Sinking and interest funds will be shown in the recapitulation of various county funds, the schedule of which is to appear next week.

County-wide sinking and interest funds are set up to pay off bonds and interest on the Hospital, Court House and Park bond issues.

These bonds were authorized by a majority vote of the people to be issued against the Permanent Improvement Fund, commonly referred to as the Court House and Jail Fund, and no additional tax levies were required.

Last year 25c was levied for the Permanent Improvement Fund and 18c of this went into the sinking and interest fund created to retire the above bond issues.

Precincts 1, 2, and 3 have road bond levies voted by two-thirds majorities in their respective precincts. Extra taxes levied for this purpose in these precincts last year were as follows:


Skyhawk manager claims the grounds were too wet and for that reason he did not attempt to field a team. The matter is to be arbitrated at a hearing this week.

livered 1,200 blackface crossbred lambs to Midwest feed yards in San Angelo. Considered the best the yard had handled in more than 10 years, the lambs were raised on the Weaver Ranch, south of Robert Lee. They weighed from 88 to 94 pounds and averaged around 91 pounds. Rains continued over the past weekend. Heavy downpours occurred, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, with small showers following on Sunday and Monday.

May turned out to be a wet month with a total of 7.10 inches. June started out in grand style with 2.20 inches being gauged during the first four days.

Despite wet roads and rainy skies, the Methodist church was well filled and the tabernacle crowded afterward with home comers and local people Sunday at the annual Homecoming event marking the 70th aniversary of the founding of Sanco.

Farthest comers were Randall Gartman, from Durango, Colorado, who travelled 1015 miles, and Mr. and Mrs. Tee Green and Pruett(Prue) Green of Phoenix, Arizona. Third was Tennis Creighton, of Bristow, Arizona.

Guy Denman, president of the Sanco Community Association, which sponsors the homecoming, welcomed the visitors. Rev. H. L. Bloodworth of Saver, formerly pastor of the Sanco Baptist Church, brought the sermon.

"Looking Forward from Seventy Years" was the general theme, and the fact was stressed that such a rural community with its history of home building and its people spread over the land is a living thing, whose future does not depend on oil wells, but in the spirit of its people.

Hymns of home and heaven were sung by a quartette and a double quartette of Sanco people: Bryan Gartman, Guy Denman, Mrs. Velma Denman, Harvey Reid, Miss Lvon Reid, I. A. Bird, Rev. John E. Early, and Miss Annice Gartman.

Miss Julia Nell Killam sang "The Love of God." Mrs. Josephine Bird, Sanco postmaster, was pianist.

Eleven persons seventy years of age or older, were recognized. Of these, Mrs. Emma McGallian, 79, was presented a corsage as the oldest person present. Mrs. Julia Bird, 78, was a close runner-up.
