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

### **Notary Publics** May 24, 1957 To Qualify At **Clerk's Office**

Secretary of State Zollie Steakley has announced that he will reap. point persons now holding notary public commissions but that such persons must re-qualify by the filing of a new oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between June 1, 1957 and June 10, 1957.

Steakley emphasized that notaries public should not send requests for reappointment or for commissions directly to the Sec. retary of State. The law specifically requires the County Clerks to approve notary bonds.

Any person not now a notary public who desires appointment should apply to his County Clerk between May 1, 1957 and May 20. 1957. Application during this period will assure prompt attention before the rush procedure of reappointing present notaries.

Secretary of State Steakley further pointed out that each person applying for a commission as a notary public must be at least 21 Mr. and Mrs. Tommy Black and years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address must be furnished the County Clerk.





The band was one of the impressive organizations of the year. They played three local concerts, won numerous music awards, and won the regional "sweepstakes" award in Abilene.




It looks like a fine show for Friday night, so everybody come on out to the Green Mountain Musical. Show time is 8 p.m. No admission is charged for the show.
