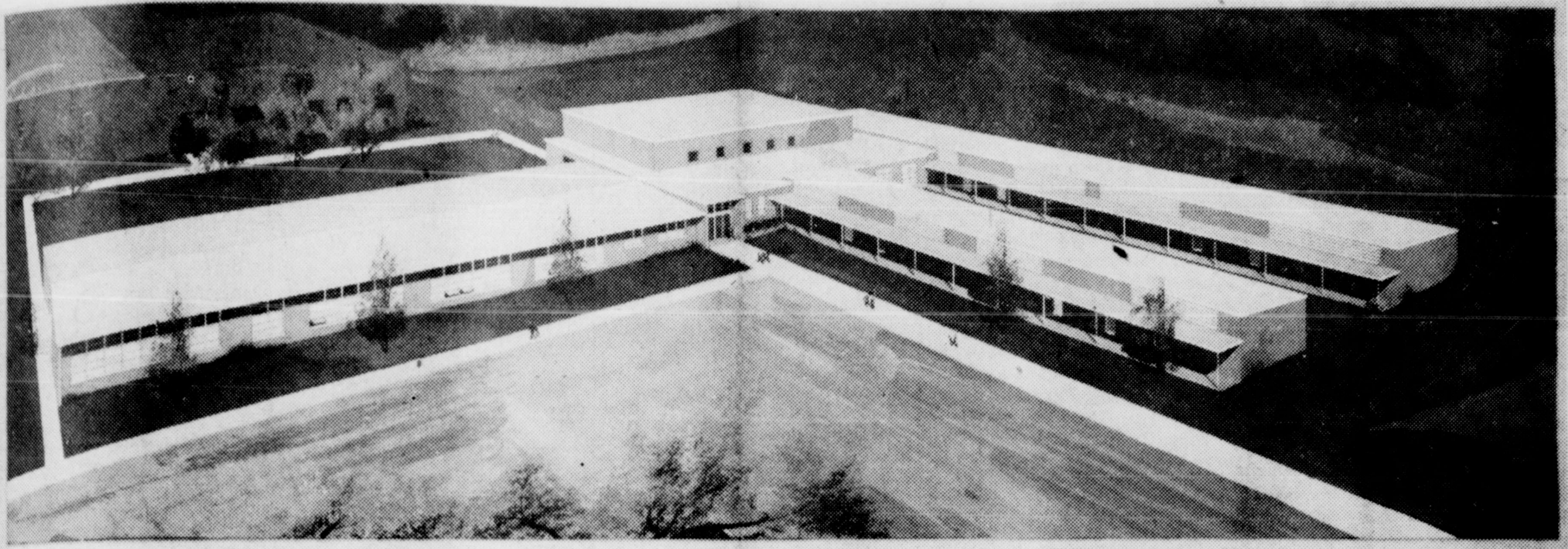

## STEERS OPEN GRID SEASON FRIDAY NIGHT

Robert Lee Steers open the football season Friday night when they entertain Lueders. The teams have had only two weeks of drill, but will be expected to put up an interesting contest.

The Steers opened last year at Lueders and came home with the short end of a 40-12 score. Lueders developed one of the best teams in this area, but they are not likely to be so strong this season. Lueders lost more than half last year's starters by graduation and also have a new coach.

Robert Lee is out for revenge, having remembered that Lueders kept its first team in most of the game last fall, and really poured it on the undermanned Steer club.

Prospects for a winning team are the brightest in Robert Lee for several seasons. Only three lettermen graduated last spring and the entire backfield is intact. Coach C. D. Manire is starting his second year with the Steers. Fans recall he started from scratch in 1955 and developed a club that won a tie for district honors and was selected to go to the bi-district playoff.

Manire says he has seven backfield men with Tom Sawyer running the plays from the quarterback post. Robbie Don Godwin returns as the hard charging fullback and tips the scales at 190 pounds this year (in uniform.) Halfbacks are Fred Ashworth, Fred McDonald, Jr., Don Stewart, Sammy Joe Duncan and Gary Jackson.

Co-Capt. Jack Gray has been shifted from end to center, with W. H. Wyatt, Dale Dean, Leslie Hatfield and Bobby Cowley at the guards. Tackles are Delton Chatham, Sam Ed Skipworth, Melvin Duncan and Wade Anderson. Playing the end positions will be Richard Dumas, Troy Walls, Byron Russell and Jerry Tinkler. Don Stewart may also be used as an offensive end.

Manire has been shifting his boys around considerably on offense and defense. Present plans are to use Sawyer and McDonald only on offense, while Gray may be used as a defensive end.

Every man on the squad is reported in good condition, except Sammy Duncan, who is recovering

## 311 Enrolled For Robert Lee School Opening

Robert Lee public school opened Tuesday with a first day enrollment of 311, a slight drop from last year.

Ninety-seven students were registered in the four high school grades, while 214 enrolled for the first eight grades. There were 36 beginners and 27 seniors.

More pupils were expected to bring the total enrollment up to a figure near normal. Because of decreased oil field activity, school enrollment is not expected to reach the peak of two or three years ago.

The 500-seat school auditorium was filled for opening assembly at 9 Tuesday morning. Invocation was given by the Rev. Travis McNair, Methodist minister. Frank Coalson, the new superintendent, was introduced by Prin. M. E. Petross.

Mr. Coalson presented his wife, who is also on the teaching staff, and expressed their delight in being in Robert Lee. He made announcements concerning school matters. Students then registered in their class rooms and were dismissed at 11 a.m. Full day schedules began Wednesday.

## Paving Starts On All Sides Of Court House

Work started this week on a new paving project which will extend around the courthouse and include a roadway and large parking area at the rear of the county building.

W. W. Greif, consulting engineer of Snyder, compiled plans and specifications of the project and a contract was let to Asphalt Paving Co. of Colorado City.

A curb and gutter is to be constructed along the front, connecting with state highway paving. Curb and gutter construction will also be used along the front half of both sides and around the parking area in the rear.

Eighty feet of new paving will extend around the other three sides of the block, and entirely new paving will replace the old on the west side.

Greif and his associates are also directing construction of the new swimming pools and bath houses, and other buildings in the county parks being constructed in Robert Lee and Bronte.

Velvin Construction Co. has begun work on the pools, while a Snyder contractor will construct the other buildings.

## Coke Farmers To Get \$46,000 Soil Payments

Coke County farmers will receive more than \$46,000 from soil bank payments this year, according to an announcement made this week by J. E. Quisenberry, County ASC secretary.

Thirty-eight wheat farmers allotted 1,253.3 acres to the soil bank and are to receive \$6,184.40. There are 194 cotton farmers who placed 3,672.8 acres in the program and their payments will reach \$40,253.91.

Payments in cash are expected to be made later this fall, probably in October.

Mr. Quisenberry states that applications are now being taken for putting wheat acreage in the 1957 soil bank. Sept. 21 is the deadline for filing such applications.

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## Silver Favors Proposed REA Phone Service

Needing about a hundred tele-phones, the people of the Silver country, except those on the original lines, have waited a long time for service. As many as two companies have considered it, but the people were still waiting when the REA project was proposed up there and got a wonderful response.

If it can be put over the Silver community will get a modern telephone service.

In my last article I brought up the question of whether enough farmers and ranchmen will stay in business to keep up the rural lines. I have talked to a good many, and they can't give me any positive certainty about what is going to happen—probably no one can.

Now I believe we can stay in business, but I believe it's going to call for one of the biggest jobs we have ever had, unless several things change pretty quick.

The backbone of our farms now is the sheep business. Will it be saved, or is it done?

We have seen one drouth after another and in every drouth we have ever had have come hot summers when the sheep had to leave our pastures at prices that hurt. Does this have to be?

No it does not.

Right now in a small pasture 55 head of lambs are grazing grass higher than their backs with no irrigation. These lambs that would have had to be fed, or would have left the country at low prices.

The man with this gras isn't

any better than anyone else. But he has some grass in the driest year his pasture ever saw.

It is on a draw that isn't much different from any other draw in any other pasture, and just about every stockman in this country could have had grass to run his lambs two or three months and saved dumping them on the market.

But he would have had to begun it five, six or seven years ago.

These sheep are grazing tall grass and doing well on it. If they didn't have tall grass, they wouldn't have ANY grass.

While we are talking about the "soil bank," why not figure out some way to have grass in reserve. We absolutely cannot go on eating these pastures bare all over every year all the year. That is finished. Unless we get away from it, and fast, there are not going to be enough people out in the country to have any kind of a telephone system, unless there is a radical change in the climate.

Government agriculture people, business men, landowners—every-

one who is interested—should give this thing a lot of thought. I know people who are going to have a hard time living until we can grow some more grass.

**BUT THAT GRASS CAN BE GROWN, AND IT CAN BE DONE WITH MIGHTY LITTLE RAIN, AND WE HAVE GOT TO DO IT.**

And any government loan or government gift that goes into a place that doesn't keep some grass in reserve all the time won't pull us out with sheep. We need some money to do it with, but a good deal can be done with a little money, if we get it into our heads. We need to pay more attention to the soil conservation people. They don't know it all, and they have some things to learn like the rest of us, but they will keep on learning. The idea is to get some grass back on there, and we can do some of that on the amount of rain we have been getting, the past few years. I'll be glad to prove that to any man who is doubtful.—Ulmer S. Bird.

Bids may be mailed to the Trustees of Robert Lee Independent School District, Coke County, Texas, or may be presented in writing to said Trustees at said meeting.

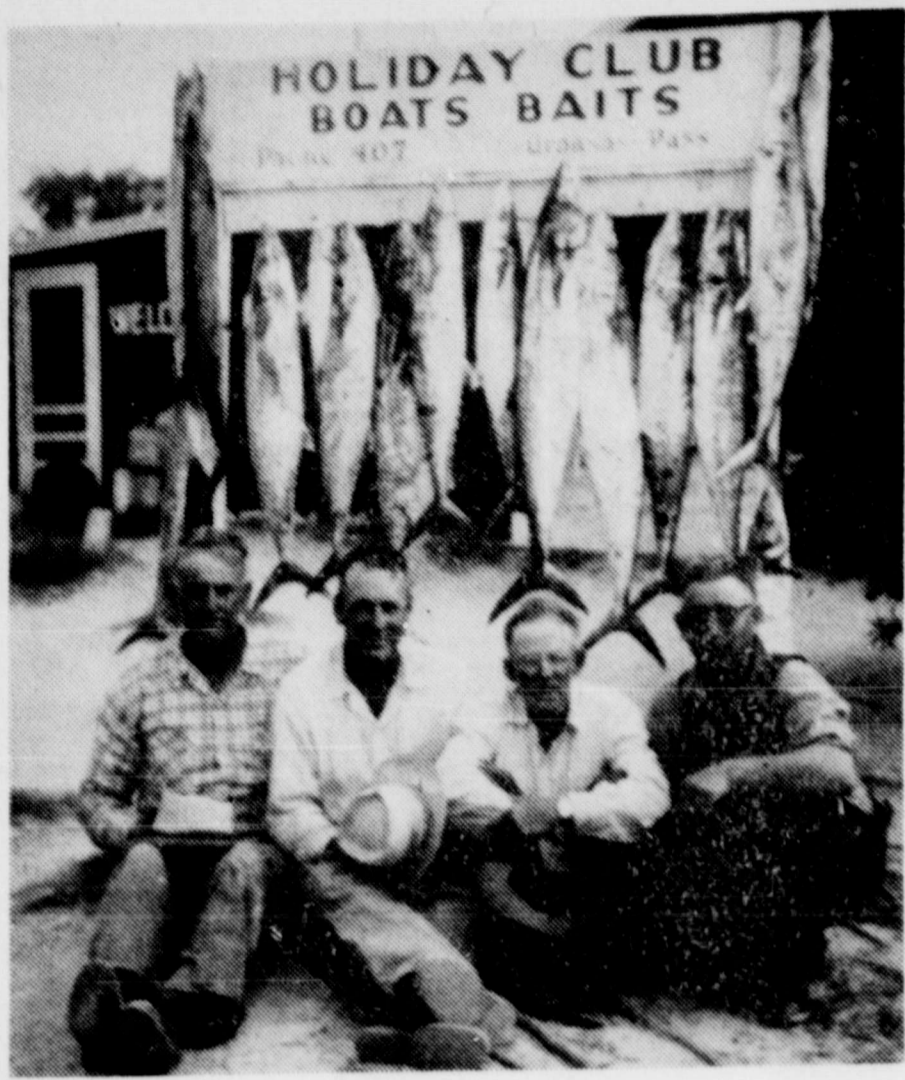
The Board of Trustees of said School District reserves the right to reject all bids if in its judgment the bids submitted do not represent the fair value of such lease.

## Good Fishing For Robert Lee Men at Aransas

One day of fishing in the Gulf off Aransas Pass resulted in a haul of 400 pounds of fish. This was the recent experience of four local men, and the above photo helps to verify their report. Only about half of their day's catch is pictured.

They took 30 fish which made a total weight of 400 pounds. The biggest one weighed 40 pounds. King fish predominated but they also caught a few mackerel.

The group engaged a fishing boat which took them out eight miles where they fished near an off shore drilling rig in water from 50 to 60 feet deep. For bait they used live shrimp and frozen mullet.

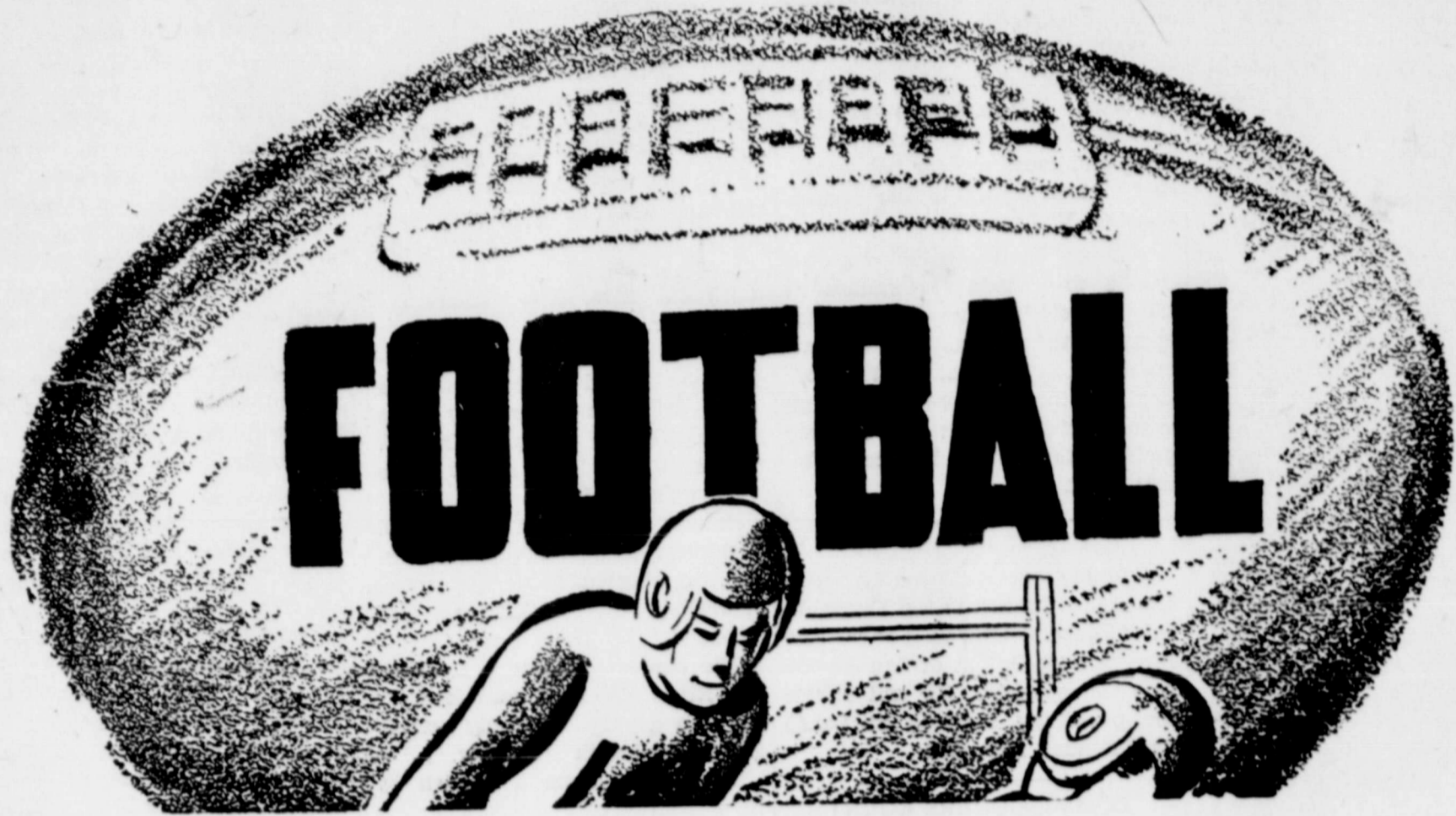

Attention: Mr. Red  
Gentlemen:

We have not received your price on the telephone lines which in your memorandum of June 22 this year you proposed to sell to an REA cooperative in case it can be organized and a loan secured to set up a rural system in western Coke County. Mr. Coy McDougald of the REA and Mr. Jack Covington, of Abilene, our engineer also have not received this information, I understand.

This is necessary before we can arrive at the feasibility of this project. From here, it is not easy to see where the difficulty lies in making this appraisal. From the standpoint of construction costs it is no problem at all to see that we would be as well off if we did not have to tear down and salvage, move, or rework these old lines. All we are doing is buying the right to borrow money to build ourselves an adequate rural telephone system, in a peaceable and with you as well as to meet the

requirements of the law.

In view of the fact that the stock-farming business is now facing virtual extinction due to drouth and other causes, and since we have clearly gained the impression that these rural lines are not profitable to you as they are, I can see no advantage gained for you by delay. The whole property would bring much less now than a few months ago, if the purchaser takes into account the outlook for future patronage, which he certainly would do.

It seems to me that if I owned this property personally and anybody had enough nerve and little enough sense to try and buy it,

I could get it appraised right quick after diner and get him tied up good before he had time to sleep it over.
