Fair Division Superintendents Are Announced

The Castro County Fair on September 27 should have one of the best livestock exhibits that has ever been held in the county. WAC Recruiters To Be Here Wed.

Word received from the District WAC Recruiting Office in Lubbock today announced that a special WAC Recruiting Team will be in Dimmitt Wednesday, Sept. 13, to interview all women between the ages of 20 to 50 who are interested in joining the Women's Army Corps.

MEDICAL TECHNICIANS URGENTLY NEEDED

Special emphasis will be placed on recruiting and interesting women to join as Medical Technicians to serve with the Medical Corps of the Army. More than 6800 women are needed in the next month to serve in these jobs, to help care for the thousands of casualties being returned from the battlefronts, according to the Surgeon General who stated that the amount of these casualties is far greater than was anticipated.

The need for eligible women to serve in the Women's Army Corps in every branch of service has reached an emergency degree and no efforts will be spared to interest every eligible woman. Complete information will be given each applicant as to job, station, and branch of service. Also details on the many benefits derived by members of the WAC. Interested women are urged to contact the WAC Recruiters at the local Post Office or by appointment with Mrs. J. F. Easter, Civilian Chairman for this city.

John F. Easter, Jr. At Aviation Cadet Training Center

According to an announcement from the Public Relations Office at the San Antonio Aviation Cadet Center, John F. Easter, Jr. of Dimmitt is among a class of 166 Texans at the San Antonio Aviation Cadet Center, potential pilots, bombardiers and navigators who are receiving preflight training to prepare them for aerial instruction and duties as aircrew members in the Army Air Corps.

The future fliers are subjected to a rigorous 10-week program of instruction covering physical, academic and military training. At Cadet Center, a unit of the AAF Training Command, they study maps and charts, aircraft identification, small arms and other subjects while being conditioned physically for the long training period ahead. Bombardiers, navigators and pilots receive the first five weeks of preflight instruction as a group, then are separated for specialized training.

Over 300 Irrigation Wells Watering Castro Co. Land

Castro County is fast developing its irrigation wells as there are now some 300 in the county. As irrigation of crops is increasing and heavy yields of crops are being taken off the land each year, it is time for all irrigation farmers to be thinking of planting clover or other crops on their farms that can be turned under while green, stated County Agent M. U. May. Mr. Hubert Young of the Flagg community has been irrigating land for the past seven years, the most of it being in Lubbock county, before he moved to Castro county last year. Mr. Young stated that every year he irrigated his yields decreased, and he is now interested in keeping the production of his new farm in Castro county up by planting clovers that he can turn under green.

The experience of Mr. Young, an experienced irrigation farmer, should be of much value to many irrigation farmers in Castro county to encourage them to plant green manure crops to turn under to keep their land productive. Clovers can be planted in the fall or spring, grazed some and then turned under green that same year or the one following.

Nature has a way of taking care of the land in the Plains county as we have limited rainfall and when we have a dry year the land gets a rest, but with irrigation we are producing heavy crops every year and we must start putting something new back into the soil in the way of green manure crops, May concluded.

Plans For Bus Route Are Made At Bus Meetings

The second of a series of meetings, for the purpose of causing a bus route to be established from Clovis, N. M., to Hollis, Okla., was held in Silverton Friday evening. Business men, and others, interested in the project were present from Hollis, Okla., Tulsa, Dimmitt and Clovis, N. M. The first meeting was held at Memphis, Wednesday, August 23, with large representations from the various towns along the proposed route present. Interest on both occasions was excellent and as a result the establishment of a bus over the proposed route in the near future is highly probable.

Mr. Hollis Boren, theatre proprietor, of Memphis served as chairman at both of the meetings, and when the Tri-State Transportation Committee, composed of two members from each town on the proposed route was formed, he was made permanent chairman, with Mr. T. A. Singer of Dimmitt being appointed as Secretary-Treasurer. Mr. Singer is largely responsible for the forming of the organization, and through his untiring efforts succeeded in causing the citizens of towns in the three states to awaken to the dire need of East-West transportation through this vast agricultural and ranching section.

The discussion at both meetings was predominated by the need of, and extensive use of, transportation facilities in the post-war period, and it was pointed out by various speakers that prospects for growth of towns without adequate transportation facilities was nil. Dimmitt is the only town on the proposed route without any type of public conveyance in any direction, but all other towns on the route only have north and south bus or train service.

The proposed route is the shortest direct route between New Mexico and Oklahoma and would connect with bus terminals in both states making it a desirable route for long distance travelers, while at the same time it would serve Texas points that are determined to keep pace with the progress that is inevitable in the post-war period.

During the discussions of the proposed bus route the need for an east-west Airline through this section was cited, and with the establishing of the bus route it is believed that prospects for an Air Line service over the same territory will be enhanced. With the prospects of more travel and the need of more efficient methods of transportation cities and towns throughout the nation are including an airport in their post-war planning and it is believed now that for a town to attain its maximum growth and to hold the trade of its territory a local airport will be a prerequisite.

Good Rains Here Monday

Intermittent rains Monday and Monday night soaked the soil of this section, assuring sufficient moisture to bring up wheat and to increase production of row crops throughout the county. It is declared that, but with few exceptions, the row crops in the county will produce a fair yield while some farms are expecting a bumper harvest. The recent rains, although general over the county and Plains area, varied in amount in the various communities. The rain gauge at the Hays Implement Company registered 1.60 inches rainfall. Scattered showers were received in the county Sunday night with some hail falling in the Mulkey community.

Mailing Methods For Fruits, Cakes, To Men Overseas

(By Lelia Petty, County Home Demonstration Agent) From September 15 to October 15th is the time to mail Christmas packages to our boys overseas, and now is the time to start planning just what we are going to send. The Post Office has already released instructions for preparing these packages, so I won't go into that, but I do want to mention one of them. We are told not to send perishable foods. We all know how much the boys over there would enjoy some of their mother's or wife's home-cooked food; in fact, many of them have written home asking for various foods. So about the only solution seems to be home canning.

Fruit cake seems to be one of the most popular items. You can use any of your favorite recipes for making fruit cake, plum pudding, or Boston Brown bread, then start from there:

1. After the ingredients have been mixed well, pack the mixture into greased R-enamel or plain tin cans, or the cans may be lined with waxed paper instead of greasing them. No. 1 or No. 2 cans are more satisfactory than larger ones.
2. Leave 1 to 1 1/2 inches head space at top of can.
3. Seal the first roll on the can.
4. Steam No. 2 cans for 75 minutes, and No. 1 for 60 minutes. (Use either a water bath or a pressure cooker for steaming. Keep lid on water bath. Fasten lid on pressure cooker and leave pet cock open. Have water about two inches below rims of cans.)
5. Complete Seal.
6. Process immediately at 12 pounds pressure for 30 minutes.

Other foods that may be canned so they may be mailed overseas are preserves, cookies, candies, candied chicken, and sausage. Of course, the directions for canning these foods are not the same as for fruit cake, but they can be had from your Home Demonstration Agent's office.

Planting Hints Are Given For Crested Wheat Grass Here

Many people are planning to plant crested wheat grass for permanent pastures this fall and as this is the case County Agent May gives these hints on sowing the grass. The grass should be planted on a firm seed bed about as shallow as a wheat drill can sow it. It should be sown on dry land at the rate of 8 pounds per acre and double that for irrigated land. It is better to sow in land that has been in sudan or that has not been plowed for some time so that the land will be firm. If the grass is planted on ground that has been recently plowed you are likely to get a poor stand of grass. County Agent declared was the experience of Raymond Anren who first planted crested wheat grass.

Crested wheat grass can now be obtained locally and even though it looks promising in every respect it is doubtful whether large acreages should be planted to it until it has proven itself over a 6 to 10 year period.
