# REV. RAY LEE

Rev. Ray Lee, 68, former Robert Lee Methodist minister, died at 2:50 p. m. Friday following a heart attack at his home in San Angelo. He became ill shortly before his death and died 10 minutes after being admitted to Shannon Hospi-

Rev. Lee and his wife moved from Rankin to San Angelo Thurslay evening. He was pastor of the Rankin Methodist Church the past year and received assignment to Day Memorial Methodist Church in San Angelo during the conference the previous week in San Antonio.

Rev. Lee suffered a heart spell while at the conference. He recovered but was taking things easy, and had little part in the operations of moving from Rankin to San Angelo.

Rev. Lee had been in the ministry about 29 years. As a young man he operated a barber shop in his home town of Wortham. He icined the Northwest conference in he Methodist Church in 1926 and transferred to the Southwest Conference in 1947. He was pastor of the Robert Lee Methodist Church four years prior to his transfer to Rankin a year ago.

Rev. Lee was born March 31, 18-87, in Wortham.
