Sims Wildcat Completed For 135 Barrels Oil

Plymouth Oil Co. No. 1 J. M. Sims, in 965-S. A. Maverick survey, Coke County Cross Cut sand discovery located five miles southwest of Robert Lee, has been completed for a daily pumping potential of 135 barrels of 42.5 gravity oil, plus eight barrels of water.

Production was through perforations between 5,010-20 feet, which had been washed with 500 gallons of mud acid and fractured with 1,000 gallons.

Casing pressure was 10 pounds. The project was drilled to a total depth of 5,606 feet.

DRILL ON FRED McCABE

Miami Operating Co., Inc. of Abilene has filed application to drill a 7,500-foot rotary wildcat in Coke County, 9 1/2 miles southwest of Robert Lee. It will be the No. 1 Fred M. McCabe.

Operations are to begin immediately. Ground elevation is 2,496 feet.

Location, on an 80-acre lease, is 100 feet from the north and west sides of 26-Z-D&SE.

The project is being drilled on a permit from Standard Oil Co. of Texas. Jones & Lyons of San Angelo worked up the deal and retained an undisclosed interest in the project. Southern Mineral Corp. contributed acreage.

It is a 1/2-mile northeast of Fuller 1 McCabe, 7,349-foot failure abandoned June 24, 1954. The well was topped at 6,555 feet and the Ellenburger at 7,335 feet elevation of 2,500 feet. The project was originally drilled by Southern Minerals Corp. and abandoned in 1948.

SAYNER WILDCAT

L. E. Sherck et al of San Angelo has filed application to drill a 90-foot Cambrian wildcat in Coke County, three miles south of Raymond. It will be drilled as the No. 1 Samuel Sayner.

Location is 330 feet from the north and 467 feet from the west sides of 114-Washington County railroad survey.

The prospector is 1 3/4 miles southwest of Doheny No. 1 Taylor, 5,556-foot failure, plugged and abandoned March 7, 1952. The following tops were reported on location of 1,887 feet; Palo Pinto, 65 feet; Strawn, 4,701 feet and Ellenburger, 5,476 feet.

Ducker Drilling Co. of San Angelo has the drilling contract.

TURKEYS MAKE PROFIT EVEN AT LOW PRICE

Many of you are no doubt interested in the progress of the turkey growers who were mentioned earlier in this column. As a review of the progress of the turkey growers in this county, Jack Corley and W. Latham, all of Tenyson, started 1000 turkeys each early in March. Jack Corley and Jerry Hurley of Robert Lee started 1000 the latter in March. Jack Corley and Jerry Hurley started 1000 each in June. All of the hens from those started in March have been sold early in August at 27 1/2 cents per pound. The average between 14 and 15 pounds per head. 240 toms have been sold at 27 1/2 cents per pound at a 25-pound average.

Another 400 have been contracted at 27 cents per pound but have not been delivered. Jerry Hurley has all of his, but they should be ready to go in another two weeks. About 700 toms remain to be sold at Tenyson. Of course we have 2,000 from the June hatch which should be ready early in November.

Contract prices to date indicate a profit of about 80 cents per bird. This doesn't sound like much, but when you consider that there is a 45 percent increase in turkey prices in Texas which is causing a very poor market, the fact that turkey growers are able to squeeze even a small profit indicates a well done job by them. It also indicates that there is an opportunity for others in the county to add their income by growing turkeys.

COW TESTING

Several have inquired about having their cows tested recently. I will contact me or leave word at my home in Robert Lee or the Red Chain Feed Store in Bronte if you would like to have your cows tested for bangs disease. If we have enough to justify it, I will get a veterinarian to come over and take blood samples. The more we get, the cheaper it will be. I will contact the vet after you send me your names and see how much it will cost, then write each of you for a definite answer.

MORE ON SOIL BANK

The conservation phase of the soil bank program was announced last week. It is a very interesting program which could prove to be very beneficial to this county. Some of the details still have to be worked out on a county basis,

but in general you can put your cultivated acres into the conservation reserve for either five or ten years.

The land must be put in permanent grass. The government will pay eight dollars per acre per year for the length of the contract. This land cannot be grazed or harvested in any way while it is in the conservation reserve.

This program has two purposes. It is another attempt to take land out of cultivation and it also takes the problem of restoring some of our land to a natural state of fertility. Regulations permit the farmer to draw the payment while he is trying to establish a cover of permanent grass on his fields.

In many cases here we may have to plant cane or some other crop first in order to condition the soil properly for planting grass. In this case, the government will have part of the expense of putting the field in cane and also make the eight dollar payment. The government will also pay part of the expense of putting the field in grass the following year.

The details of the program are too complicated to explain in this article but we will be happy to discuss it with you in the ASC office or in our office. Information will be passed on through the papers as the details are worked out.

Some Farmers Can Qualify For Social Security

More than 100 self-employed farmers who have reached age 65 have in the past three months filed their claims for social security benefits in the 13 counties served by the San Angelo District Office, according to E. M. Bowers, manager.

These persons, Bowers continued, filed their 1955 tax returns, paid the self-employment tax thereon, and have already grossed \$600 in creditable farm income in 1956. By a special provision in the law, farmers past 65 who meet the two conditions just outlined may file their claims now, without having to wait until the end of 1956, their second year of coverage under social security.

Payments are in the process of being certified to those who do not expect their net earnings this year to exceed \$1200, and to those other farm and ranch operators who have passed their 72nd birthday. If the farmer thinks he may net over \$1200, but cannot make a reasonable estimate of the expected net for 1956, his claim is still ap-

proved, but no checks are released until the end of the year when exact figures become available, or at such earlier time as he can make a fairly accurate estimate.

As there may be advantages to having a claim filed at this time, Bowers urged all self-employed farmers who are over 65, who have filed their 1955 tax returns, and who are still operating their lands, to get in touch with the San Angelo social security office in the very near future. STEERS WALLOP LUEDERS 46-0 TO OPEN SEASON

Robert Lee Steers, showing the most promise of any team since the bi-district champs of 1946, opened the 1956 gridiron season with a 46-0 victory over the Lueders Pirates here Friday night.

While Lueders was not as strong as a year ago when they crowded the District 7-B champions Rochester, the Steers showed the offensive ability that had been expected and put up a surprising defense. The visitors were held to a 14 point minus in their rushing attack.

Robert Lee gained a total of 328 yards rushing and were credited with 10 first downs, compared with 3 for Lueders. Early in the game Gary Berryhill suffered an ankle injury which kept him out of action the rest of the game. This placed most of the Lueders running game on Milton Wills.

Lueders defeated Robert Lee 40-12 in last year's opener. Lueders kept most of its first string in at that time and really "poured it on." However, Coach C. D. Manire made frequent substitutions in his Steer lineup and used 25 players in the contest.

The Steers made seven touchdowns and added four extra points for the 46 point total.

Robert Lee accepted the opening kickoff on its 42. Freddie McDonald then swept right end and cut back for a gain of 28 yards to the Lueders 30. Soon after Lueders recovered the only Steer fumble of the game on their 15 yard line. Aided by a 5-yard penalty they made a first down on the 25, but fumbled on the next play and Robert Lee recovered on the 24. Co-Capt. Fred Ashworth made it a first down on the 8 on two plays, then carried over for a touchdown. A pass attempt failed to convert the extra point.

Lueders took the kickoff on their 31. They failed to gain and punted to Richard Dumas who returned 30 yards to the Pirate 30. Robbie Don Godwin hit center for 5, McDonald added 4 more and Ashworth scored around left end. McDonald carried over to convert. The score was 13-0 at the close of the first quarter.

Lueders received the kickoff on their 32. On the next play Dumas downed Kelley for a 7-yard loss. With 4th down and 15 to go, Lueders punted to Ashworth on the Pirate 49. Godwin and McDonald gained 9 yards and on the fourth down Quarterback Tom Sawyer went thru center for a 1st down on the visitors 36. McDonald circled his left end for a touchdown. The Steers failed to convert on a line play.

Lueders took the kickoff on their 25. On the second play Troy Walls recovered a Lueders fumble on their 17. McDonald gained 5 and Godwin made it a 1st down on the one yard line. Sawyer went over to score. Ashworth converted the extra point.

Soon after the next kickoff Godwin intercepted a pass and ram-

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bled to the Lueders 20 yard stripe. Ashworth went around end for a touchdown and Sawyer plunged to convert. Robert Lee led 33-0 at the half.

Lueders took the kickoff on their 35. They failed to gain and punted to Ashworth who returned to the Pirates 43. Godwin went off tackle for 9 yards before Ashworth got free again and went wide around right end for a touchdown gallop of 34 yards. Godwin plunged to convert.

Taking the next kickoff on their 39, the Pirates couldn't gain and punted to Dumas on the Steer 39. Don Stewart gained 9 yards thru tackle and Gary Jackson went around left end for a touchdown. It was a 52-yard run. A line play failed to convert.

That ended the scoring with Robert Lee holding a decisive margin of 46 to 0. The Steers made another touchdown early in the final period when Stewart rambled 15 yards to the goal, but the play was called back.

Standouts on the Robert Lee defense were Guards Sam Ed Skipworth and W. H. Wyatt, Dumas and Gray, Melvin Duncan at Tackle. Leslie Hatfield, Troy Walls, Dale Dean and Wade Anderson, all from Silver, also were standouts.

Bronte Murder Trial Is Re-Set At San Angelo

The trial of Vernon Glenn, 33, of Bronte charged with the murder of Hollis Stevens, 28, also of Bronte, has been re-set for Nov. 12 in 51st District Court in San Angelo.

Judge Joe L. Mays has ordered a special venire of 175 persons from which to select a jury. The case was transferred to Tom Green county on a change of venue request by the defendant's attorneys.

Stevens was shot the morning of July 25 in an alley back of the Bronte post office. He died 12 hours later from effects of a .25 calibre revolver wound in the forehead.

Deputy Sheriff Frank Keesee was shot through the finger while trying to disarm Glenn. The latter was indicted by a recent grand jury and is out under \$5,000 bond.

At the time of his death Stevens was in charge of state highway maintenance in Coke county.

Glenn had been working in the Bronte post office where Mrs. Stevens was postmaster. Ill feeling is said to have resulted over a permanent appointment as postmaster which was to have come up in the future.

Mrs. Stevens is continuing to operate the office.

The case attracted wide attention because of the prominence of the two families. Glenn and Stevens had been friends for many years.

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SMALL TALK

Bryan Yarbrough and I attended the state Democratic convention in Fort Worth the first of the week as delegates from Coke County. It proved highly interesting and exciting affair. We went early Monday to get in on the pre-convention activities and remained until nearly midnight Tuesday after the roll call vote which determined that the conservative forces had won control and would proceed to wind up convention business to their own satisfaction.

It was evident on every side that Shivers is out of the picture after ruling Texas politics with a high hand for a number of years. He went too far and held the tight reins too long.

However, the Shivers dominated old state committee made the convention arrangements, set up their own rules and gained control after seating the big 260-member Harris county delegation. There was lots of deliberate "stealing."

There is the old question of whether or not the candidate for governor is bigger than the party. Price Daniel, who was certified as winner of the runoff over Ralph Yarborough by a close 3,137 majority, was determined to have a state committee to his liking, as well as a platform he approved. He got the job done, but not until committees were forced to stay in session eight hours, while the convention waited all through the afternoon and until 9 o'clock Tuesday night.

Coke is one of 19 other counties comprising the 25th senatorial district, and each district is permitted to have a man and woman on the state committee. Claude Gilmer of Rock Springs, former speaker of the house and a bolter to the Republicans in 1952, was successful in manipulating the district caucus to get conservatives selected. Being liberals, Mr. Yarbrough and I voted with Tom Green's 12 delegates and a very few other counties.

Daniel was forced to declare that he will support the national ticket this year before he could get the backing of Senator Lyndon Johnson and Speaker Sam Rayburn. Daniel is expected to resign as U. S. Senator, but when he will do so is not known.

The scrap was a good one and was a partial victory for liberals who now have at least one-third of the state committee while under Shivers they were deprived of a single vote.

Senator Johnson and Speaker Rayburn both told the delegates they believed Stevenson and Ke-fauver will win the November election and predicted Texas and all southern states will be back in the Democratic column.

We had a couple of callers to come by to see who was present from Coke county. One of them was a gentleman named Farrer, said he taught school at Bronte and Robert Lee back around 1910. Another visitor was C. C. Hayley, whose family was also prominent in early Coke affairs. He lives in Dallas and is a cousin of Arthur Hayley of Robert Lee.

Politics is interesting and it is important that more people take part in these deliberations which start with precinct conventions. We are going to try to get more interest in local government in the 1958 elections.

However, we heard one delegate declare you have to be careful as politics gets in your system, something like the dope habit.

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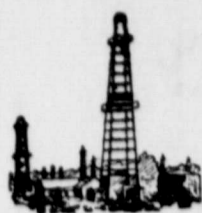


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Notes From The Oil Field
