Students sweep state show

A gleaming-black 1931 Chevrolet coupe which the Dimmitt High School Industrial Arts Club rebuilt and restored was named the outstanding project of the Texas Industrial Arts Students Association state fair in Austin Saturday, winning out over more than 2,000 entries.

DIMMITT students captured four other state championships, three second places and two third places with their individual woodworking and power mechanics projects.

Larry Allison, DHS junior, won the state championship in his woodworking class with a large air-hockey table finished in antique pine.

Jim Wright, a junior, won the blue ribbon in his class with a walnut triple dresser with mirror.

SENIOR Kathy Wales won the state championship in cedar-lined chests with an Early American chest of walnut.

Dimmitt's youngest state champion was freshman Teresa Falcon, whose maple china cabinet captured the blue ribbon for large cabinets by Woodworking I students.

Winning second-place ribbons in the big state show were junior Kelly Bagley with a large walnut armoire, freshman David Montiel with a large serving bar made of pecan, and senior Olga Sandoval with a cedar-lined chest of pecan.

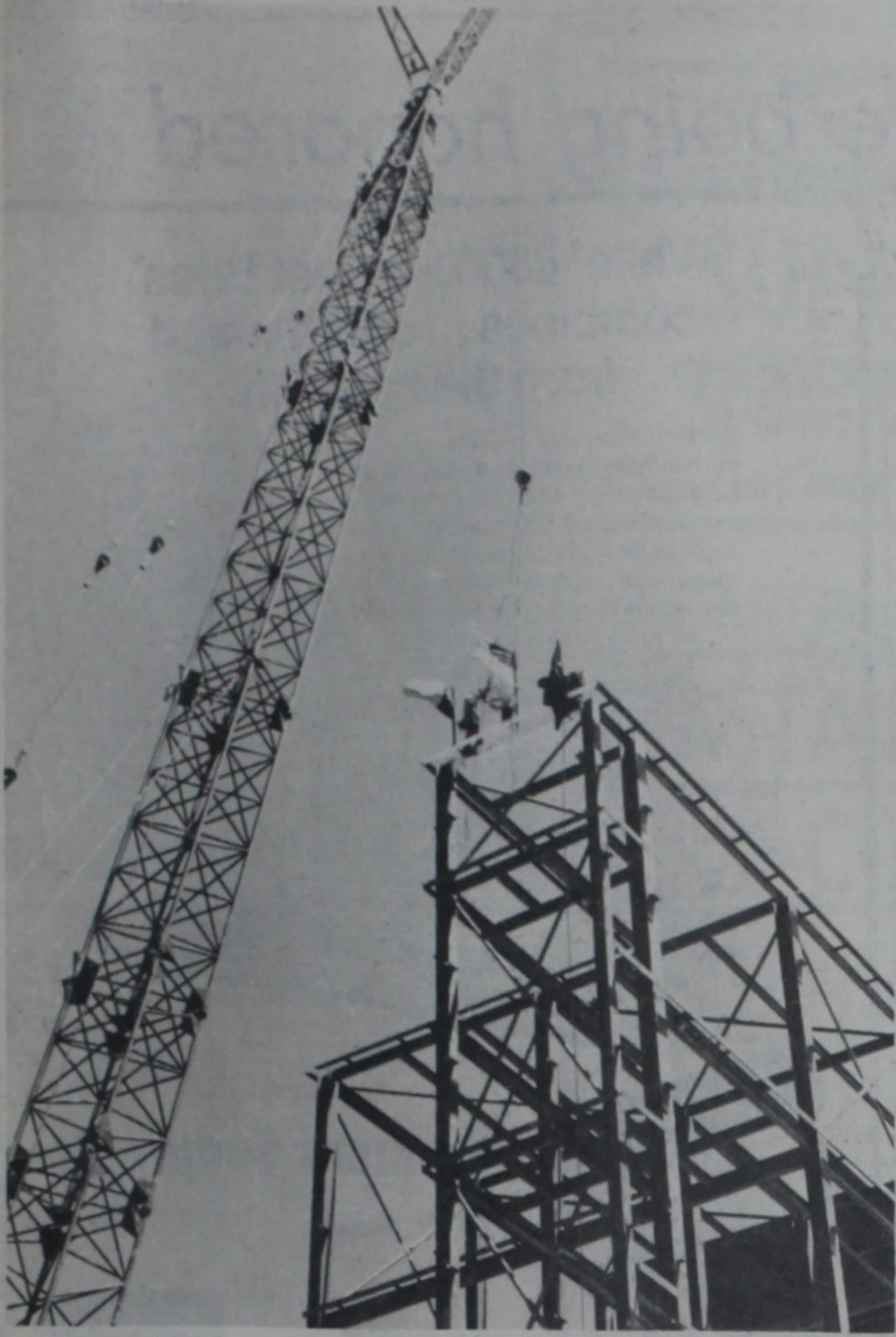
LISA HILL, the DHS Industrial Arts Club Sweetheart, was a double winner. She captured third place in her wood-working class with a large console-type sewing cabinet of walnut, and was named second runner-up in the state sweetheart contest. The 17-year-old junior modeled a formal, gave a brief speech and performed on her marimba in the sweetheart competition.

Junior Robert Jones captured third place in General Power Mechanics projects with an antique John Deere one-cylinder.

Austin Co. 'tops off' Amstar's new millhouse

Using a yellow steel beam autographed by dozens of workmen, the Austin Co. "topped off" the basic steel structure of the Amstar Corp.'s new millhouse Tuesday afternoon.

THE TOP BEAM was hoisted more than 100 ft. and set in place at the millhouse's highest level—atop a stair tower on the north side.

A hundred or more workers, Amstar employees, city and Chamber of Commerce officials and curious onlookers gathered

at the site for the topping-off and applauded when the steel beam was set in place.

Mounted atop the beam were the flags of Texas, the US and the Austin Co., and a California Christmas Tree seedling in a bucket.

PROJECT Supt. Stephen Cole explained that the evergreen seedling hoisted with the top beam dates back to an old Norwegian custom. The "top-

ping off" of a basic structure marks the official birth of a building, and the evergreen goes up with the top beam to symbolize new life, he said.

The seedling will be transplanted near the new mill later to mark the age of the building.

The top beam brought to 806½ tons the total amount of structural steel in the new plant building to date. Cole said the

Before he went to Port Neches, he was assistant coach a year at Sweeney. He attended Blinn Junior College and Lamar University after graduating from Nederland High School, and holds a master's degree.

The annual Baccalaureate Concert by Dimmitt High School's Bobcat Band at 2:30 p.m. Sunday will be a benefit for Jim Birdwell, band president and first chair cornetist who is in Brackenridge Hospital in Austin recuperating from a juvenile stroke.

THE SALUTATORY address will be given by Kathy Wales. Special music is being arranged for both the Baccalaureate and Commencement programs.

CONTRIBUTIONS will be received at the door of the DHS auditorium, all to go to the Jim Birdwell Fund, Band Director Ralph Smith said. The concert is open to the public.

In conjunction with the concert, the Industrial Arts Department will hold open house in its building to display woodworking and power mechanics projects—including many state winners—and the DHS Art Department will have its annual show of student work in the foyer and hall before and after the band's program.

DHS announces baccalaureate, commencement

Commencement exercises next Thursday will mark the close of high school days for the 80 Dimmitt High School seniors who are candidates for 1976 graduation.

BOTH Baccalaureate and Commencement services will be held in the high school auditorium.

The Baccalaureate service will be at 8 p.m. Sunday. Viggo Ulrich, minister of the Bedford Street Church of Christ, will deliver the Baccalaureate sermon.

Diplomas will be presented next Thursday by John Gilbreath, president of the Dimmitt School Board.

Valedictorian Jim Birdwell will not be present to deliver the valedictory address; he is recuperating in an Austin hospital after suffering a juvenile stroke. He has designated Jack Flynt to speak in his place.

Democrats will use four boxes in June runoff

Democrats in Castro County will vote in only four boxes in the primary runoff June 5, instead of the 16 polling places used in the first primary.

COUNTY Democratic Chairman Carl King said there will be one voting box in each of the four commissioners' precincts.

Residents of Commissioners' Precinct 1 will vote at the Hart City Hall, Precinct 2 in the courthouse basement, Precinct 3 in the county clerk's office and Precinct 4 at the Nazareth Community Building.

"The state is asking us to cooperate on cutting expenses since the primary is partially paid for with tax money," King explained. "Since we have no runoffs for local offices, I have decided to consolidate the voting boxes for this particular runoff election."

DEMOCRATIC nominees for two state posts will be decided in the runoff—for the Texas Railroad Commission (Jon Newton vs. Jerry Sadler) and for the unexpired term on the Court of Criminal Appeals (W. T. Phillips vs. Carl Dally).

Supt. Ted Averitt and Hart School Board President Wamon Foster will award diplomas after the 23 class members are presented by Principal William E. Ammons.

Awards will be conferred by Ammons. In addition to the top students, honor graduates are Carol Armstrong and Patricia Shugart.

Eloise Sarabia and Barry George will give the class history, and the graduates will sing "So Long, My Friend." The invocation will be by Miss Foster and the benediction by Randy Finch. Margaret Rambo will play processional music. RICHARD GRAY will give

the Baccalaureate address to the class Sunday after the invocation by Rev. Joe Cariker and a musical selection by Vivian Davis. The benediction will be pronounced by Rev. Elra Phillips.

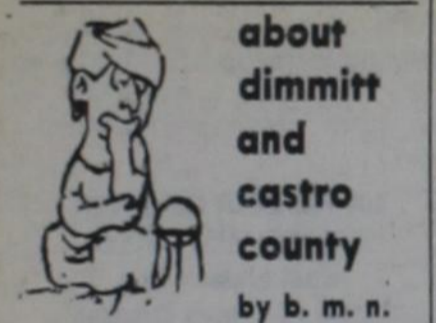

Sports banquet draws SRO crowd

Dimmitt High School's annual Athletic Banquet drew a standing-room-only crowd Friday night—just as many games did during the school's successful sports year.

MORE THAN 220 athletes, parents, fans and coaches jammed into the DHS cafeteria to hear Johnny Ray Watson speak and sing, watch the Most Valuable Players receive their awards, and hear the coaches

pay tribute to all-staters and bench-warmers alike.

"Most Valuable Player" awards in the major sports went to senior lineman Keith Goldsmith, football; senior post forward Kathy Wales and senior guard Marla Winders, girls' basketball; senior forward Jim Birdwell, boys' basketball; and sophomore sprinter Eddie Chavers, boys' track.

Three all-state players were

recognized by their coaches—Miss Winders and junior Beth Cleveland in girls' basketball, and Birdwell in boys' basketball. Many others were recognized who distinguished themselves during the year in athletics—as district champions, regional qualifiers, record-setters, or as all-district, all-tournament or all-South Plains honorees.

BIRDWELL, who was prais-

ed by Coach Kenneth Cleveland as "the first boy I've ever coached who has made all-state two years in a row," is undergoing physical therapy in Austin after having suffered a juvenile stroke last month. His MVP award in basketball was accepted by teammate Danny Vaughan. Other teammates flew to Austin Saturday to deliver a tape recording of the banquet to Birdwell.

Cleveland noted that this year's basketball team had the best overall record (31-2) and the fewest losses of any team he has ever coached—including regional and state champions—although this year's Bobcats had to settle for second place in the district race behind the state finalist Morton Indians.

Coach Sam Nichols recognized DHS's first district championship team in girls' basketball since 1970. He noted that the Bobbies were ranked fifth in the state in the final poll, following the state tournament.

NICHOLS also singled out the school's two regional qualifiers in girls' track—Dorothy Rivers and Kathy Goldsmith.

Coach Bobby King recognized the school's all-district football players and announced that Goldsmith and Randy Porter—who played his final year of eligibility in 1974—have been offered scholarships by two colleges in California and Kansas.

King noted that seven DHS runners qualified for the regional track meet this year, and that all will be back next year.

Coach Don Blankenship recapped the boys' and girls' tennis season and lauded Brad DuLaney as Dimmitt's first district champion in tennis in recent history.

CLEVELAND singled out members of the DHS boys' golf team, who repeated as district champions this year and finished seventh in the regional tourney.

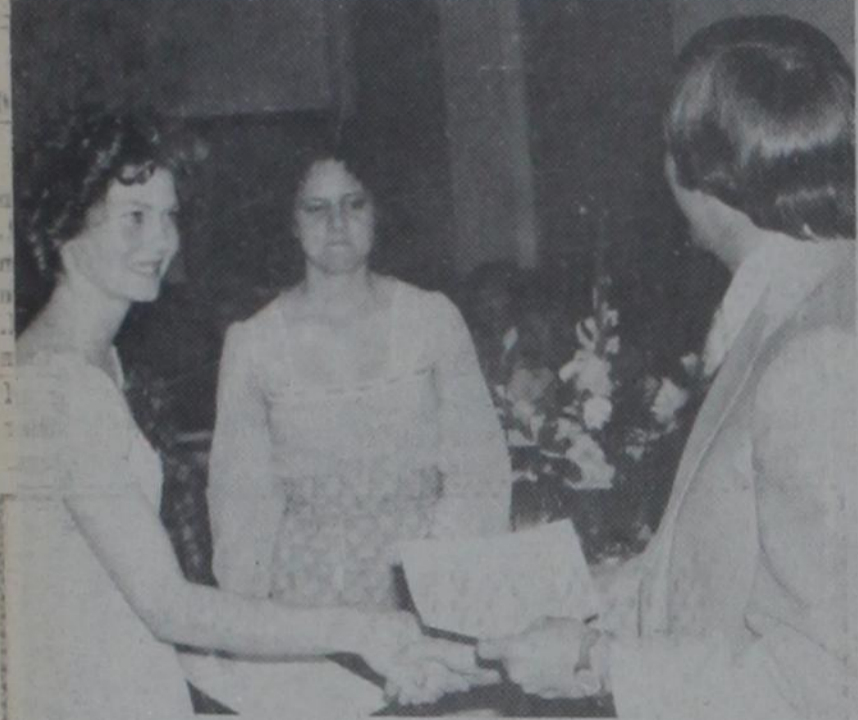

Master of ceremonies Ronnie Parker kept the audience

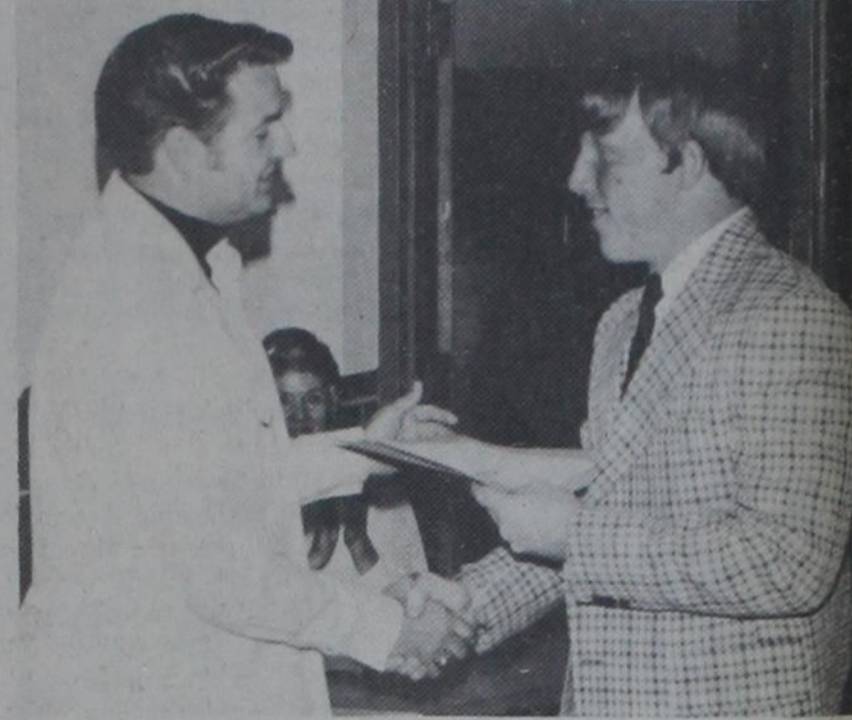

The War Between the States isn't over. In fact, it's heating up. The weapons are money and labor. The stakes are huge. To the victor goes job, capital and people. To the defeated goes economic stagnation, loss of industry and jobs, a shrinking tax base and crowded welfare rolls.
STUDENTS of history will remember that what is happening in the US today is what precipitated the 17th Century Wars between Holland and England. Holland was in an economic decline and England was a growing world power. Three centuries later, Germany was the belligerent economic power, forcing England and France to defend themselves in a struggle which flared into World War I.
This country is composed of 50 states, politically bound to a common cause. But, economically, it is as different as night from day. There are massive population moves underway. The South and Southwest have grown six times as fast as the North-Central US and ten times as fast as the Northeast.
Areas of different rates of economic growth have different attitudes toward national problems. The seeds of the Civil War were sown in economic turmoil, not whether man should be free or slave.
For many years this economic shift in industry and population was moderate, from the rich and prosperous Northeast to the underdeveloped South and Southwest. As long as the shift was gradual, the effect was beneficial to the country. But now the winds of economic change are bitter cold.
A survey by the Commerce Department several years ago estimated populations, personal incomes, and unemployed for each of the states, projecting the figures to 1980 and 1990. Nine states reached their 1980 figures last year. New Mexico has already shot ahead of the 1990 projected figures.

Tenor-pianist to give senior recital tonight

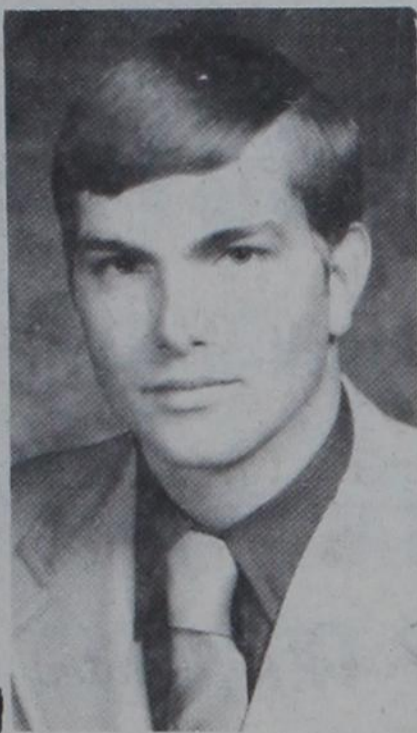
The Lubbock College of Music will present Thomas McGuire in his senior recital in voice and piano tonight (Thursday) at 8 in the First United Methodist Church.

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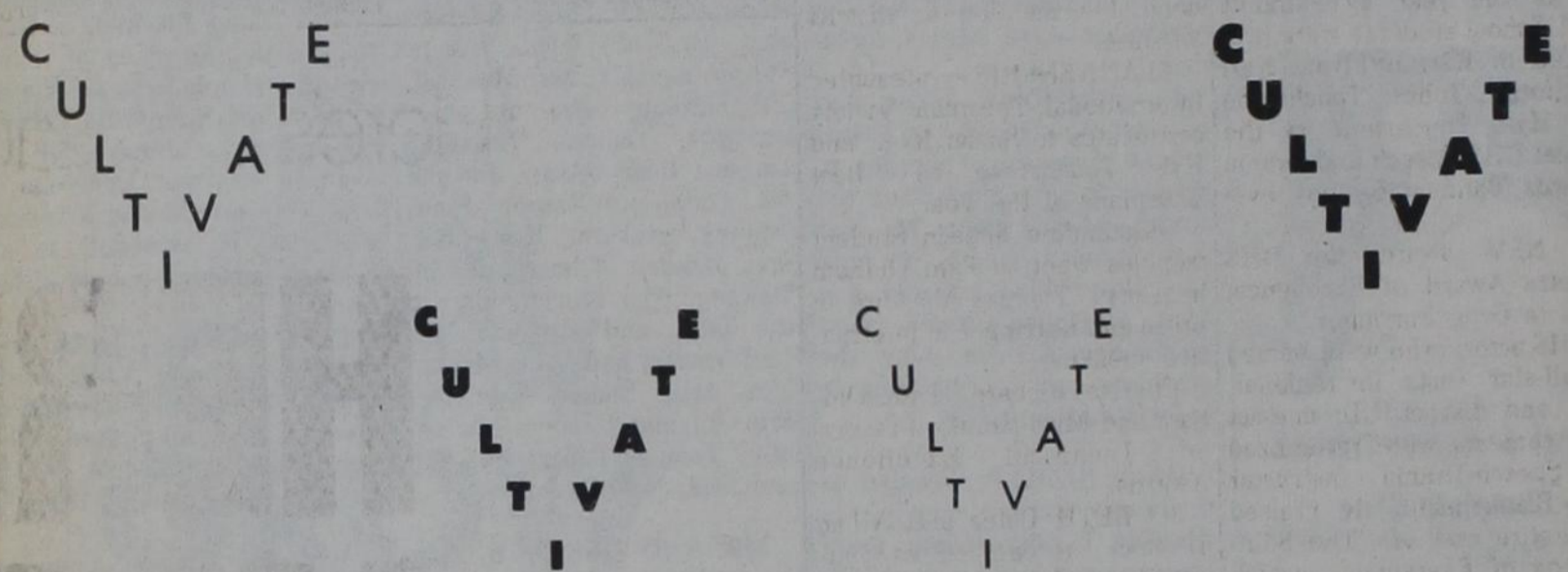

Normal dates for planting county crops are specified

Normal planting dates refer to the time during which the crop is planted in Castro County with the expectation of producing a normal crop. The normal planting dates are as follows:

Corn — March 20 through May 31.

Grain Sorghum — April 1 through June 20.

Soybeans — April 20 through July 1.

Cotton — May 5 through June 1.

THESE dates mean you must plant or replant crops until the dates specified if moisture is available. You may plant later if you wish.

If you are prevented from planting due to a natural disaster, after the land has been properly prepared for planting, then you must file with the ASCS Office within 5 days after the end of the normal planting period for the commodity.

If you have Failed Acreage then you must file with the ASCS Office while evidence of the crop is still apparent; but not later than 15 days after it is harvested or abandoned.

DISASTER production wheat may not be comingled with prior year's wheat on the farm unless the old wheat is first measured by this office. You are also urged to keep farm production separate for each farm. If you have any questions

YOU WILL be receiving a letter in the near future requesting that you certify to your 1976 planted cotton acreage. It would be appreciated, due to the available personnel to handle certifications, if you would try to follow closely the date set-up for your certification. The acreage must be certified to field by field and accuracy is again stressed, since we will be checking a number of you again.

HOLIDAY: The Castro County ASCS Office will be closed on Monday, May 31, in observance of Memorial Day.

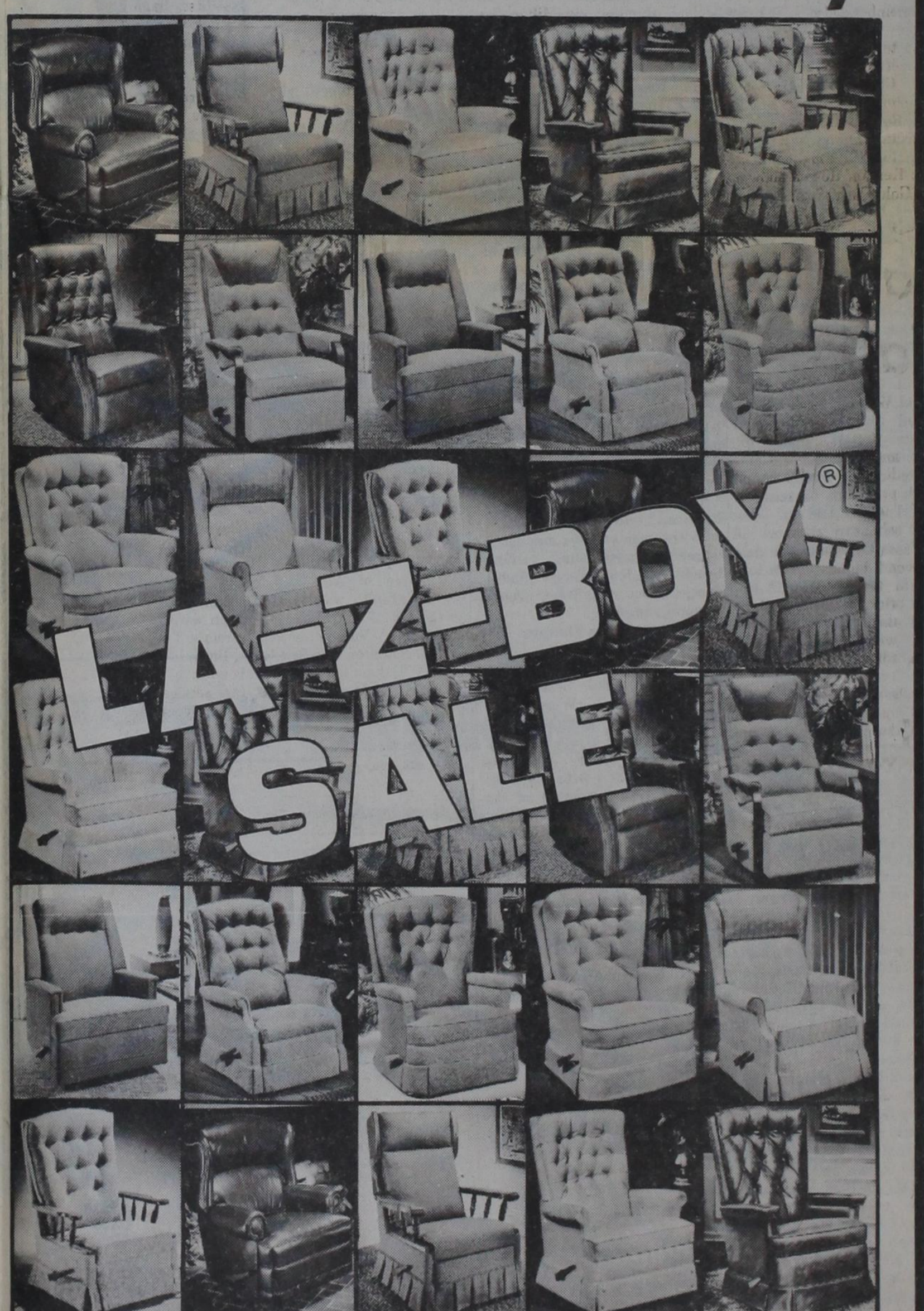

The sportsmanship award recipient, chosen by contestants, was Howell, who received a halter as the prize.

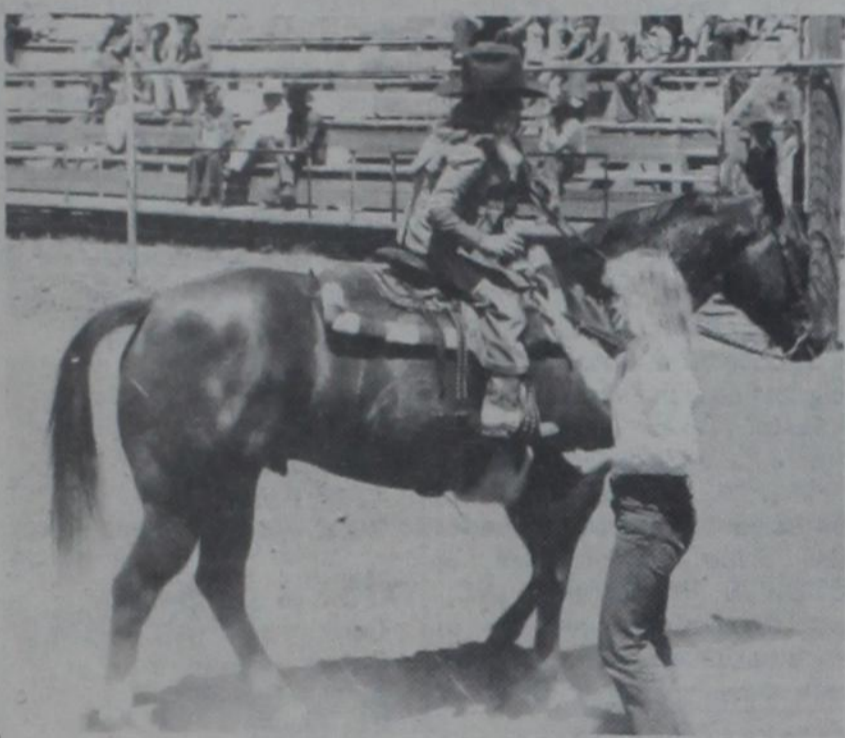

City establishes mobile-home zone

Dimmitt's city commission put the long-simmering mobile-home zoning argument to rest Monday night by establishing a new, restricted zone that opens up 12 more blocks and half of 12 others to mobile homes.

IN APPROVING the new zone, the commission rejected a petition from Mr. and Mrs. Joe Gilbreath to create a five-block, east-west "finger extension" to the original zone to enable them to buy a lot at Jones and Southwest Eighth Streets.

The commission's action climaxed an hour-long, sometimes heated discussion between those for and against the Gilbreath proposal.

Previously, mobile homes on residential lots were allowed only in the part of the Original Town that lies east of the alleyways between Fourth and Fifth Streets.

THE NEW amendment moved the allowable area westward 1 1/2 blocks, creating a new "Zone 2" bordered on the east

by the alleyways between Fourth and Fifth, on the west by Sixth Street, on the north by Halsell and on the south by South Street.

City Manager Garnett Holland said the new zone opens up 13 to 15 residential lots for mobile-home placement.

In establishing Zone 2, the commission also adopted restrictions for placement of mobile homes in the new zone. Not more than one mobile home is allowed on any individual lot; it must be a certain distance from curbs, alleys and property lines; must contain not less than 500 sq. ft. of floor space; and must be skirted, anchored and connected to utilities in accordance with the city building code and state codes governing mobile homes.

VETERAN'S SERVICES

The following news release from the Waco VA Regional Office should be of interest to veterans going abroad (or living abroad) as the summer vacation period will soon commence with the closing of this school year.

THE VETERANS Administration periodically reminds veterans that they should check with the agency before making a trip or establishing residence abroad.

A recent reminder explained that certain VA benefits cannot legally be provided in foreign countries, and knowledgeable veterans will be able to plan more wisely.

For instance, a veteran with service-connected disabilities should obtain a statement as to those disabilities from the VA office which maintains his med-

ical records. **THIS** entitles the veteran to emergency hospitalization, paid for by the VA, when the statement and a proper application for medical benefits is presented to the United States embassy or consular office in the foreign country. The application should be made within 72 hours of need, VA explained.

Only in the Philippines, at the Veterans Memorial Hospital in Manila, is care available for veterans with non-service-connected disabilities. As in the US, those veterans will be admitted to the hospital only on a space available basis and only if they are unable to afford other hospitalization, VA pointed out.

ONLY veterans who are retired from military service are eligible for medical benefits from military hospitals and clinics overseas, VA said.

der water-cooled engine which her overhauled and restored to original condition.

All are students of Woodworking Instructor Lowell Weaver and Power Mechanics Instructor Charles Cotter. The two men also co-sponsor the Industrial Arts Club, whose members work on their group projects after school.

THE I.A. CLUB'S 1931 Chevrolet was actually a triple champion in the state show. First it was named the best project at its level, then won out over all other group projects in the show, then was named the outstanding project of the show.

"They told us this was the first time a group project had ever been named the show's outstanding project," Weaver said.

The state championships carried on a tradition that has established DHS as one of the state's finest competitors in industrial arts. DHS students have now won 14 individual state championships in the last seven years, and the IA Club's state championship was its third.

TO RESTORE the 1931 Chevrolet coupe to its original finish and color, IA Club members had to duplicate each component of its wood frame, then had to conduct a worldwide search for parts.

"This car has parts from all over this part of the world—Argentina, Houston, Oklahoma City," Weaver said. "But most of the parts came from a parts house in Channel View, Texas, which specializes in antique-car parts."

Club President Jimmy Cleavinger was the parts locator for the project. He said he's still looking for rings for the motor.

THE CAR'S owner, Dan Nelson, footed the bill for the restoration and was on hand in Austin to see the classic old car named the top project in the state show.

The students' furniture projects were transported to Austin in a large gooseneck stock trailer—which was the IA Club's state championship group project last year.

The state-winning projects will be among those on display Sunday afternoon when the Industrial Arts Dept. holds its annual open house following the Baccalaureate Band Concert.

to the confusion of a country boy wondering just what is happening, or what might happen. One of the stories tells about the Senate Commerce Committee approving a boost in natural gas prices from 52 cents to \$1.60 per thousand cubic feet. Of course there were some provisions, like use of natural gas in industrial boilers would be phased out, and certain provisions on old gas and offshore gas. Even with the offer to more than triple the ceiling on gas the Natural Gas Supply Committee, representing the gas industry, was not pleased. One would assume that the action of the Senate Commerce Committee was based chiefly on the alleged gas shortage, and as a conservation measure.

Another story in the same paper told about the Texas School Land Board learning of a rich gas discovery in Wheeler County, in the Texas Panhandle, where millions of cubic feet of gas are going begging for a buyer. The story said that the only gas buyer in the area has all the gas it can handle with its pipeline. There have been other stories of discovery of major gas fields in Texas within the past year, but the claim still persists that higher prices are needed to search for offshore gas.

This is a confusing age that we live in.

15,000-sq. ft. structure will contain 896 tons of steel when completed.

Construction is on schedule, Cole added. The millhouse will be completed this summer, the new boiler and mill systems this fall, and the new refinery by the end of the year.

"**THE** construction cost is running over the original projected \$21 million," Amstar Plant Manager Doug Lapins said. "Right now our best guess is around 10 percent over."

When completed, the new plant will increase Amstar's daily grind of corn to 30,000 bushels per day. The new milling plant will be capable of producing the new Amerose liquid sweetener—a major new product on the commercial market—or shift to production of regular corn syrups or starch, depending on markets and price.

"We're expecting to see our first grind in the new mill sometime after the first of the year," Lapins said. "We've already done some of our pre-hiring for the new plant—about 20 people—and we estimate we will need about 20 more."

HE ADDED, "The people still to be hired will be process operators. Some of these will be hired and brought in from elsewhere, but we think we can train the others—which we will be doing this summer and fall."

Directors of the Amstar Corp. were here Wednesday for a quick tour of the plant site, to acquaint board members who had not seen the new structure. The corporate delegation—headed by Amstar Corp. President Robert Quittmeyer of New York and Spreckels Sugar Division President Guy Manuel of San Francisco—was en route to Phoenix for Amstar's spring board meeting.

School funding to be topic of public hearing

A chance for taxpayers to have their say on school financing is offered in a public hearing by the Special House Committee on Alternatives to Public School Financing, which will be held at 9 a.m. Monday in the Activity Center Ballroom of West Texas State University. **THIS IS** one of seven such hearings in different parts of Texas.

State Rep. Tom C. Massey is chairman of the special committee appointed by House Speaker Bill Clayton to look into revenue sources other than the real property tax for funding public schools.

With the local share of school funding increasing, pressure is put on local districts to raise ad valorem levies and this is a hardship on owners of land, homes and businesses, Clayton said in setting the hearings over the state.

THE MONDAY session at WTSU is open to anyone interested, and County Judge Weldon Bradley urged officials of schools, county and city governments, as well as area taxpayers, to attend and express their views to the committee which may draft new legislation to meet the current situation.

1. Aging is universal.

23 Hart Seniors Will Graduate Tuesday



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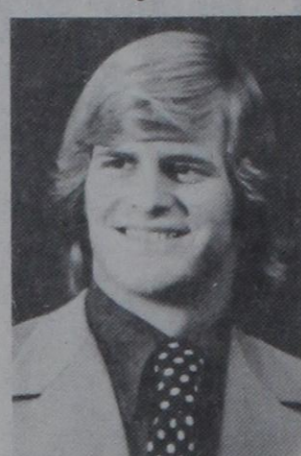
