Warning Issued Against Hatch By Leafworms

It looks like at least a part of the county will have a large leaf-worm hatch by the end of the week. Leafworms have been building at a steady rate for about 3 weeks and in a good many fields they have ragged cotton up until about all of the leaf area left is needed. With a large hatch of eggs coming about Thursday or Friday, it looks like control measures will have to be used.

A farmer asked me the other day just how important the leaf was to the plant and how much he could afford to let the worm eat before attempting to control them. To my knowledge this can't be answered specifically, but all plant food is manufactured in the plant leaf. When you lose too much of the leaf area you can't expect the plant to go on and mature a heavy crop of bolls.

If some of the bolls are opening and no longer draining the plant, you can sometimes spare a lot of the leaf area because demands on the plant are not as heavy as they have been. Right now I would say that you should get ready to poison if you have lost 10% or more of the leaf area and if you have a new hatch just starting.

The life cycle of the leaf worm is very similar to that of the boll-worm. A light tan miller lays the eggs usually on the under side of the leaf. They are usually blue green in color and flat, like a pancake, but may be white. They are just a little smaller than a pin head. The bollworm egg is about the same size but is round. The leafworm hatches in from 3 to 5 days under good conditions.

The small worm feeds on the under side of the leaf for several days before it starts eating completely through the leaf. This is a good time to find them and can be done easily by looking for the white or clear places on the leaves. After about two to three weeks the worms web up on the plant where they remain for about one week. They leave the web as a miller and the cycle starts again.

The leafworm can be controlled very readily with toxaphene-D. D. T., Endrin, or Parathion. D. D. T. alone does not give control.

Santa Fe Line To Silver Gets Final Approval

SILVER, Aug. 16 — The Interstate Commerce Commission today authorized the Santa Fe Railroad to build a 20-mile track extension to link Maryneal with Silver.

The spur, to be built by the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient Railway, will service the Texas Natural Gasoline Corp.'s new plant here. When completed the gasoline plant expects to ship 25 carloads a day. The plant draws gas from 200 wells.

The project was opposed by the Texas & Pacific Railway. This railroad has a railhead at Colorado City and said the new spur would cause it a loss of traffic.

At present Silver is serviced by truck at railheads at Colorado City and Bronte, where Santa Fe has a station.

The commission ruled that some business would be diverted from the T & P, but that the proposed line appeared to be required by public convenience and necessity.

The ICC directed that construction start before Oct. 1, with completion before April 1, 1956. Surveyors are already at work on the 20-mile line which begins in Nolan County and reaches just inside the Coke County line near the corner of Mitchell County.

An ICC hearing on the line was held in Dallas in May. At that time it was estimated the line would cost \$1,450,000.

The Panhandle and Santa Fe Railway will operate the line. Both it and the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient are Santa Fe subsidiaries.

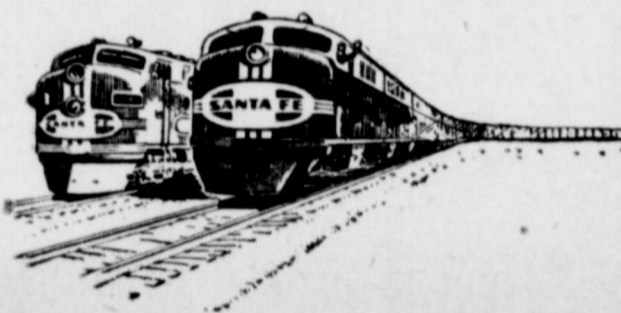

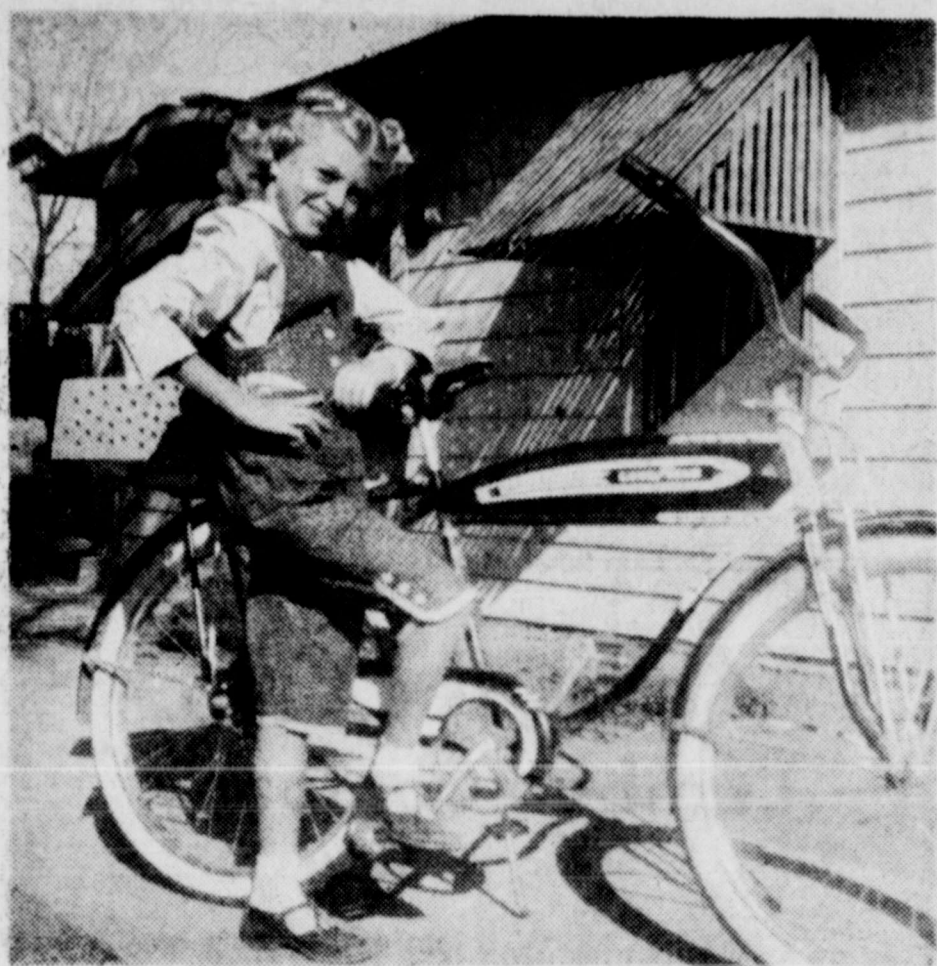

Notes From The Oil Field

McCabe Wildcat Has Oil Show

W. H. Black, et al, Midland No. 1 Fred McCabe, Coke County Ellenburger wildcat in 311-2-H&TC, six miles southwest of Robert Lee, surfaced gas, and recovered salt water and shows of oil and gas on a drillstem test in the Palo Pinto, topped at 5,456 feet on elevation of 2,043 feet.

On the two-hour test between 5,460-5,500 feet, there was a good blow of gas for 45 minutes. Recovery was 170 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud, 100 feet of salt water-cut mud and 70 feet of salt water. Flowing pressures was 0-235 pounds; 15-minute shut-in pressure, 1,885 pounds; and hydrostatic pressure, 2,625-2,580 pounds.

DAVIDSON 7,000 FEET

The wildcat being drilled on Elbert Davidson, southwest of Edith, had reached a depth of 7,00 feet this week. Rumors of oil shows have not been confirmed.

WHEREAS, heretofore on the 1st day of August, 1955, the Commissioners' Court passed an order fixing a time and place for a hearing on said Petition, to-wit: August 17, 1955, and directed the County Clerk to issue a notice of such time and place of hearing to inform all persons concerned of their rights to appear at such hearing and to contend for or protest against the order of such election; and

WHEREAS, the County Clerk has heretofore executed said notice by posting true copies of said order of hearing in three public places within said Road District No. 3 of Coke County, Texas, and another copy thereof at the Courthouse door of said County for ten days prior to the date fixed for the hearing, and said notice has also been published in a newspaper of general circulation in said Road District No. 3 of Coke County, Texas, namely the 'Robert Lee Observer, Robert Lee, Texas', one time on the 5th day of August, 1955, which was at least five days prior to the date fixed for said hearing; and

WHEREAS, this Court, having met at the time and place set for the hearing of said Petition, proceeded to hear such Petition and all matters in respect to the proposed bond election, to hear the contentions for and protest against the calling of such election, and it is found by the Court that the said Petition is signed by at least fifty (50) of the qualified electors who own taxable property in Road District No. 3 of Coke County, Texas, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, and that the notice required by law to be given of said hearing has been given; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the hearing held on said date and from the evidence submitted at said hearing, the Court has determined that the proposed improvements would be for the benefit of all taxable property situated in such Road District No. 3 of Coke County, Texas, and that it is desirable and necessary to issue the bonds of said Road District No. 3 of Coke County in the amount of \$62,000.00, to construct said improvements and that said election should be ordered; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners'

Court further finds that the amount of said proposed bond issue, together with all outstanding bonds heretofore issued on the faith and credit of Road District No. 3 of Coke County will not exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of said District; and

WHEREAS, said Road District No. 3 of Coke County, Texas, has heretofore been legally created by order of the Commissioners' Court, duly entered on the 5th day of April, 1937;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF COKE COUNTY, TEXAS:

1. That an election be held in said Road District No. 3 of Coke County, Texas, on the 17th day of September, 1955, which is not less than thirty days from the date of this order, to determine:

Whether or not the bonds of said Road District No. 3 of Coke County, Texas, shall be issued in an amount not to exceed Sixty Two Thousand (\$62,000.00) Dollars, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed Three and one-half (3-1/2%) per cent per annum, and maturing at such time as may be fixed by the Commissioners' Court serially or otherwise in not to exceed Twenty (20) years from the date thereof for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof throughout Road District No. 3 of Coke County, Texas, and whether or not taxes shall be levied annually on all taxable property in said Road District sufficient to pay the annual interest on said bonds to provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the bonds at their maturities.

2. The metes and bounds of Road District No. 3 of Coke County, are set forth in the order fixing the time and place of hearing on the Petition for the issuance of bonds which was passed on the 1st day of August, 1955.

3. The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 16, Acts of the First Called Session of the Thirty-Ninth Legislature.

4. 8. The County Clerk is hereby ordered and directed to post said notices and to cause same to be published as hereinabove directed. Further orders by this Court are reserved until the returns of said election executed by the duly authorized election officers, are received by this Court.
