



Jerrel Clint Harmon, son of Mr. and Mrs. Crowley Harmon, is to be awarded the Lone Star Farmer Degree at the State FFA Convention July 20, 21, 22 in Houston.

The award will be presented at the Lone Star Farmer Banquet in Houston Memorial Colsieum honoring boys who advanced to that degree this year.

Of 43,000 boys enrolled in Vocational Agriculture throughout the state only 800 met the qualifications to advance to State Farmers. This is the highest degree awarded by the State FFA Association. The highest degree, the American Farmer Degree, is awarded by the National Association in Kansas City, Mo.

To be eligible a boy must have been a FFA member for 24 months, show outstanding scholastic and leadership ability, and have earned from his project program at least \$500 and have it invested in a productive program. Only the upper 2% of the boys in the entire state are eligible to apply.



God as people possessed of a common need; learning to live as we are expected to live.

And I go because my community needs the Church, and it needs it as an active influential member of society. If my community and nation are to live, then my Church must be awake and vigorously working to establish those principles of righteousness and truth on which alone a nation can endure. And though I'm just one and can't do much, I can do something! And the movement has got to start with someplace. Why not with me?



In making the plea, Richey pointed out that no previous special training is required. "A Ground Observer Corpsman must be able to see, hear and speak distinctly," he stated.
