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

West Texas Utilities Company announced Thursday plans for constructing a large multi million dollar power plant in Coke County. The new plant will be located on Oak Creek Lake in the northeastern corner of the county.

WTU will spend an estimated \$51,000,000 during the next five years for construction of new electric facilities in West Texas. New generating equipment for WTU, including one new power plant in Coke County is expected to cost over \$22,500,000 and will increase by more than two-thirds the company's system generating capa-

The 117 acre site selected for the power plant is on the west shore of Oak Creek Lake and is immediately adjacent to Highway 70 which runs form Sweetwater to Bronte. A 57 acre portion of the site has been purchased from the city of Sweetwater, and the company is negotiating with Charles Copeland, Coke County ranchman, for the purchase of an additional 60 acres to complete the tract.

#### NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37 proposing an amendment to Sub-section (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGIS-LATURE OF THE STATE OF

Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Con-stitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as

Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the State, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this State as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employwho are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the State, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classification of officers and employees of judicial districts of this State as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection: and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 48-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection except as permitted by Section 63 of Article XVI of this Constitution. Provided, however, any officer or employee of a county as provided for in Article XVI. Section 62. Subsection (b) of this Constitution, shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection, except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person or by the State of Texas for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States or in the Unit in bonds of the United States, or in bonds of the United States, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States; or in such other securities as are now or hereafter may be permitted by law as investments for the Permanent University Fund or for the Permanent School Fund of this State, under the same limitations and re-Permanent School Fund of this State, under the same limitations and restrictions imposed by the Constitution for investment of those funds and subject to such regulations as the Legislature may provide. However, a sufficient amount of said Fund shall be kept on heard to meet the immediate payment.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to the Con-stitution of Texas adding a section to be known as Section 49-c of Article of bonds of the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State; providing for the payment of such bonds; creating an agency to administer said Fund and to perform other duties prescribed by law; limiting the period during which financial assistance may be granted; and providing for the calling of an election and the publication and issuance of the pro-clamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-c, as follows:

"Section 49-c. There is hereby cre-ated as an agency of the State of Texas the Texas Water Development Board to exercise such powers as nec-essary under this provision together with such other duties and restrictions as may be prescribed by law. The qualifications, compensation, and num-ber of members of said Board, shall be determined by law. They shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate in the manner and for such terms as may be prescribed by law.

The Texas Water Development Board shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Million Dol-lars (\$100,000,000). The Legislature of lars (\$100,000,000). The Legislature of Texas, upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected Members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue additional bonds in an amount not exceeding One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The bonds authorized herein or permitted to be authorized by the Legislature shall be called 'Texas Water Development Bonds,' shall be executed in such form, denominabe executed in such form, denomina-tions and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall not bear more than four per cent (4%) interest per annum: they may be issued in such installments as the Board finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the

purpose set forth herein.

"All moneys received from the sale of State bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created in the State Treasury to be known as the Texas Water Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the Texas Water Development Board in such manner as prescribed by law.
"Such fund shall be used only for the purpose of aiding or making funds

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT available upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe, to the various political subdi-visions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas including river authorities, conservation and reclama-tion districts and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 59 or Article III, Section 52, of this Constitution, interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party and municipal corporations, in the conservation and de-velopment of the water resources of velopment of the water resources of this State, including the control, stor-ing and preservation of its storm and flood waters and the waters of its rivers and streams, for all useful and lawful purposes by the acquisition, im-provement, extension, or construction of dams, reservoirs and other water storage projects, including any system necessary for the transportation of necessary for the transportation of water from storage to points of treatment and/or distribution, including fa-cilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or methods.

"Any or all financial assistance as provided herein shall be repaid with interest upon such terms, conditions and manner of repayment as may be provided by law.

"While any of the bonds authorized by this provision or while any of the bonds that may be authorized by the Legislature under this provision, or any interest on any of such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is here-by appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each cal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or ecome due during such fiscal year. less the amount in the sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year

"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Water Development Fund, and the interest and sinking funds estab-lished for the payment of bonds issued by the Texas Water Development Board. Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes pre-scribed by the Legislature. The Legislature may also make appropriations from the General Revenue Fund for paying administrative expenses of the "From the moneys received by the

Texas Water Development Board as repayment of principal for financial assistance or as interest thereon, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this Section sufficient moneys to pay the interest and principal to become due during the ensuing year and sufficient to establish and sufficient sufficient to establish and maintain a reserve in said fund equal to the equirements on all outstanding bonds assued under this Section. If any year prior to December 31, 1982 moneys are received in excess of the foregoing requirements then such excess shall be deposited to the Texas Water De-

velopment Fund, and may be used for administrative expenses of the Board and for the same purposes and upon the same terms and conditions prescribed for the proceeds derived from the sale of such State bonds. No grant of financial assistance shall be made under the provisions of this Section after December 31, 1982, and all moneys thereafter received as repayment of as interest thereon shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the State bonds: except that such mount as may be required to meet the administrative expenses of the Board may be annually set aside; and provided, that after all State bonds have been fully paid with interest, or after there are on deposit in the in-terest and sinking fund sufficient mon-eys to pay all future maturities of principal and interest, additional mon-eys so received shall be deposited to

General Revenue Fund.
"All bonds issued hereunder shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general continues. eral obligations of the State of Texas

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1957, same being the 1st Tuesday after the 1st Monday in said November, 1957, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon, the following words:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2 proposing an amendment to Article III, Section 51a of the Constitution of Texas, so as to increase the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children; and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants.

"(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state shall be paid to any inmate of any state supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years, provided that no such assistance shall

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants.

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall sum the election and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Proceeds of e license fees will be paid into State Treasury by the Comssioner of Agriculture in a fund be called the Egg Law Enforceent Fund.


