For many years this economc shift in industry and population was moderate, from the rich and prosperous Northeast to the underdeveloped South and Southwest. As long as the shift was gradual, the effect was beneficial to the country. But now the winds of economic change are bitter cold.

A survey by the Commerce Department several years ago estimated populations, personal incomes, and unemployed for each of the states, projecting the figures to 1980 and 1990. Nine states reached their 1980 figures last year. New Mexico has already shot ahead of the 1990 projected

McGUIRE'S tenor vocal selections will include "Se Florindo e Fidele" by Scarlatti, in




