## Commissioners Work on Road, Park Projects

Coke County Commissioners Court was in session Monday and Tuesday when various matters of county business were discussed. Attention was directed to the January financial report submitted by County Auditor Weldon Fikes, and he also announced the completion of the annual report for 1956.

Commissioner Fern Havins reported that H. L. Bloodworth has accepted re-appointment as a Hospital Trustee from Precinct 1. Commissioner Howard Brock of Bronte is expected to recommend a new appointment to succeed John Coalson in Precinct 2. Mr. Coalson is moving from the county. The hospital report for the month of January was the best for some time, and showed a cash balance on hand of \$900.

Wolf Nursery was given a contract for landscaping and planting trees and shrubs in the new County Park at Robert Lee at a price of \$1,180. Similar work has been done in the new County Park at Bronte. The county negotiating for the purchase of an adjoining 9-acre tract to be included in the Robert Lee Park. The property is owned by Mrs. Cartledge and Roy Taylor.

Commissioner Brock has been engaged lately in getting right of way for widening Highway 277, a distance of nine miles. Forty acres have been acquired for the enlarged Y a few miles north of Bronte where the routes to Abilene and Sweetwater intersect.

Mr. Brock says the state plans to widen and straighten the highway on down to Bronte and surveys have been completed.

Commissioner Ed Hickman has not yet been advised to acquire additional right of way for completion of the new 4-mile stretch of road leading to the Perkins-Prothro camp and Texas Natural Gasoline Corp. plant, southwest of Silver.

Road equipment from both Precincts 1 and 3 is at work this

Regular road hands were raised from \$1.25 to \$1.50 per hour, and \$1.00 per hour was set for extra hands. Each of the four precincts will have a road foreman who draws \$1.75 per hour.

All county employees (except hospital) have Blue Cross hospital and doctor's coverage which is paid from county funds.

Officials work 44 hours per week, the court house being open from 8 a. m. until 5 p. m. week days and from 8 a. m. until noon on Saturdays.

Office clerks, except chief deputies, are to receive \$2400 after one full year of experience.

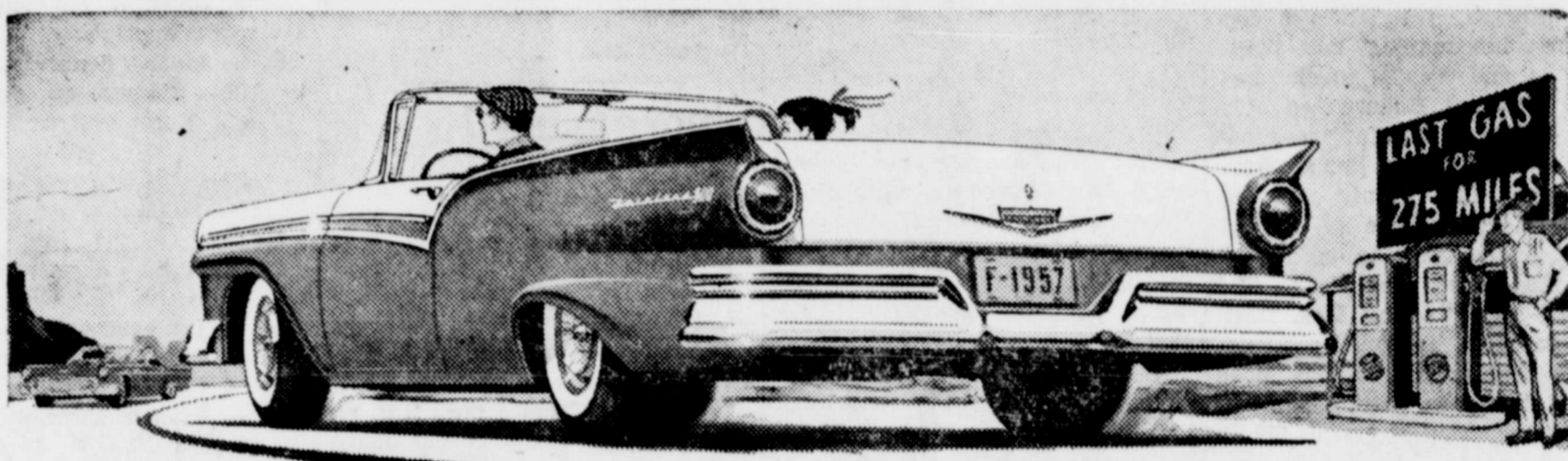
## JAPANESE CORRESPONDENCE CLUB

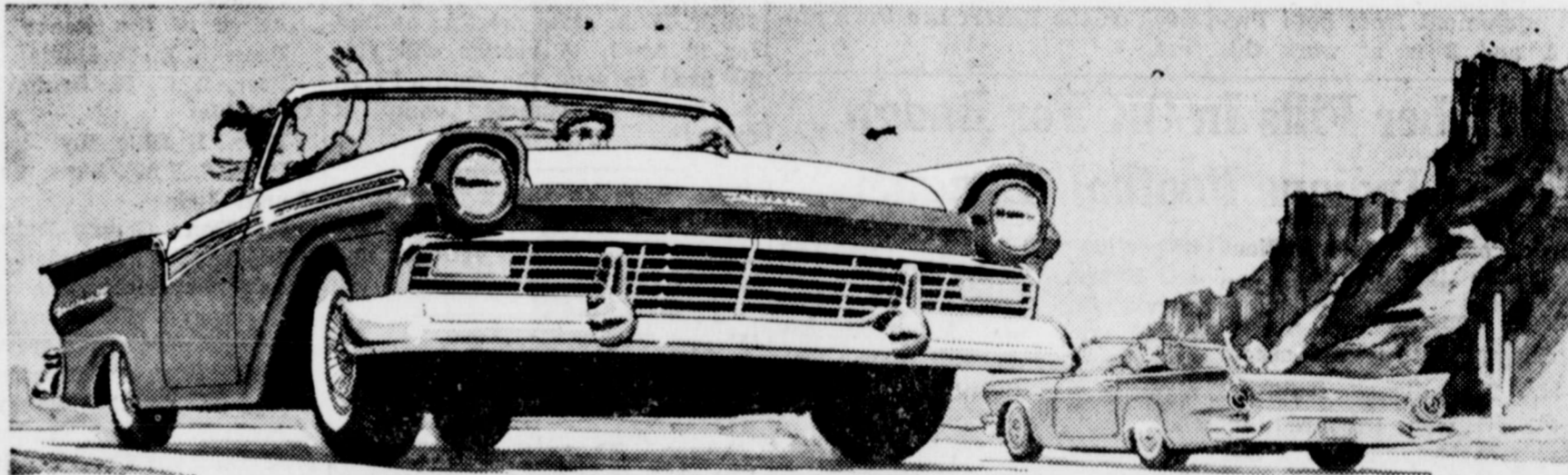

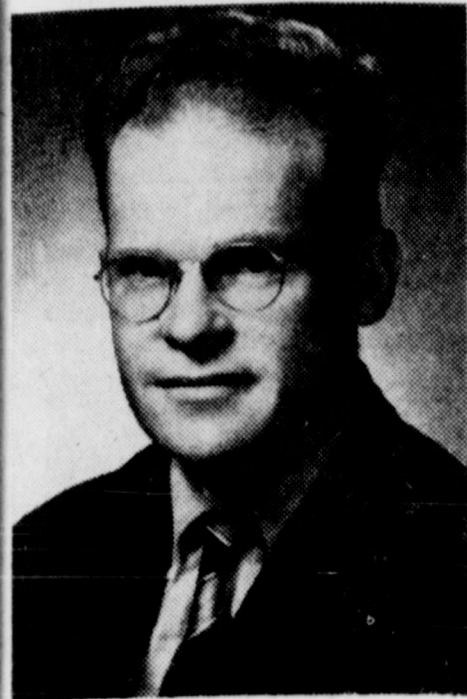

## Dr. McDaniel Chairman For Heart Fund

Dr. J. D. McDaniel of Robert Lee is again serving as chairman of the Heart Fund campaign for this area. He hopes to exceed a \$100 quota here and will appreciate all contributions.

Thousands of volunteer workers throughout Texas are now participating in the current annual Texas Heart Fund campaign for funds with which to continue the fight against the nation's number one killer-disease, according to Dr. E. N. Jones of Lubbock, 1957 Heart Fund chairman for Texas and president of Texas Technological College.

Three-fourths of the total amount of money contributed by Texans in the 1957 Heart fund will remain in their local communities and the state to be used to further the research, education and community heart programs of the THA and its local community chapters, the 1957 Heart Fund chairman pointed out.

"Of the total funds contributed during this year's campaign, 60 per cent will remain in the local Heart Association chapters and districts, with another 15 per cent being utilized in the state-wide Heart Association program," Dr. Jones explained.

In urging participation of "every resident of Texas" in the 1957 Heart Fund, Dr. Jones pointed out that "in 1955 — the latest year for which figures are available — diseases of the heart and circulation were responsible for more than 810,000 deaths in the nation, or approximately 53 per cent of all deaths at all ages."

The college president also emphasized that one of every 16 persons in the nation "suffers from some form of heart or circulatory disease, including 500,000 children of school age."

Since 1948, the American Heart Association, its affiliates, such as the Texas Heart Association, and local community chapter have channeled almost \$20,000,000 into research looking toward discovery of the basic causes and controls of rheumatic fever, high blood pressure and hardening of the arteries, Dr. Jones said. He pointed out that these three diseases accounted for more than 90 per cent of all heart cases.

The Heart Associations also conduct educational programs seeking to eliminate needless fears and misconceptions about heart diseases, as well as aiding community heart programs.

## Animals Highly Improved at 1957 Stock Show, Sale

A lot of you failed to make it out to our stock show. I think 17 boys and girls will agree that it was the best one we have had in years. We had the kind of show that will build 4-H club work and F. F. A. work in the county. The success of these two programs depends to a large extent on the sale. We sold 17 animals fed by 17 different boys and girls this year. Prices were not as high as they were in 1956, but they were high enough to encourage participation in the feeding programs.

The big improvement in our show in 1957 was in the hog classes. Lard has been a real drag on the hog market for several years. Breeder have worked hard to breed a hog with more pounds of bacon and more lean meat as well as less waste fat on the back, joys and belly. A lot of progress has been made and this progress was reflected in our hog classes this year. Terry Bryan has been the perennial winner in our hog

show and he won again in 1957. He did it this year with hogs that showed much better care in both selection and feeding. Competition all down the line was such that we hope to have one of the best hog shows in the state in another year or two. Several 4-H club members showed gilts in the fat barrow classes. These gilts will be kept for brood sows and we hope to raise some outstanding show pigs from them for next year.

Our calf classes were better down the line than they were in 1956; however, they lacked the quality at the top, that we had in 1956. Four of the steers placed and were sold at the Abilene Show. James Pentecost placed 14th followed by Gayland Pitcock 20th, Kay Wink 23rd and James Pentecost 27th in the light weight milk fed class at Abilene. The calves brought 29 to 30 cents per pound at Abilene. James Pentecost and Kenneth Wink will show their steers at Houston the last of the month.

We are planning a field day on the A. N. Rawlings and Son Ranch in March. It should be of interest to every sheepman in the county. Joe has a fine program. Final date will be set according to how lambing progresses.

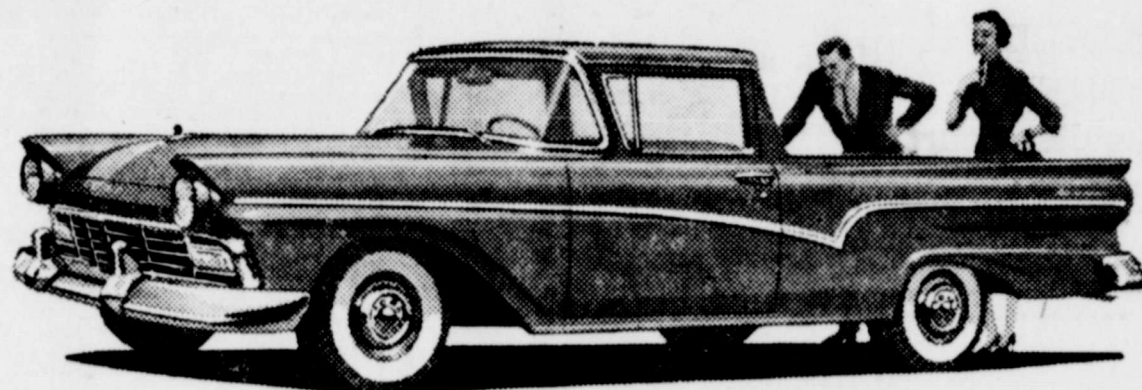

Humble completed No. 6 Bronte Cambrian Unit, two miles southwest of Bronte. Daily potential was 113 barrels of 53.4 gravity oil, flowing through quarter inch choke, with 330 pounds pressure on casing and 280 pounds on tubing.

The Fort Chadbourne, West (Gardner South) field of Coke county gained its third well with completion of Humble No. 95-2F Sallie Odom, 4 1/2 miles south of Blackwell.

It was completed for a daily flowing potential of 341 barrels of 45.3 gravity oil, plus two-tenths of 1 per cent water, with gas-oil ratio of 902-1.

Sun Oil Co. is installing another 1,350 h. p. Cooper-Bessemer compressor in its Jameson natural gasoline plant at Silver. Producers anticipate an increase in the gas allowable in the Jameson field.

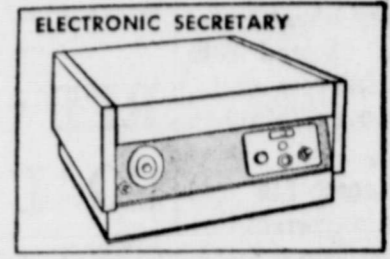

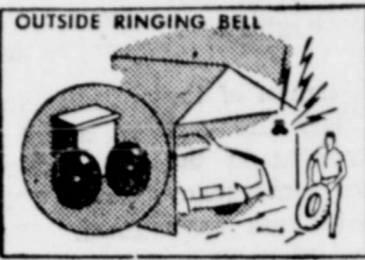

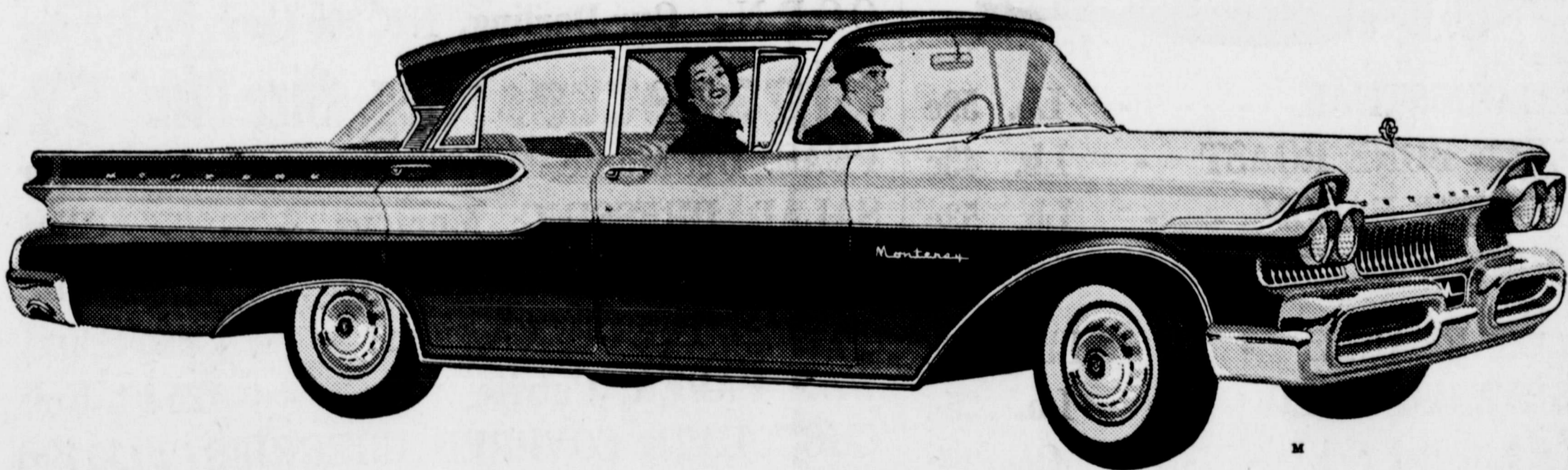
