

Rules Govern Operation Of County Pools

Rules and regulations concerning operation of the new county parks and swimming pools in Robert Lee and Bronte are published in this issue of The Observer.

The projects have been in operation for a month giving custodians some idea as to the sort of regulations that should be enforced.

Park boards in the two communities are responsible for proper handling of the recreation centers and their decisions are approved by the commissioners court before going into effect.

Also set forth are rules governing the new community building which is an added feature in the Robert Lee Park. This building is available for private parties and picnics and a specified rental charge has been agreed upon.

The idea of charging for swimming or use of the community building is to raise enough money if possible to care for their operation and maintenance.

While Coke County has experienced hot weather only the past week, the pools have attracted good crowds from the start. Thus far 82 season tickets have been sold for the Robert Lee pool. Number of persons who have used the pool up to Sunday night was 2,149, and total receipts are \$704.80 Largest number in the pool any one day was 143.

The Robert Lee pool opens at 1:30 daily and tan closing hour has been 8 p.m. week days and 6 p.m. on Sundays. However, weekday closings will be extended until 9 o'clock or later if there is a demand.

R. C. (Buzz) Sawyer is custodian of the Robert Lee park and Aubrey Denman holds a similar position at Bronte.

Two new tennis courts at the Robert Lee park will soon be ready for play. Steel nets have been ordered and lights are to be installed for night games. Croquet courts are also being made ready.

It is understood that flood lights are to be moved to the base ball field so that Little League and soft ball games can be played at night.





The outgrowth of that gathering of about 100 townfolk in July, 1954, was an organization called the Indianola Citizens' Council. This, it is reported, was the first Citizens' Council, a movement that in a few months swept the South and gave loud voice to the Southern resistance to school desegregation.

Martin finds that this resistance movement is a remarkable achievement since it has uncompromisingly set its face against the mainstream of American thought as expressed by the Supreme Court of the land - and has thus far gotten away with it.

Elsewhere in the report, Martin explains that, to Southerners, the Court's decision seemed to do far more than break down segregation in the schools; it rent the seamless garment of apartness.

"Apartness of the races," he tells Post readers, "is a black and white thread woven into the fabric of Southern life - its social, political, cultural, sexual, economic life. Apartness is like a vine which, rooted in slavery, never uprooted, but merely twisted by the Civil War, flourished and by now entangles everyone and everything in a suffocating net from which no one, white or black, knows how to extricate himself.

"Its manifestations have an infinite richness and complexity.

2-4-D Spraying For lunch we had barbecued Gives Sandusky **Good Results**

Austin Sandusky is happy with the resuts of his first use of 2-4-D weed killer. Sandusky said that he sprayed 40 acres of grass mixture, seeded under the Conservation Reserve of the Soil Bank program. "The grass is up to a good stand and some of the grasses on the tighter soils are growing off nicely. The sandier soils are so cold and wet that grasses have not begun to grow," he said. He believes that 2-4-D, properly used is an important part of establishing grass.

L. E. Smith and Son, Coke County Conservation District Cooperators, have pushed about 100 acres of mesquite with good results. The bulldozing was done on their ranch in the south part of Coke County. They reséeded with Blue Panicum, Buffalo Grass, Sideoats grama, and a small plot was seeded to Sorghum Almum.

They tried several methods of seeding, finally deciding on a home rigged seeder. The seeder consisted of two large buckets with a hole about the size of a pencil in the bottom. A bucket was extended over each track of the dozer and the vibration from moving acted as the agitator.

The grass seed dropped on the tracks and were pressed in the

ground. No seed was put in the holes. Mr. Smith said that he had observed that plants grow better on the side of the hole rather than right in the bottom.

The small plot of Sorghum Almum sprouted vigorously and some was as high as five feet. The Blue Panicum, seeded at the same time, was from one inch to one foot and the native grasses, sideoats grama and buffalo, were from one to three inches in height. The Blue Panicum seedlings, in some places, followed a perfect outline of the dozer's track.

Simth said he plans to defer this pasture during the growing season this year, stating that he believed deferred grazing is a must with Write to: brush control and range reseeding.



The level of price support for the 1958 crop of wheat is one of the issues to be decided by farmers voting in the June 20 referendum on marketing quotas, C. E. Arrott, chairman of the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, reminds the growers.

The other issue is whether marketing quotas, with penalties on 'excess' wheat, shall be in effect for next year's crop. Quotas have been in effect for the last four consecutive wheat crops.






