Gauged through a 10-64 inch tubing choke, the flowing pressure was 200 pounds and the gas-oil ratio 431-1.

The official 24-hour test was completed at 4:30 Tuesday p. m. It will have an allowable production of 100 barrels per day. V. V. Wojtek has been designated as the gauger.

Production is from Canyon sand with perforations between 4,903-31 feet, 4,940-46 feet and 4,950-56 feet, which had been fractured with 6,000 gallons.

# 1955 ACP Approved **Practices Announced**

The following practices have quite, cedar, underbrush and been approved for the 1955 ACP spraying mesquite.) program.

- 1. Initial Establishment of Permanent vegetative cover for soil protection or as a needed land-use adjustment.
- 2. Establishment of additional acreage of vegetative cover in crop rotation to retard erosion and to improve soil structure pereability, or water holding capacity.
- 3. Initial establishment of field strip cropping to protect soil from wind or water erosion.
- 4. Initial improvement of vegetative cover on rangeland by artificial reseeding for soil protec-
- 5. Controlling competitive shrubs to permit growth of adequate desirable vegetative cover for soil protection on range or pasture. (This includes prickly pear, mes-



This means that anyone who wishes to start a practice, for example in June, is to come to the county ASC office between May 15 and May 25, and sign up for that practice, to be



#### INSTALLMENT 36

The Bronte Methodist church was organized under a brush arbor at the Pecan Motts on east Kickapoo Creek, in the summer of 1890, by the Reverend J. W. Montgomery, who was then pastor of the Hayrick Methodist Church.


