

6 COKE COUNTY WOMEN DRAWN FOR JURY DUTY

Six women have been drawn on the panel of 56 petit jurors called next Monday for duty during the third week of District Court in Coke County.

It will be the first time in history that women will see jury service in Coke County, and was made possible by a new amendment to the state constitution which makes women eligible as jurors.

Miss Zelda Caraway, Mrs. Howard Eaton, Mrs. Sid Ferrell and Mrs. T. A. Richardson of Robert Lee and Mrs. H. O. Whitt and Mrs. Otis Smith of Bronte are the women who have been drawn.

Robert Lee State Bank, and Mrs. Eaton operates her ranch south of town and is employed as a nurses aid at Coke County Hospital. Mrs. Ferrell, wife of the Robert Lee mayor, is employed in the Adams Abstract Co. which he manages. Mrs. Whitt and Mrs. Smith are housewives.

The new jury panel was drawn Jan. 13 by a jury commission made up of two men and two women. They were J. L. Brunson and Mrs. Virginia Boecking of Bronte and H. E. (Buck) Ivey and Mrs. Leola McCabe of Robert Lee.

1955 CAR TAGS NOW AVAILABLE

New 1955 motor vehicle licenses went on sale in Coke County last week. More than 50 had been issued up to Wednesday.

The 1955 tags are more attractive with black letters and numerals on a deep orange background.

Passenger car tags in Coke County will have an FT prefix, instead of the FN lettering which we have become accustomed ti the past year. Coke was allotted 1,600 passenger car licenses and they run from FT 6250 to FT7849.

Commercial truck licenses have a IY prefix and run from 10 to 324. There will be 450 licenses available for farm pickups. They have a prefix of 5R and run from 2850 to 3299.

WORK STARTS ON NEW COKE **COURT HOUSE**

Work started Monday on the construction of Coke County's new court house. A. Z. Sturges is the superintendent in charge of the project. Suggs Construction Co. of Big Spring was awarded the contract Feb. 2 on their low bid of \$270,818. A bond issue of \$300,000 was voted last fall for the new court house.

Work was begun when Fern Havins, Robert Lee dirt moving contractor, brought in two bulldozers to clear off the site. Trees, sidewalks and the stone fence were pushed off and excavation of the basement is now underway.

The basement to be located under the southeast quarter of the building will have dimensions of 40 x 75 feet and will be 12 feet

Concrete walls for the basement will be run as soon as possible, after which work will start on wall footings for the building, Mr. Sturges said. First floor of the new court house will be two feet above ground level.

Union scale will be paid all workers, ranging from \$1 for common labor to \$2.20 for carpenters. Mr. Sturges has hired a few local men, but does not expect to have any more jobs until after the basement concrete has been run.

The project is expected to require a year's time.

COUNTY FUNDS AMONG 2 BANKS

Coke County funds will be deposited in both the Bronte and Robert Lee banks in the future, following action taken by the Commissioners Court Monday.

For many years the First National Bank of Bronte has been designated as the county depository. Both institutions submitted similar bids this year, and an agreement had been reached in advance to split the deposit. In filing his bid, L. T. Youngblood, president of the Bronte bank, stated he was agreeable to the proposal to give half the deposit to the Robert Lee State Bank.

A depository is designated every two years. Four years ago and again two years ago, the Robert Lee bank's bid failed to win the necessary support. The motion taken up Monday to split the deposit carried by a 3 to 2 vote.

With the county's enormous oil development, taxing valuations have increased more than five times since 1947 and another big jump is in sight this year. Thus there are balances in most county funds now and there is a good sized deposit of county money. Several bond issues the past year have also brought in more than a million dollars. Of course the bond funds will be paid out as the projects are completed.

Monday was regular monthly meeting day for the Commissioners Court and it was a busy session. Judge Jeff Dean left the hospital to preside during the afternoon. Letting a contract for the new bridge southwest of Silver is covered in another article in this paper. The Commissioners will be back for a special session Feb. 25 when other matters of business will be taken up,in cluding opening of bids on 100 blocks of paving in the town of Bronte.

Purchase of two new pieces of road machinery were confirmed at the Monday meeting. A Caterpillar No. 12 Motor Grader was bought for use by Commissioner Claude Ditmore in Precinct 4. Price of the machine was \$15,483 and an old grader was traded in for \$6,000. Payment was made in time warrants drawing 4% interest. to be retired in installments of \$2370 over a 4-year period.

Commissioner J. W. Service bought an Adams Model 660 grader costing \$18,886, less a \$2,000 tradein for an AC grader. It will be used in Precinct 1. Time warrants were also issued. They will be paid off in annual installments of \$4,221 over the next four years.



Perkins-Prothro Co. of Wichita Falls completed No. 5-A J. W. Johnson, et al, as a new producer 20 miles northwest of Robert Lee in the Fuller-Coke Strawn Field. It is in Section 25, Block 2, H&TC Survey.

Daily potential was 241.8 barrels of 48 gravity oil, flowing through a 12-64-inch choke with 350 - 375 pounds on easing and 900-925 on tubing. Gas-oil ratio was 864-1.

Same operator completed two new wells in the Jameson-Strawn Field. No. 8-C W. C. Blanks, Section 2, Block 2, H&TC Survey, had a daily potential of 264.16 barrels of 48 gravity oil, through a 12-64inch choke with 675-750 on casing and 1150 pounds on tubing.




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

Three other bids opened were as follows: Trinity Road & Bridge Co., Dallas, \$34,506; Austin Bridge Co., Abilene, \$38,777; and C. H. Harrison, Waco, \$39,456.

School Building **Completion Set** For This Friday

Robert Lee's new school building is being completed this week and will be formally turned over to the Board of Trustees at 1 o'clock Friday afternoon.

Houston Hill of Midland was the contractor on the project which includes elementary and high school departments, as well as an auditorium to seat more than 500 persons.

Bonds of \$295,000 were voted by the district early last year. Contractors began work last May 19. Mr. Hill's firm recently was awarded school building contracts in Midland amounting to \$624,000. 

GOVERNMENT SECRECY

The following editorial recently was published in the San Angelo Standard-Times under the heading, "It's No Time for 'Creeping Secrecy' in Public Affairs." The Observer wishes to point out, however, that in Coke County that officials have cooperated in publishing quarterly reports and a detailed annual statement of county finances. The City of Robert Lee, too, publishes a complete financial statement each year and prints full texts of its ordinances We understand the Robert Lee School District has its books audited each year. The report is evidently filed away somewhere and is not made public.

Here's the S-T editorial:

There has been a mushrooming trend in recent years toward "creeping secrecy" in government -a feeling of public officials that the voters have no right to watch, and therefore judge, the official acts of the man they elect to office.

Public apathy has made it possible for public servants to close their meeting doors to the taxpayers, and to deny them the use of public records. In many Texas counties now it is impossible to determine whether the public treasury is being bled into private pockets, or the county governmental machinery is being allowed to fall into disrepair. The citizens can't attend the "executive" sessions of the elective groups, and he is met with a grumbling assent or even an outright refusal when he asks to look at county records.

In three Texas counties at least one county officer was indicted last year for criminal misconduct of office. Just as dangerous as the possibility of crookedness in office, however, is the idea that exists in the minds of many public officials that the public should not know how its business is carried on.

There are now in the legislative hopper at Austin five bills which we consider to be effective blockades to the runaway limosine of bureaucratic secrecy. Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd declared that if they had been on the statute books a few years ago, there could have been no Duval County where, he said it was worth a citizen's life to ask for the audit of county records or challenge the use of public funds.

The bills are House Bill 12, to require publication of commissioners court proceedings; H. B. 13, to require publication of annual financial statements for school, road, soil conservation and other districts; H. B. 18, to require immediate payment for the printing of citations in delinquent tax suits and proceedings for the sale of property to satisfy judgements in favor of governmental bodies; H. B. 29, to require publication of the full text of city ordinances; and H. B. 148, to make changes in the mandatory publications act to fix responsibility for causing publications to be made.

If these five bills become law, it will be virtually impossible for officials to hide behind a curtain of official secrecy. The bills not only prescribe what shall be done, but provide a penalty. An office holder is subject to forfeiture of salary and removal from office if he refuses to carry out his duty of publishing records.

In theory, the trust of public office requires its holders to conduct their duties openly. These bills make it certain that they do.
