Following is the amendment to the constitution:
"Art. 8, 16a. In any county
having a population having a population of less than
ten thousand $(10,000)$ inhabitants, as determined by the last preyeding census of the United States, the Commissioners Court may subthe Commissioners Court may sub-
mit to the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county at paying voters of such county at
an election the question of adding an Assessor-Collector of Texas to the list of authorized county officials. If a majority of such votens voting in such election shall approve of adding an AssessorCollector of Taxes to such list, then such officials shall be elected at the next General Election for such Constitutional term of office as is provided for other Tax Assessors-Collectors in this state.
