## SUN INCREASES **CAPACITY AT** SILVER PLANT

Sun Oil Company's gas department has a good sized construction project under way in the Jameson field at Silver.

Two new compressor stations are being built to inject gas back into the oil formation, thus conserving gas that might have to be flared and also insuring a longer period of oil production.

The plant on the Homer Jameson lease is nearing completion. Work is underway on a similar plant on H. L. Bloodworth. Both of the new plants are equipped with 440 h. p. compressors.

The contract was let to W. H. Bowden Construction Co. of Odessa, who will also handle some new work at Jameson natural gasoline plant. John Shimer, Jr., Sun gas department superintendent, says a refrigeration compressor is to be installed and other facilities added in order that additional liquids can be taken from natural gas.

At present only casing head gasoline and butane gas are manufactured at the Jameson plant. Propane will be added to the output when new facilities are installed. Pipe lines are now being layed from Jameson plant to Sun's loading rack three miles north on the R. S. Anderson place where tank cars can be loaded on the new Santa Fe spur which was extended from Maryneal to Silver.

Some confusion has resulted in the matter of safety inspection. It is not required that you have your car inspected before you can purchase new license plates. However, the deadline for getting a 1956 safety sticker is April 15.

# SET CAMPAIGN FOR PASSAGE **OF PARK BONDS**

Plans for conducting an active campaign in behalf of the proposed county parks and swimming pools projects were discussed at a meeting of interested citizens Monday night.

A study of the park and swim pool needs of the community was started several months ago by a Robert Lee Board of Community Development Committee headed by Bob Vaughan. Later the Bronte Lions Club became interested and the civic groups have worked with city officials in the two towns.

It was their plan to present the project to the Commissioners Court since any sizeable program. to provide recreational facilities would have to be done on a county wide basis. Neither Bronte nor Robert Lee have city funds sufficient for this purpose, while Coke County is now getting lots of tax money from oil properties. Engineer W. W. Greif was called

upon to make preliminary plans and estimates, which included new parks and pools at Bronte and Robert Lee. The estimated cost was \$130,000.

Petition bearing 216 names were presented to the Commissioners Court requesting that a special election be called to vote on a bond issue. The election has been set for April 7.

**Over River Here** 

Heavy steel I-beams to be used in completing the new Colorado River Bridge at Robert Lee arrived this week. Their shipment had been delayed since December because of a strike.

First truck load of steel reached here at 6 p. m. Wednesday from Bethlehem steel plant at Beaumont. It consisted of seven 39-foot beams, weighing a total of more than 31,000 pounds.

Forty-eight steel beams will be used in the bridge, some of them being 59 feet in length.

Footing and approaches for the new structure have been finished for some time. D. M. Ferrier, superintendent for the contractor, Wes-Tex Construction Co. of Borger, says the river bridge should now be completed in the matter of a few weeks.

His company has had a state contract for Highway 208 work which totaled \$281,000. Besides the new river bridge, a relief bridge and a big fill across the river bottom here, they made a number of pavement changes between Sanco and Silver. Black topping of the new work in the upper end of the county was under way this week.

Wes-Tex is building the new Pecan Creek Bridge in Precinct 3 and this week was awarded a state contract to build a new road from a point 4 miles northest of Bronte to Wilmeth.





ENTERS INSURANCE FIELD

R. C. (Dick) Dodd, who recently resigned as Silver school principal and coach, announces that he will engage in the insurance business. He has signed a contract as an underwriter for Oil Industries Life Insurance Co. of Houston and will work in Coke and Runnels counties. He has already started work and will devote full time to his new position after school is out. Dick has been in school work four years.

Oil Industries Life was organized two years ago and set a new all time record by writing 30 million dollars of insurance during its first year. Indications are that the company will have 100 millions of insurance in force by the time it has been in operation 30 months. Some of the stock of Oil Industries Life is owned by Coke County people.

#### **No Connection** In License Tags And Inspection


There is no connection between the purchase of automobile license tags and the safety inspection of passenger vehicles, Executive Director G. C. Morris of the Highway Safety Council of Texas reminded motorists today.

"One reported reason for the delay of some motorists in having their automobiles inspected this year seems to be a misunderstanding about new license plates and safety inspection stickers being issued together," Morris said. "There is no connection whatsoever."

Deadline for purchase of 1956 license plates is April 1, Morris pointed out, and the inspection deadline is April 15.

"It is not necessary," he added, "to show any certificate of inspection to secure license plates."

Morris reported that the Highway Safety Council's continuing check of authorized inspection stations indicated that inspections had increased rapidly during the first two weeks of March but, he added, "any motorist who waits until April for the safety inspection will face a long waiting line."



#### New '56 Texas **Highway Maps** Now Available

AUSTIN, TEXAS - The new 1956 edition of the Official Highway Travel Map is now available. D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer, announced in Austin today.

The map has many new features and contains a wealth of information on Texas, Greer said. Most of the topographical relief was removed from the map last year so that more essential information can be read easily and quickly. The growth of the Texas Highway System at the rate of about 3,000 a year has made it necessary to gradually remove some of the less important information to make room for the increased mileage, he said.

In addition to the highways and the mileages between various points, the Travel Map shows state parks with recreational faicilities W. H. Black, et al, No. 1 Lenn historical state parks, roadside parks, altitudes, and the Highway Travel Information Bureaus. The pictorial side of the map features scenes of general interest both to Texans and out-of-state tourists, with every section of the state represented.

## **DROUTH COMPELS FARMERS TO** LOOK FOR NEW ENTERPRISES

By JACK B. WAIDE County Agent

The Department of Agricultural Economics at Texas A & M has compiled the Agricultural Census for the years of 1930, 1940, 1950 and 1955. This information is available for only 33 counties in Texas and we are fortunate to have been selected with the first group of counties to use this information in studying trends and needs in the county.

This information will eventually be available for all counties in the state, but the length of the report and the limited manpower means that some counties will probably be another three years getting the 42-tf | information.

> I am sure you will be interested to know that the number of farms in Coke County has decreased from 838 in 1930 to 419 in 1954. Average acreage of course has doubled and now stands at 1304. Livestock numbers have dropped 34 percent from 1930 to 1954 and the best estimate that could be obtained indicates another 10 percent drop since the figures for the 1955 census were obtained.

> Gross income on over 300 of our 419 farms and ranches was less than \$2500.00 dollars in 1954. This all sounds pretty bad, but there has been a steady increase in percentage of land owned by the operators, and a decline in tenancy and we had 206 families who made more money off of the farm than on the farm in 1954.



information. Other phases of the census will be discussed in future articles.

Cash crops have never played a very important part in the economy of Coke County at least on census years. This of course is not true on every farm in the county and this should not be expected to fit individual farms, but only the county as a whole. Several conclusions can be drawn from this information. The first is that we need new enterprises

in the county. One look at our livestock numbers and at our pastures shows that we can't look to more livestock for additional income. The best chance we have to make a substantial gain in income must be new enterprises. The other important means of increasing income is to do a better job of managing the enterprises we have on the farms at this time. We are blessed in that we have outstanding examples of both right here in the county. It is my good fortune to have the opportunity to observe the operations of a large number of families in the county.

I plan to do a series of articles on what a few of these families are doing to get by in years which have been the toughest in two decades. I sincerely hope some of you will get some ideas from these articles which will be helpful to you. We have many families who are doing an inspirational job and no attempt will be made to write about all of them. My only purpose is to pass on ideas to you which appear to be

"I think a lot more of the little grass that I have than Prickle Pear," said Will Fikes, district cooperator with Soil Conservation, while looking at a good growth of black grama. "Two years ago when I was burning pear, I always left all bunches of pear that had grass growing in them. I believe that nature put grass here to protect the soil and provide livestock feed. I do not believe that it was ever intended to use prcikle pear for stock feed" Fikes added. "I am convinced that if we will keep out livestock in balance with our feed, we will get more benefit out of the rain that we receive and we will be able to cushion the effects of low rainfall." Dwain Leonard Completed 6 miles of terraces on his farm in the Wild Cat Community this week. The terrace system is being constructed as a part of Leonard's complete coordinated soil, water and plant conservation plan to treat each acre according to its needs. The plan was developed by Leonard with the assistance of SCS technicians. Dee Smith is working on his irrigation system. The system is a level border and developed to make more efficient use of irrigation water. Design and layout was worked up by SCS technicians. Fred Ashworth, livestock farmer at Edith, recently completed a 3,000 cubic yard pond. The pond will provide better distribution of livestock water. The water will be 14 feet deep when the pond is full Landowners and poerators can do a fair job of controlling wind erosion on their fields by doing a good job of chiseling their land. The chisels rough up the surface and leave it cloddy. The chisel furrows should be done on the contour. This will help wind erosion and increase water intake when rain is received. The water intake can be doubled if the soil is ready to soak up water when it falls.
