## Notes From The Oil Field

### Byrd Discovery Finaled For 30 Bbls. Daily

Kewanec Oil Co. No. 1 W. G. Byrd Estate, 2½ miles northeast of Robert Lee, has been completed for a daily pumping potential of 30.18 barrels of oil and 28.89 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 895-1.

Production was through perforations 4,368-73 feet in Gonzales sand. Location is in the southwest corner of Section 417 on a farmout from a Union lease which expires July 7, 1955.

#### DRY HOLE

Plugged at 4,053 feet was Robert L. Wood, Midland, No. 1 R. E. Hickman, J. Johnson Survey 966½, wildcat five miles southeast of Robert Lee.

Murray No. 1 Lee, wildcat 9 miles southeast of Robert Lee, drilling the first of the week at 6,283 feet. It failed to find the lower Strawn formation where Humble recently completed a strike on the Weaver Ranch. The Lee test will continue to the Ellenburger.

### SIREN TO WARN APPROACH OF STORM DANGER

Through courtesy of the State Highway Department's Safety Division at San Angelo, and the Robert Lee Volunteer Fire Department, citizens of Robert Lee will be warned in the future of any emergency disaster, such as cyclones, tornadoes, etc.

Each person is asked to please take note of the signals as given below:

1. In event of the approach of an emergency disaster such as a cyclone, tornado, etc. there will be a continuous blast of the fire siren of 3 to 5 minutes duration, which will be a warning to take shelter or be on the alert.

2. The siren will still be blown at twelve o'clock designating the noon hour. This will be the usual short blast.

3. Two blasts in succession of the siren will be a summons to the members of the fire department only.

The City Commission is grateful to these departments for their help in setting up this warning system for the public and they ask the people for their full cooperation.

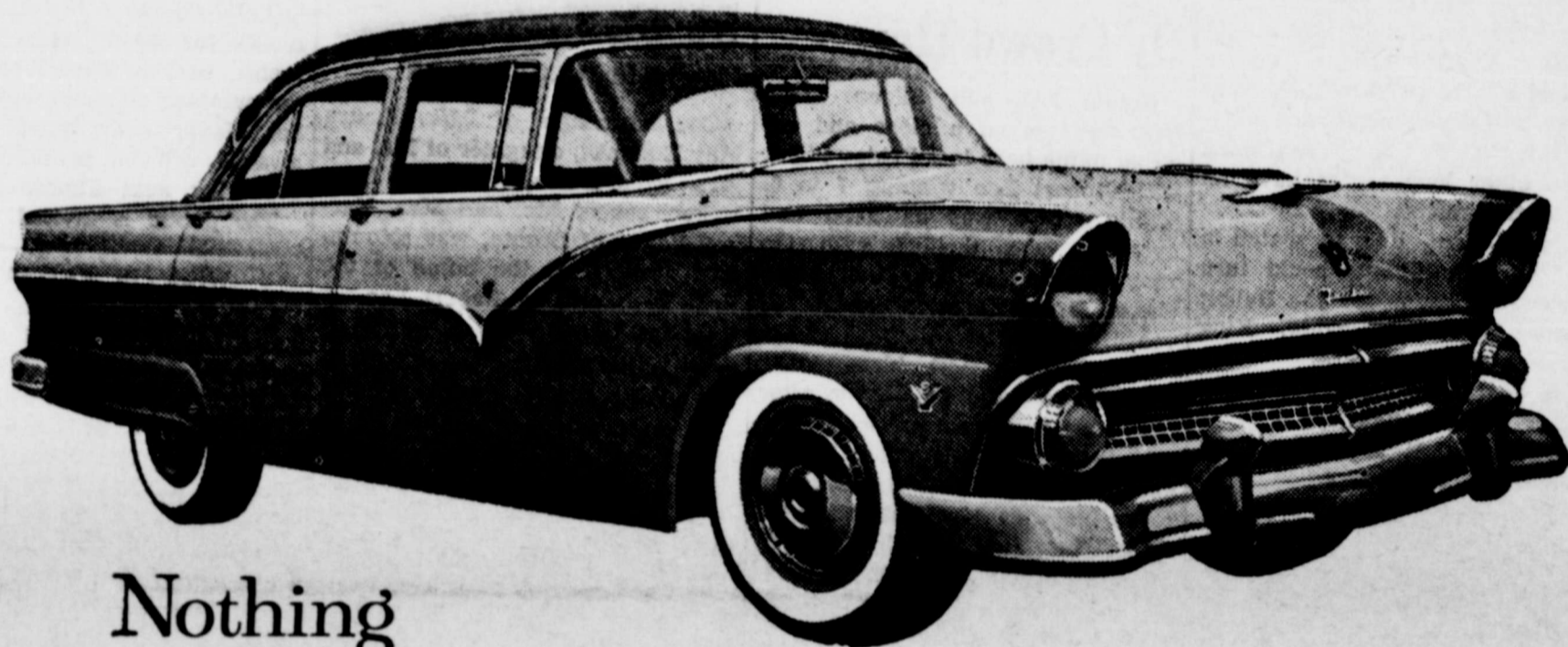

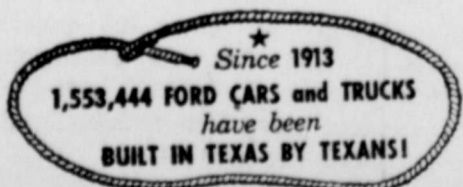

Bruce Allen has his Little Leaguers rounding into shape and Howard Varnadore has taken over management of the Pony League,

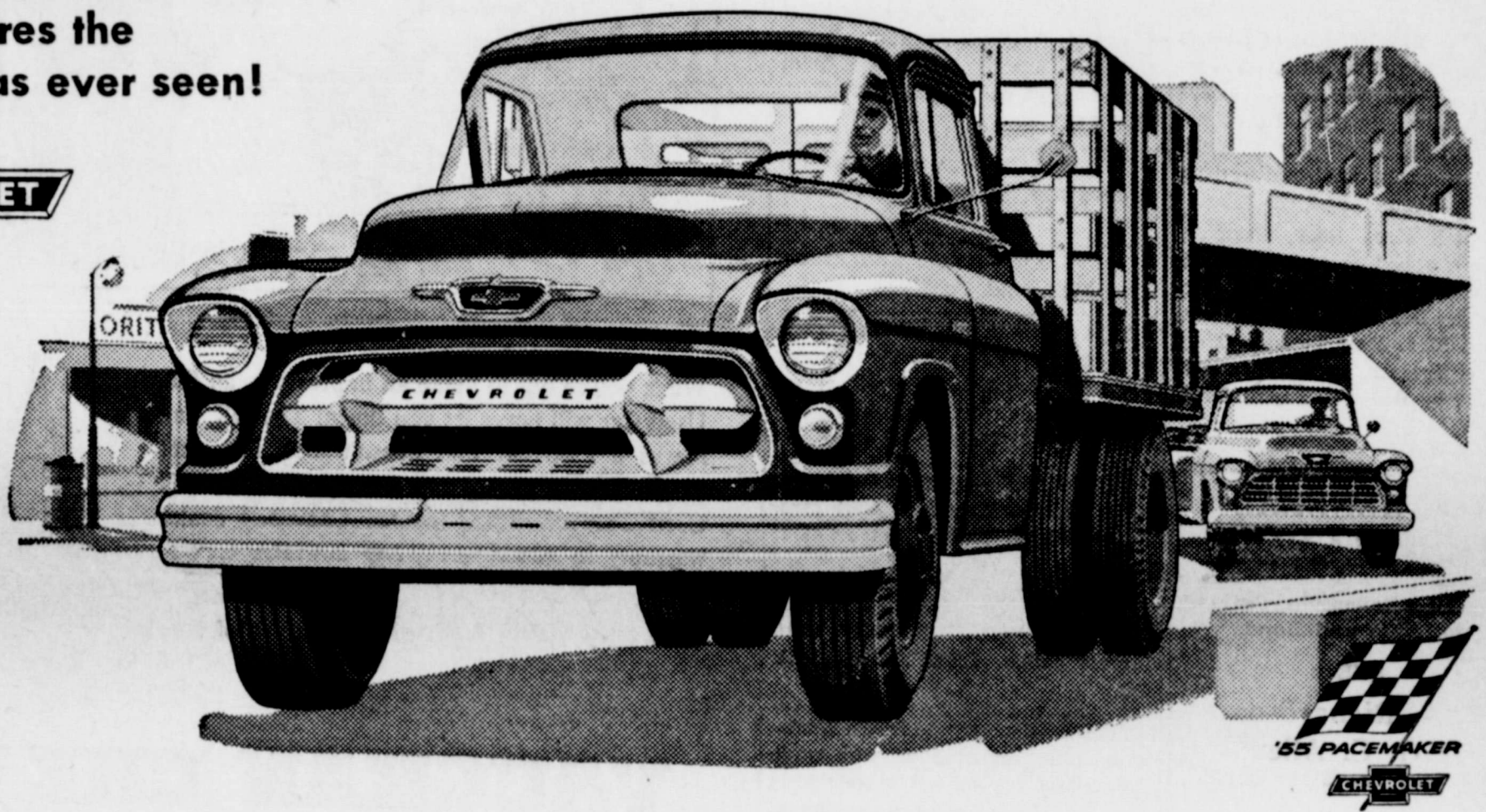
which includes boys too old for Little League competition. A lot of games will be scheduled with outside clubs.
