Menard Yellowjackets come to Robert Lee Friday night for a game against the Steers. It is the last home game until Loraine Bulldogs appear in Robert Lee on the night of Nov. 8.

Menard's record this year is not too bright. After opening with a 33-0 win over Melvin, they lost 32-0 to Mason and tied the strong Boerne club at 13 all. The Yellowjackets licked Eden 34-18 but last week suffered a 64-0 defeat from Class AA San Saba.

Alex Crowder is the new coach at Menard and seemed to be bringing his squad along in fine style. The Yellowjackets were not at full strength last week, but are expected to be in shape when they travel to Robert Lee this Friday.

Robert Lee looked better than it has all season in winning last week's tilt from Eldorado. The entire team shows improvement and the squad seems in good physical and mental condition as it starts the second half of a schedule of ten games.

After the Menard battle, the remaining four contests will be a gainst conference foes in District 6-B. Abilene Reporter-News writers picked the Steers as favorites to win the loop championship. Thus far none of the other clubs have come up with a better record than Robert Lee. This may be the year! The Observer believes the Steers can go all the way if they continue to improve and keep hustling. Their weakness is in forward passing, both on offense and defense.

Conference play started last week with Trent defeating Loraine 21-13. There will be more action this week when Hermleigh Cardinals meet the Bronte Longhorns on the Bronte field. Hermleigh downed Roby last week 20-7 while the Longhorns had an open date. Loraine plays at Stanton and Trent goes to Roscoe.

# 2 Killed in Crash On Highway 158

A headon smashup in the west edge of Coke County Saturday night killed the drivers of both automobiles and injured six other persons.

The dead were Eldon Ferrell Champion, 39, and John Paul Wilkinson, 48, both of Midland.

Champion's wife, Floy Dell, and her son, Ronnie, 11, were brought to Coke Memorial Hospital here with serious injuries.

George W. Putnam, Jr., 27, also was brought to the hospital in Robert Lee because of head injuries.

## Scout Campaign Launched Here With Breakfast

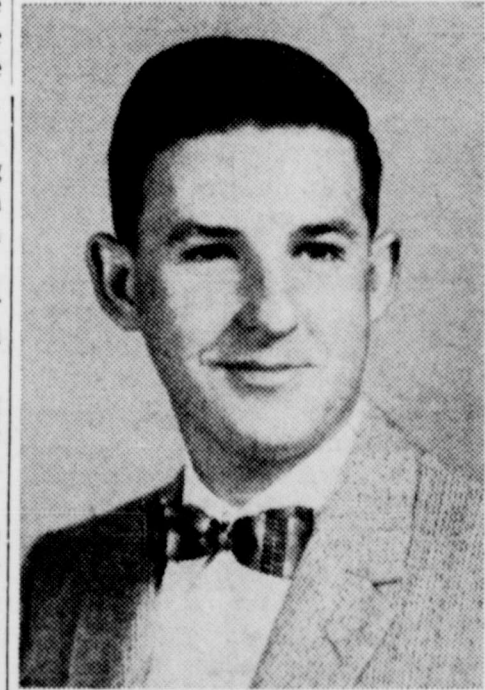
A campaign to raise funds to support Bok Scout activities in the Concho Valley area was launched here Tuesday with a breakfast at the Baptist Church dining room.

son, David Smith, 15, and Gene Mixon, all of Midland. The elder Smith suffered a leg fracture and his son had multiple cuts and bruises.

Bill Chancellor, also of Midland, was in the accident but was not hospitalized.

The accident occurred about 8 p.m. on Highway 158 near the Coke-Sterling county line. Champion and his family were enroute from Midland to Comanche, while Wilkinson and his party were headed for Midland after an afternoon of dove hunting on the Palmer Leeper Ranch north of Sanco.

Highway Patrolman James Cantrell investigated the accident. It is reported that Champion got over on the wrong side of the highway while making a sharp turn, and his Ford sedan collided head-on with the Wilkinson Cadillac.

A Foremost truck driver came by and reported the accident from the Sun Millican camp west of Edith. The Clift ambulance hurried to the scene and an ambulance from Sterling City was also called into service.

Both Champion and Wilkinson were thought to have been killed outright. The Cadillac had a front wheel torn off and came to a stop a considerable distance away in a pasture. Bodies of the two men were brought to the Clift Funeral Home. Wilkinson's body was taken to Midland Sunday and the Champion body was sent to Comanche.

Mrs. Champion, who suffered three back fractures, and her son, with a broken ankle, were transferred to a Comanche hospital Sunday.

Putnam remained in the hospital here until Tuesday and appeared to be recovering rapidly from his injuries. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. George W. Putnam, Sr., came from Fort Worth after being notified of the accident and took their son to Midland Tuesday afternoon. The elder Mr. Putnam is manager of the Westbrook Hotel in Fort Worth.

Wilkinson was an independent oil lease broker and the group with him were employees of Humble Oil & Refining Co. at Midland. He had negotiated some leases from the Leeper and Arledge families the past summer and it was his second trip to the ranch to hunt dove.

He was an immediate past president of the Midland Rotary Club and was well known among oil men in West Texas. He is survived by his wife, three daughters and a son.

Putnam is a recent law graduate of the University of Texas and started work last month in the land department of Humble's district office at Midland. He is unmarried. Later reports indicate all others in the Wilkinson party are recovering at their homes in Midland.

Champion had been a resident of Midland four years and formerly resided at Comanche and Cross Plains. His funeral was held Monday afternoon at Cross Plains. The man's parents are distant cousins of Mrs. S. Blair of Robert Lee. Jeff Blair and his son, Daniel, attended the funeral service.

## Grand Jury Is Re-Called For Holdup Charge

Judge Joe L. Mays has called the 51st District Court Grand Jury to reconvene in Robert Lee at 9 a. m. Saturday to consider robbery and assault charges against James Horton, 23, of Sweetwater.

Horton, a Negro, is charged with kidnapping Turney Casey in the victim's home the night of Sept. 27. Casey and his wife had attended a football game and found the Negro in their home when they returned.

When threatened by the robber, Casey turned over \$4.00 to him. The Negro was apprehended 16 hours later on the highway north of Bronte and has since been in the county jail.

Former residents of Robert Lee, the Casey family now live at Bronte where Turney is employed as an auto mechanic. They reside in a new home a short distance north of Bronte.

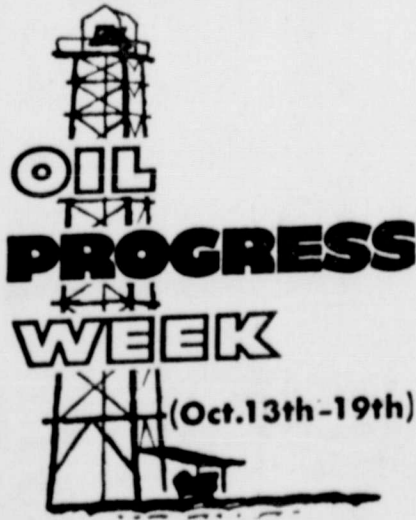
All parents who have children in the band are considered members of the Band Club. Dues have been set at \$1.00 per person and are payable.

**PECCARY IS CORRECT**

Delmir Sheppard answered our request for help in identifying the wild boars recently killed on the A. B. Sheppard ranch southwest of Robert Lee. He looked up the matter in a state Fish & Game pamphlet which stated they were properly known as PECCARY (or javelina.) Javelina is Spanish and the j is pronounced like an h, so it sounds like "havelina."

Some parts of the state have a closed season on the animals most of the year, but they are rare in these parts and are not protected as far as we can learn.

They're mean, too, Delmir says. Would make it rough on a flock of sheep or chickens and destroy crops.

Some folks still hold that they may have descended from the big bunch of hogs raised on the March Ranch years ago. They got rid of most of them, but some went wild.

The boys who killed off the two boars the other day didn't know that might be a closed season and there could be a violation. In case of a trial they will get Samuelson to defend them.

My reference book, an old one, didn't mention javelina, but had the following: "Peccary, a genus of animals nearly allied to the swine. One species, the collared peccary, about three feet long, occurs abundantly in South America and is also found in North America, living generally in small flocks. Their food consists of mace, potatoes, sugar cane and similar materials, and cultivated fields suffer much from their raids."

Dear Kirk:  
I found the name of those wild hogs Mr. Boykin ran onto last week. They are Jabalinos, meaning in general wild hogs. Jabacito is little wild male hog and Jabacita a little wild female and Jabaino is a grown female. The Spanish gave them this name from their protruding tusk, which resembles a hand spear or jablin that they threw years ago.

Mexicans name things rather funny, like Indians, only more attractive. They call windmill papalote from a toy paper mill, meaning turning paper. They named the Armadillo from the armor he has on his back.
