Following upon an 11 percent increase in fatalities last year, January 1941 established a record peak of 161 deaths for that month Colonel Garrison said, with a 32 percent increase in highway fata-

Cities decreased deaths by 8 for a 16.7 percent improvement, and county roads saw 2 less persons die for a decrease of 11.8 percent from January a year ago.

Increases were recorded in cities of less than 2.500 population, up and on highways, up 23 deaths for a gain of 32,4 percent.
