The anniversary was sponsored by the Garvin's six children and Mrs. Garvin's sister, Mrs. Mary Weir of San Angelo. All the children and their families were present except one grand daughter. There are nine grand children and one great grandchild.

The children are Homer Garvin of Eldorado, Mrs. Robert Schaefer and Rush Garvin of San Angelo, Mrs. O. V. Wallace and Mrs. C. J. Zelachoski of Cleburne, and Eddy Garvin of Edith.

Joseph Edward Garvin and Agnes V. Pearl Keeney were married in Eldorado Aug. 16, 1905. Their families were among the earliest settlers in Schleicher County. The ceremony was performed at 9 a. m. by the county judge. Commissioners Court was in session, so the judge came outside and married the young couple as they sat in their buggy.

They first lived on a farm owned by Mr. Garvin's father. It cost only \$30 to buy a stove, dishes and other furnishings for the oneroom house. Mrs. Garvin's father, J. T. Keeney, was in the mercantile business at Eldorado. They had moved there from Bell County in 1902. Mr. Garvin was born in Boone County, Ark., and came to Texas with his parents at the age of three. They moved up to Schlicher from Blanco County in 1897.

In 1911 Mr. and Mrs. Garvin went to Pecos County where they leased some school land, but returned to Eldorado in 1915. For the next few years Joe operated a wagon freight line from Eldorado to San Angelo. They lived at Menard from 1927 to 1934 when they leased the Cummings 3-sectoin ranch a few miles west of Edith. This has been their home the past 21 years.

D. MIDDLETON LOSES DAMAGE CASE IN COURT

A jury in district court here this week refused to award damages to Dan Middleton from Fred Roe in a litigation arising over loss of cattle.

Back in 1953 Middleton pastur-Sept. 17 as the date of a road bond ed 135 head of mixed cattle on the Roe ranch near Robert Lee, and when they were rounded up a few months later, Middleton claimed 30 head were missing.

The plaintiff did not allege Roe had taken the animals, but contended it was his responsibility to see that they were properly cared. for. Testimony injected into the trial was to the effect that the cattle may have drowned when the Colorado River went on a rampage in August of that year. Mildleton sought damages of \$2,220. the approximate value of the 30 head of missing livestock.

Aug. 19, 1955 Bond Election In Precinct 3 Set for Sept. 17

Too Much Weight Can Kill You As You Grow Older

AUSTIN - Friend, if you're 40 and fat, this is for you: pass up the candied yams and boiled potatoes and cream-filled toothsome tidbits that spell extra pounds and an early grave.

State health authorities can quote chapter and verse as to why too much weight can kill you as you grow older. It increases the liklihood of diabetes, contributes to high blood pressure, is associated with hardening of the arteries and with various heart di-

Besides influencing these conditions, extra weight means impaired vigor, increased fatiguability, liver breakdown, greater surgical risk, and greater danger of complications from otherwise minor

"There's just no doubt about obesity being one of the biggest problems to be faced after 40," these authorities say. "The more overweight you are, the poorer are your chances of living to a ripe old age."

Are you as much as 25 percent overweight? People in your group die at a rate 75 percent higher than the rate for pepole of normal weight.

If you're still gravitating toward the pastry tray, maybe this will slow you down. Despite the generat excellence of medical care in this country, men and women over 45 die at a rate of 25 percent higher than do Western Europeans of the same age group. And the reason is nothing more than galloping appetites.

Poor food habits among older people complicate the problem of obesity, health officials believe. Those who live alone have no incentilve to eat sensibly. They snack on fattening rather than wholesome foods.

Others have no knowledge of food nutrition. Still other rationalize their obesity by slinging to the belief that stoutness is a mark of distinction. But health officials know that each pound of extra flesh means fewer years of

Here are the State Department of Health's suggestions for avoiding fat after 40:

1. Drink plenty of water, and center your diet on milk, fruits, vegetables, bread and whole grain cereals, with modest amounts of eggs and meat.

2. Limit your use of sugar, alcohol and fats. Use brown sugar and dark molasses. Choose fruits such as apples for dessert, and insist that meals afford both milk and coffee, rather than milk or coffee.

3. Use dry brewer's yeast and wheat germ rather than synthetic vitamins. Use whole wheat, dark rye, or soya-enriched breads.

4. Use dry skimmed milk if you cannot afford evaporated or whole milk.

But most important of all, keep that appetite under control.
