Coke County's new court house 85% completed, states J. P. Mc-Swain, who is closely connected with the project as a representalive of Architect Wyatt C. Hedrick.


Further delay was recently causd by a shipment of material used setting the steel framed windows. The material was off-size and had to be replaced by the factory in Michigan.

Casing Run For Completion Of Havins Wildcat

Miami Operating Co., Inc. of Abilene was waiting on cement after setting 5½-inch casing at 5,-370 feet for completion attempt in Strawn lime at its No. 1-A P. H.
