Robert Lee Idle Concho Loop Starts Season

The Concho Basin Baseball League opens the season next Sunday but Robert Lee has an open house and instead will arrange a practice game.

Since there are only five clubs in the circuit this season, one of them will be idle each Sunday. The other four members of the league are Kirby of San Angelo, Goodfellow Sky Hawks, Miles and Sonora.

Club managers have agreed to a schedule of three rounds, making a total of 12 games. Robert Lee was fortunate to draw seven home contests, and five away.

Each team has turned in an entry fee of \$50 to go into a jackpot which will be divided 60-40 between the winning and runner up team.

The team roster player limit has been set at 14 for each club. All rosters must be turned in to league headquarters by May 4.

There are no off Sundays. In event a game is weathered out, the teams involved play a double header of seven-inning games the next time the clubs are scheduled to meet. In the doubleheader situation the clubs are to split the gate receipts 50-50 AFTER game expenses are deducted.

Any player added to a roster during the regular schedule must sit out one game after his name has been filed.

No player may be added to a roster (except in the case of Goodfellow) INSIDE of 30 days before the regular schedule ends.

Players are not permitted to switch from one league team to another unless by unanimous consent of team managers.

He passed away in Galveston County Hospital at LaMarque, Tex., from a heart attack. Funeral services were held March 20 at Emken-Linton Funeral Home in League City, Tex.

Mr. Madden was a native of Charleston, West Virginia. He was a veteran of World War I when he served in the Medical Corps.

He worked at the Kanawha Valley Hospital for 25 years, also at the Beckley Hospital and was a laboratory technologist and X-ray technician. He came to Coke County in January, 1956, and was here until last September when he returned east.

Survivors include his wife, Edna; two daughters, Mrs. Reba Sparks of Dickinson, Tex., and Mrs. Cecil Murrey of Charleston, W. Va.; and one son, Clinton Hodges of Carson, Nevada. There are five grandchildren.

Inch Rainfall Benefits Crops In Coke County

A gentle rain, amounting to more than an inch of moisture in some sections, descended upon Coke County Monday night.

Robert Lee gauges measured from .90 to 1.10 inches, with a similar amount at Hayrick. The T. M. Wylie ranch, northwest of town had 1½ inches. Some territory to the southwest got only about a half inch as did Silver. B. B. Pierce and others southeast of Robert Lee had 1½ inches of moisture, and this amount was reported at Bronte.

Palmer Leeper, north of Sanco, had .80 and got a half inch last week. He reports the best moisture conditions at his ranch in a number of years.

The rainfall extended over a period of three hours and very little runoff resulted. It will prove highly beneficial to crops and pastures.

SUN EMPLOYEES GET RAISE

Employees of Sun Oil Co. have been given a 6% pay raise, effective April 15, according to official announcement made last week. All Sun workers in the Robert Lee-Silver area will be affected. Veterans Day, Nov. 11, has been added as an official holiday, making a total of eight holidays for the year. The date may be changed to Good Friday next year. Along with the pay increase, Sun employees living in company owned houses were advised that their rent will go up. Some of the smaller houses have been renting as low as \$18.75 per month, with the average not more than \$20. New rates are expected to run from \$35 to \$40 per month. Sun also announced that four weeks annual vacation would be given employees with more than 20 years of service with the company. Al Holt and Walter Paul of Silver attended a Sun employee representatives meeting in Dallas last week when the new pay raise was announced.

Public Invited To Flower Show Here Saturday

Saturday, El Valle Garden Club is having its Spring Flower Show Saturday, April 27, from 3:00 to 8:00 o'clock p. m. at the Robert Lee State Bank. Theme of the Show is "A Southern Garden."

Everyone is cordially invited to attend the show and also to bring exhibits. Mrs. Frank McCabe is president of the El Valle Garden Club. Mrs. B. A. Austin is general chairman of the Flower Show and Mrs. F. C. Clark, general co-chairman.

Exhibits must be entered between 9:00 a. m. and 12:00 noon. Doors close promptly at 1:00 p. m. for the judges to judge the exhibits. The Show will be opened to the public at 3 p. m.

Exhibitors must state to which class each entry belongs. No entry accepted in cultural class unless properly named. Cultural specimens must be grown by exhibitors, but material may be purchased or borrowed in the arrangement exhibits. Exhibitors must make arrangements at are to be made after bringing to place of exhibit.

Exhibitor must have entries listed on sheet of paper before arriving at entry desk. This list must be checked by classification committee before exhibitor places her exhibit. Exhibits in Specimen classes must be shown in containers all alike. Each Garden Club member is required to enter three or more classes.

In the Specimen Exhibits you may bring roses, bulbs or tubers, corms (gladiolus, etc.), Lillies or so-called lilles, Iris, Vines, Perennials (to be judged according to variety). Shrubs, low growing or tall growing, Growing Plants, potted plants must have been in possession of exhibitor for three months.

In the Arrangements Exhibits there may be mass arrangement, line arrangement, miniature arrangement, single flower arrangement, pieces of art for background or accessory for arrangements, arrangement for entrance hall, arrangement of dry and/or succulent material and leaves.

The Show is expected to draw many entries and a large crowd of interested spectators. There is no admission charge.

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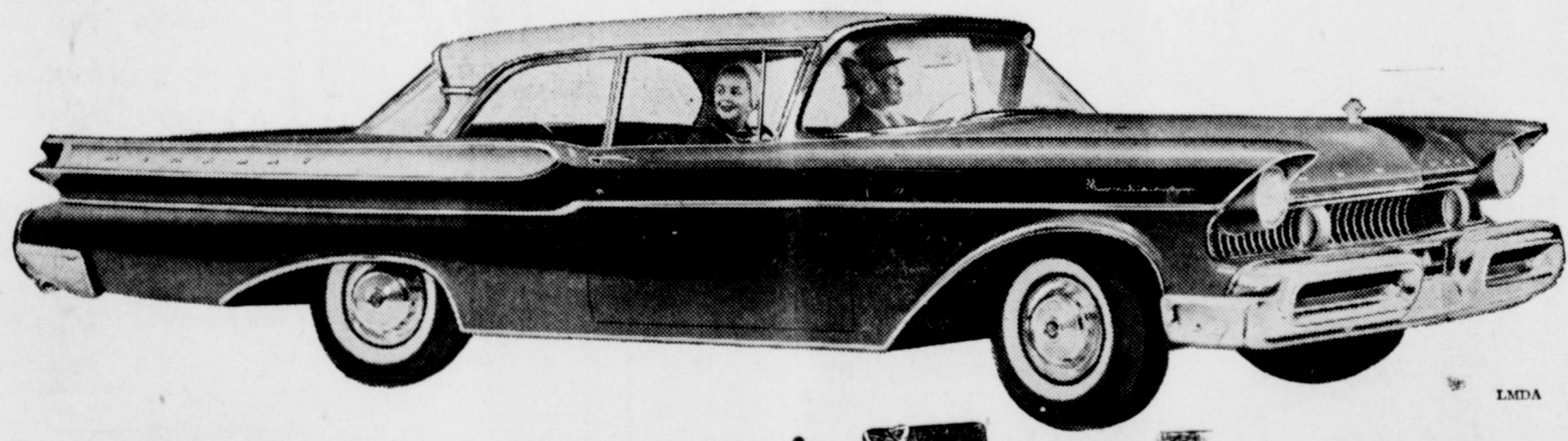

BONDS AND INTEREST

Dear Mr. Kirk:

I read with (some) interest your article by Mr. Ulmer Bird regarding interest being paid by the County and Independent School Districts on bond issues which provided the many fine improvements in Coke County.

First, I would rather take issue with Mr. Bird in his statement that this half million dollars did not pay one cent to Coke County citizens. Perhaps there was not an actual handout of a few dollars to each individual, but it would appear to me that every citizen in the County and School Districts have received more than can be measured in dollars and cents in providing their children with modern educational facilities, recreational facilities, and a town and county they are proud to call their own.

Secondly, it seems that Mr. Bird expects investors to come into Coke County and drop a cool million bucks there, to be paid back over a period of some twenty years without any remuneration whatsoever. Suppose your local financing institutions were in a

position to loan the various municipalities this amount of money do you realize what the interest would amount to? If you will note the interest rates that are applicable to the various issues, you can see that Coke County has done well in its financing. That same money would cost the 1% to 1½% more than it did at the time of your bond issues.

Third — regarding the statement that the interest money leaves the county, never to return. I am wondering of Mr. Bird has taken the time to realize where about 90% of the interest money comes from — from Coke County citizens — from oil companies in Dallas, Fort Worth and other parts of the State. What do they realize out of it? The same thing that the residents of the county receive — a place where children of their employees can enjoy the educational and recreational facilities provided by the county.

Now Mr. Bird — if you loan someone a thousand bucks for ten years, wouldn't you expect a little return on your money in the form of "interest"?

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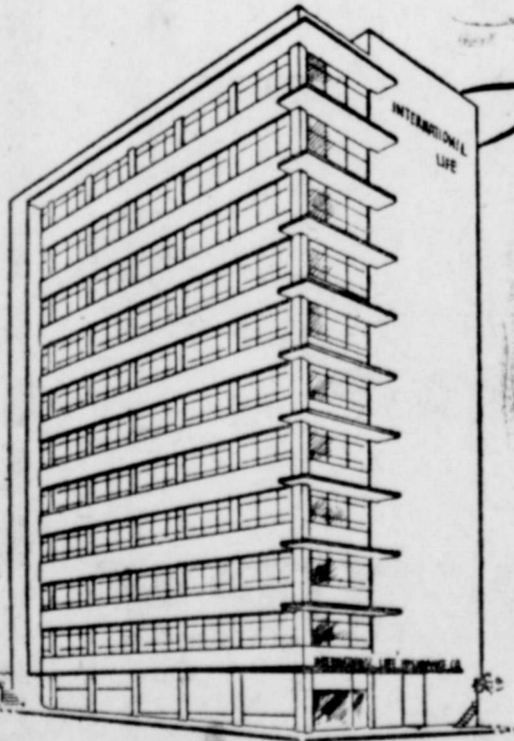
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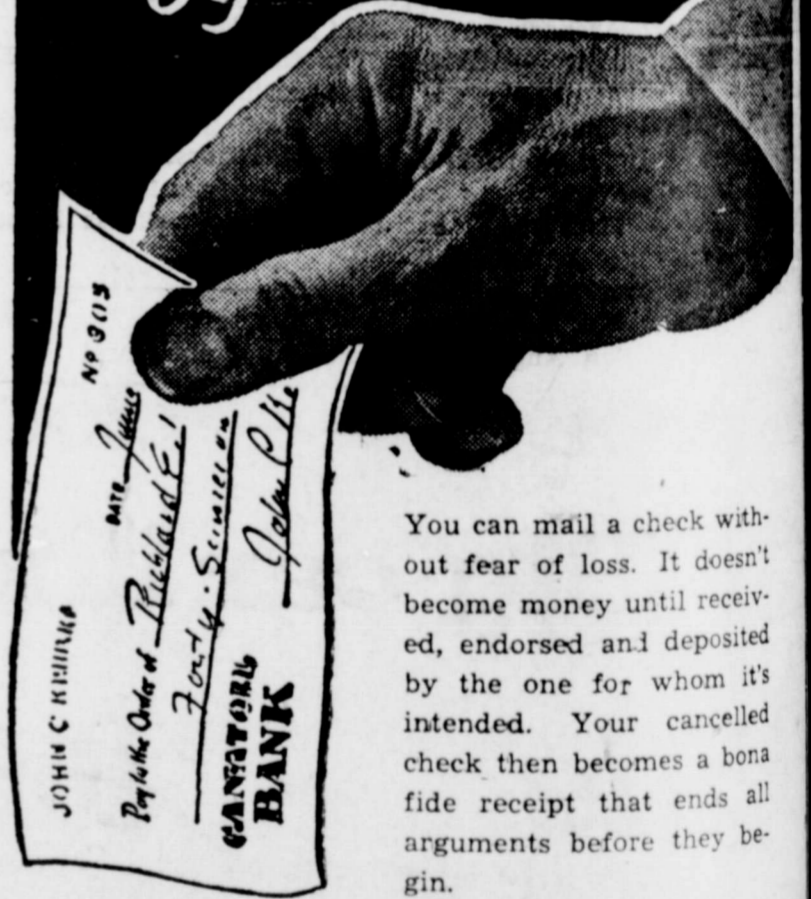

County Trend Looking Good

Latest outlook on poultry indicates higher egg prices for this hatchery production for egg hatching the first three months of the year is off 25%. This could mean unusually high egg prices in the near future.

Production of broilers in 1957 has averaged 6% higher than the same period in 1956; broiler growers may be getting a better time in the near future. Production of broilers has dropped steadily as compared with the same months last year. The eggs on set April 1 are equal to those on set on April 1, 1956. The same trend is expected for several months to come in a very significant reduction in broilers late in 1957. We certainly hope this happens. Broiler growers and egg producers have been operating at a very slim margin for some time. The latest report is the first really encouraging report we have had in about a year. This isn't such good news for consumers, but we are having a better time now. Who can ask for a better time than eggs at 40c per dozen. It figures about 27 cents per dozen for one of the most nutritious foods you can buy.

Present outlook for small grain is encouraging over the entire state. Oats should be a real crop in a couple of months. Our crop in Coke County won't amount to much, but we may have an opportunity to buy some at a price that will make us money. It isn't early to give it some thought. Generally speaking oats at 51 cents per bushel is equal to corn at 1.05 per bushel or milo at 1.75 per 100.

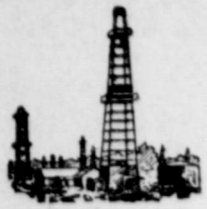

Gulf To Drill On Simpson Near Sanco

A new wildcat 10 miles north west of Robert Lee has been staked as Gulf No. 1-A Marvin Simpson. Location is 660 feet from the south and east lines of Section 317, blk. 1-A, H&TC.

Proposed depth is 7,500 feet with rotary. A drilling contract has not been announced.

The 301-acre lease owned by Gulf is due to run out May 20, 1957.

The wildcat is two miles southeast of the depleted San Benito field, where Allen Guiberson found some production on Jack Lassiter.

HUMBLE BIRD HAS SHOW

Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 1 I. A. Bird, et ux, Coke County 7,100-foot rotary wildcat located 12 miles northwest of Robert Lee recovered gas and a small amount of oil on a drillstem test in an unidentified formation between 5,584-90 feet.

Tool was open 90 minutes. Recovery was 900 feet of dry gas and 45 feet of slightly oil and gas-cut mud, 5 per cent oil. Pressures were unreported.

Operator cored from 5,597-604 feet for a recovery of seven feet of black shale, no shows.

The project was drilling ahead.

A plug-back operation in the Jameson - Strawn area will be the New Seven Falls Co. of Abilene No. 1 R. B. Allen, 5 miles northwest of Robert Lee.

Location is 467 feet from the south and east lines of J. O. West Survey. The project formerly produced above total depth of 6,440 feet. New bottom will be 6,300 feet.

No new drilling locations have been announced in the vicinity of

the two discovery wells brought in recently. They are Sun's Cynthia Malone, northwest of Robert Lee near Panther Gap, and Plymouth No. 1 Tidwell, five miles east of Robert Lee.

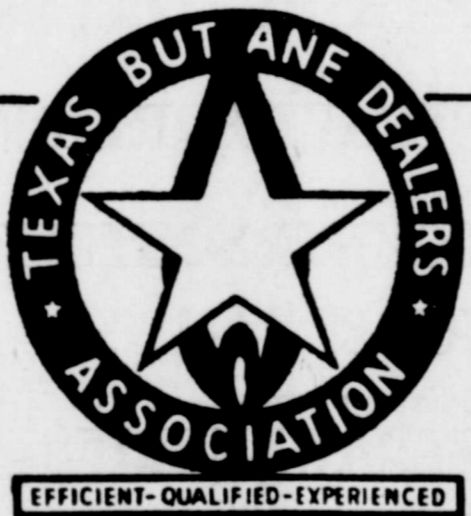
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
