They took advantage of the free clinic at Coke Memorial Hospital. <br> Of this group 21 were of preschool ages, 12 of whom received their first shots. Second shots were given to three, and six received their final innoculation. <br> One pregnant mother was included and one person not in school. <br> Four school children were on hand to receive the anti-polio vaccine. School authorities state that only six pupils, all in the elementary grades, have not received Salk vaccine. <br> Another free polio clinic was scheduled for Thursday afternoon of this week. Many landowners are finding scattered bitterweeds on their
farms and ranches, as well as arms and ranches, as well as

J. O. Rudd, ranching Weaver Ranch, south of on the Lee, has worked the highway right - of - way through his ranch o the top of the divide. He hand pulled a sack full of bitterweed that was in full bloom.
Bitterweed is a small yellow lowered annual, that is a very produce enough seed to infest many acres of rangeland. Bitterweed is a winter weed that shows up when we have late fall and winter rainfall. It spreads rapidly on bare or sparcely covered rangeland. The condition of most range and is an ideal seedbed for bitterweeds. When the range grasses have been removed by livestock
and dry weather, the bitterweed eed will be present to infert ard rangeland. The only effective control known time a rancher has good grasses on his ranch, he will not loose sheep from bitterweed. However, good range grasses, and forbs, we are setting the stage to loose sheep from bitterweed. A cover of good grasses such as sideoats grama, feathery bluestem, buffalo and curly mesquite, cottontop, plain bristle, and needle grass will do a good job of controlling
