All dogs and cats should be vaccinated for rabies every year to insure the most protection against rabies. As most of you know, there have been outbreaks of rabid animals here in the county in the last year and it would be a much more secure feeling to know that our pet cats and dogs were protected. The price for this rabies vaccination is \$2.50 per animal.

If anyone desires to have their horses vaccinated for sleeping sickness vaccination of horses is \$3.50 per animal.

Let's try to have a good turn out on July 12 and bring all cats. dogs, and horses you wish to be vaccinated to the place nearest you.






