The Abilene High School Sophomores struck hard and fast to register 21 points in the second quarter, and then fought off the Robert Lee Steers who had it in high gear playing catch-up to eke out a 21-19 victory in Robert Lee.

Early in the second quarter Abilene lit up the scoreboard first. John McMahan richocheted off a Steer defender at the line of scrimmage and spinning beautifully raced 31 yards for the touchdown. Travis Watson added the conversion on an end-around play and Abilene owned a 7-0 advantage.

Robert Lee was quick to counter as Freddie Ashworth took a pitchout, ran out of running room on one sideline, reversed his field and was off on a spectacular 60-yard sprint to paydirt.

Robbie Don Godwin plunged for the extra point, but the clock ran out and the final score read Sophomores 21, Robert Lee 19.

Abilene netted 12 first downs and 21 yards total offense. Robert Lee mustered 9 first downs and 287 yards total offense.
