing 16 dwelling house and an office building near the new gasoline plant, southwest of Silver, has been awarded to McMillan Lumber Company of Robert Lee. E. F. Henry is a co-contractor and will be in charge of building operations.

Norval Jackson, McMillan local manager, says work is expected to start by the end of the month and the buildings will be rushed to tarly completion. Two of the houses will have three bedrooms and the remainder two.

No other work has started on the gas plant to be constructed by Texas Natural Gasoline Corp. of Tulsa, although several carloads of pipe and other material have been unloaded at Bronte in the Santa Fe yards.

McMilliam & Henry are also engaged in building five new dwellings in the Perkins-Prothro camp on the Blanks Ranch. This will make a total of 12 houses for use of pumpers and production personnel.

Here for Theft; **Set School Case**

Two men were given four-year penitentiary terms, one of them suspended, after entering guilty pleas before Judge Joe L. Mays in 51st District Court Tuesday.

Jimmy Duel Whiteley, 49, Big Spring cook, was sentenced to a four-year term on a charge of burglarizing the John T. Barton ranch near Water Valley Aug. 21.

Last month in Tom Green County Whitely was dealt four and five year prison terms after pleading guilty to two charges of burglary. The three terms are to run concurrently.

Judge Mays Tuesday set punishment of a four-year suspended sentence for Thomas Glenn Kiser, 18, of San Angelo, who pleaded guilty to theft of a butane tank from the Shirley Miller Drilling Co. location Aug. 20.

Kiser, who formerly lived in San Angelo at N. Koenigheim, also is charged on indictment here with theft of 2,000 feet of two-inch pipe from an oil field.

SILVER SCHOOL CASE

Judge Mays will return to Robert Lee next Monday to hear the lawsuit of Balfanz Construction Co. of Abilene vs Silver Peak School District. Balfanz filed suit for \$18,455 and \$517.00 interest which he claims is due as final payment on his contract for building the new Silver school addition last year. Directors of the school district claimed the contract was not completed in a satisfactory manner.

Plaintiff is represented by the Abilene law firm of Scarborough, Yates, Scarborough & Black. Kever & Stokes of San Angelo are attorneys for the school district.

An oil strike three miles north of Robert Lee was indicated Wednesday when the J. B. Randle wildcat on F. C. Wojtek recovered 100 feet of oil on a drillstem test.

The test was made in a sand section 4902 to 4910 feet with the formation undetermined. During a two-hour test gas surfaced in one hour and 30 minutes and 100 feet of clean oil was recovered. It had a gravity test of 43. Bottom hole pressure was reported at 1.875 pounds. There was no water.

Operators planned to core deeper.

Farm Bureau to Recommend More Equitable Acreage

A national farm program designed to eliminate surpluses and discriminatory acreage controls will be recommended to the American Farm Bureau Federation, according to James Arrott of Tennyson, president of the Coke County Farm Bureau.

Under the Texas plan, acreage control would be set up on the basis of a farm's total tillable acreage. The present law places control on the individual commodities. According to the plan, the percentage of acres to be retired from production would be determined by the over-all over-production of all agricultural commodities in this country.

The percentage of acres responsible for surpluses would be taken out of commercial production. According to President Arrott, is has been found to average 5 to 5 percent of the nation's cultivated acreage. If the percentage mounted to 10 per cent, then each armer would be required to divert 0 percent of his tillable acreage from production, he explained.

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A farmer would have to comply with this provision in order to be ligible for price supports. Good will conservation practices would also be required for the idle acres. This would be encouraged by will conservation payments.

Under the plan, a system of rice supports would be instituted o encourage the shifting of prouction from crops in surplus suply to crops in short supply.

The Texas Farm Bureau beleves that its plan, if administerd fairly, would enable farmers to
arn full parity for their crops
with a maximum of freedom in
heir operations. Since the government would be concerned with
olicing only a small percentage of
cres on each farm, the cost to
he tax payers would be much less
han for the present farm proram.



Farm Bureau leaders from Coke and three other counties in this area will meet with Blue Cross-Blue Shield and Texas Farm Bureau staff members to plan increased participation of Farm Bureau families in the group hospitalization and surgical benefits

The state farm organization and Blue Cross-Blue Shield, a nonprofit organization, will conduct a concerted campaign over the state in December and January to enroll Farm Families in the Blue Cross-Blue Shield program.
