TEXANS TO PICK **U. S. SENATOR TUESDAY, APR. 2**

> Texans will go to the polls next Tuesday, April 2, in a special election to choose a new United States Senator.

Vacancy in this high office resulted when Price Daniel resigned in mid-January, the day before he became Governor. Wm. Blakeley, Dallas millionaire, was given a temporary appointment by former Gov. Allan Shivers.

Interest throughout the state is said to be hot and cold. Many of the big cities will have city elections the same day and that will help bring out the voters. Election talk is quiet in Coke County.

Bronte has a city election next Tuesday, but no contests for two places as city councilmen. Robert Lee don't have a municipal election this year. Coke County residents bought 935 poll taxes, only a couple hundred under the normal election year number.

However, absentee voting has been nil. Only one absentee ballot had been requested up to Wednesday in the office of County Clerk J. L. Tinkler. Friday is the last day for absentee voting, Mr. Tinkler advises.

Twenty-two candidates are on the ballot, but only a few will get any kind of vote. Leading contenders seem to be Judge Ralph Yarborough, Congressman Martin Dies, John C. White, present state commissioner of agriculture, James P. Hart, former judge and chancellor of the University of Texas, and Thad Hutcheson of Houston, the Republican who claims to have President Eisenhower's blessing.





Economist Cautions **About Drouth**

AUSTIN - A University of Texas economist, James H. Keahey cautions Texans not "to allow any feeling of security" about the drouth situation, despite recent rains.

"The rains had come; the parched soil drank deeply," Keahey said of the recent moisture, in a Texas Business Review article. He continued, "but even as the event was being celebrated, Texans were asking themselves the big question: were the seven lean years really coming to an end?"

Keahey cited the example of North Texas in September 1955. 'where rains teased farmers into planting a heavy acreage in small grains. But with scant rainfall in the next two months and none in December, the grains failed to make."



Ellenburger **Oil Shows In Two Wildcats**

Best oil news in some time is the report this week of Ellenburger production in two Coke County wildcats. They are Sun's Cynthia Malone, 12 miles northwest of Robert Lee, and Plymouth's Tidwell, five miles southeast of here.

MALONE WILDCAT Sun Oil Co. No. 1-A Cynthia Malone, in 321-1A-H&TC, Coke Coun-

ty Canyon sand prospect, has indicated production in another formation, the Ellenburger.

On the two-hour test between 6,980-7,005 feet, gas surfaced in 35 minutes. Operator attempted to reverse out the recovery but was unsuccessful. Recovery was 410 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud with a sulphur odor, 60 feet of free 48.6 gravity oil and 120 feet of very heavily oil and gas-cut mud with a strong sulphur odor. Pressures were unreported.

Operator set 5½-inch casing at 7,005 feet, the total depth.

Canyon sand production was indicated earlier on a 21-minute drillstem test between 5,554-83 feet. Gas surfaced in five minutes. Reversed out was 329 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud. Recovery was four feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud. Another test between 5,584-617 feet returned 28 feet of mud with a very slight show of oil.

The Canyon sand was topped at 5,553 feet, the Strawn lime, 6,420 feet, and Ellenburger, 6,978 feet.

Completion will be attempted in the Ellenburger, but if that fails operators will go up to the Canyon. Tubing will also be run and storage tanks have already been installed.

No water was made on the test. A full string of clean oil was reversed out of drillpipe. Flowing pressure ranged from 1,835 to 2,-365 pounds, and shut-in pressure in 90 minutes was 2,930.


Yarborough's defeats don't compare to Abraham Lincoln's record. He was defeated for the Illinois legislature in 1832, but the next

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




TIDWELL TEST
