Second shots of Salk vaccine to prevent polio will be given to Coke County first and second grade pupils in the near future.

Dr. J. D. McDaniel advised The Observer that pupils from Silver have been requested to come to the hospital here between 1 and 2 on Thursday and Friday of this week.

Pupils from the Robert Lee school are to report at the hospital between 1 and 2 next Tuesday.

A supply of vaccine has been delivered to Dr. John R. Harris of Bronte for inoculation of youngsters in the eastern part of the county.

Only those pupils who received the first shots in May will be eligible for second shots, Dr. Mc-Daniel stated.

ROBERT TUBB DROWNS SELF AT BLACKWELL

Robert Tubb, 74, retired stock farmer of Blackwell and former Silver resident, drowned Wednesday in Oak Creek Lake near Blackwell. Justice of the Peace C. E. Bruton of Bronte, presiding over a coroner's inquest, and returned a verdict of suicide by drowning.

According to relatives Mr. Tubb left his home around 8 o'clock Wed nesday morning to get his mail and purchase some washing powder. When he did not return for some time, his wife became worried and asked friends and neighbors to search for him.

Later it was learned that he was seen walking south along the railroad track, and the search was centered in that direction. It continued to his favorite fishing spot on an inlet to the lake where his hat, a daily newspaper and a package of washing powder were discovered on the bank.

Steps were immediately taken to drag the lake and divers helped with the search. The body was recovered about 1:30 p. m. in water ten feet deep.

Sheriff Paul Good assisted in conducting the inquest and a dozen witnesses were of the opinion that Mr. Tubb had voluntarily walked off into the deep water. There had been no persons seen in that area during the day.

It is believed that Robert was despondent over ill health.

The body was removed to a funeral home in Roscoe in a Clift ambulance.
