

1891 Rustlers Found in Old Cornerstone

Three copies of the Coke County Rustler and a few other relics were found when the cornerstone of the old court house was removed last week.

The various items had been placed in a hole in the stone and were protected only by cement. It was evident that water had seeped into the enclosure and damaged the papers.

County officials took charge of the relics and placed them under glass where they are on display in the basement corridor.

One issue of the Rustler was dated April 4, 1891, and was printed at Hayrick just before the court house was moved to Robert COKE GAINS Lee. Two successive issues, dated May 9 and May 16 had been printed in Robert Lee, according to the date line carried on the first page.

The Newspaper, whose name was changed to The Observer a few years later, was owned by J. S. Brady and W. V. Ervin. A business card enclosed in the cornerstone indicated the editors were also real estate and loan agents and were engaged in a general land and livestock brokerage busi-

Very little local news was carried, but there were columns of state and national information. Most of the advertisements were from firms at Ballinger, Sweetwater, Colorado City and San An-

Ballinger & Hayrick U. S. mail and stage line advertised fares at \$2.50 or \$4.00 a roundtrip. Stages departed from Ballinger and Hayrick at 7 a.m. daily and reached their destinations at 5 p.m.

Pearce Hotel at Ballinger advertised rates of \$1.00 per day or meals and lodging at 25c each. Their service included waking up guests and meeting all trains.

The Rustler was started at Hayrick in the summer of 1890.

A few pages of manuscript written with ink, was hardly legible. R. R. Smith's name appeared on some of the papers as County

Other articles uncovered included coins, a small pocket knife, pencil, etc. One of the nickels was dated 1867, two others were made in 1890.

At present, the telephone comany officials and employees dealg with such things have been orking out a map showing the eas they would be willing to art with, and it is expected that is map will be ready, with final mpany approval within a short

The committee of rural people s secured a telephone engineer ho agreed without cost or oblition, to make a preliminary esmate and study of the project the local people, which study d estimate will be available to administrative offices of the EA in this area, at Lubbock and Fort Worth.

It has not been possible to tell cal people just what their teleone monthy rentals would be in REA set-up, and will not be ssible until the final, thorough timate is complete.

As soon as this is definite enough that the committee can submit mething tangible to the rural ephone subscribers, they expect call another general meeting d make a report to them, at ich time this committee will ve completed its work, and it ll be up to the subscribers and prospective subscribers involvto decide how much further ey wish to go into the matter, d what sort of organization, mmittees, and so forth, are eeded to carry it on.

This has taken quite a lot of eetings and talking back and rth to get the proposition to this age. As matters now stand, if e company makes us a proposion which appears feasible to the EA officials who assist in prering these applications for ans, the necessary organization n be formed and the application

After this it will have to go to ashington for approval. If and ben the loan is approved, the tes involved can be bought and work begun on construction of e REA system.

As some of us who have been orking on the proposition see it, whole thing is apt to depend how much area the company is lling to turn over and at what ice. The lines are admittedly , the posts are not usable in rge number, and would in the ain have to go at strictly salvage

The committee has held many eetings, some members have ade several trips and numerous ephone calls. The details of such transaction are tedious, and can moved only so fast, where a big mpany, a big government, and good many people are involved. A lot of effort has been made d is still being made to make possible in some way for the ral people around Robert Lee have a telephone service that ey can afford. The movement to ablish an REA was begun when ecame apparent that many peo-

ple would have to build tap lines at a cost that was completely out of their reach, and that thus the number of telephone subscribers in rural communities would be so cut down that the few phones left in each community would not be very valuable so far as talking around the community was con-

There has not been any campaign of anger against any one. We have simply been trying to work out a difficult situation one which company officials freely admit has been a difficult problem for them, as drouth and other factors have left the country more sparsely settled, and as the cost of construction has increased.

As soon as the company has given us a final and definite word be able to bring to the rural subscriber in the west side of Coke county a proposition definite enough so he will know what he wants to do about it.




