Steers vs Loraine Last Home Game

MORE GOOD MOISTURE

Slow rains and drizzle the past few days have brought from an inch to 1½ inches of moisture to Coke County. There was no runoff and the additional late moisture has given fields and pastures the best winter seasoning in many years. Temperatures have been cool. Clearing weather was in prospect for the latter part of the week.

Coke Voters Approve 3 Amendments

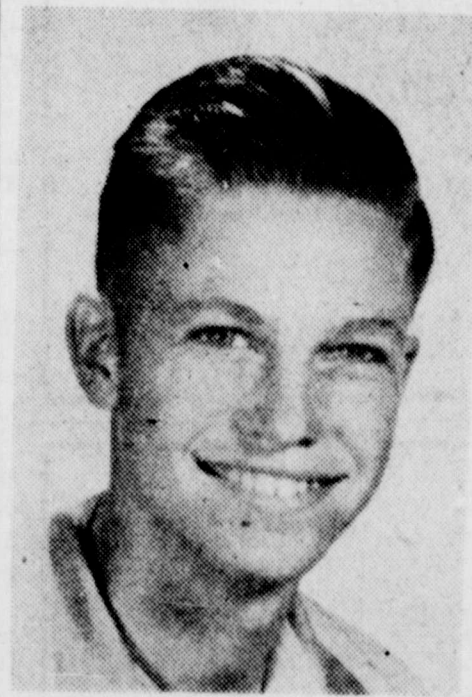
Only 252 Coke County voters turned out Tuesday for the special election, but they gave heavy endorsement of the three constitutional amendments which were submitted.

The county vote was:

1. State Employees Retirement Fund—For 142, Against 102.
 2. Increase Old Age Pensions—For 212, Against 38.
 3. State Bond Issue for Water Conservation—For 199, Against 46.
- Bronte's voting box led with 66 ballots being cast. Robert Lee had 53 and Silver 27. There was only one absentee ballot, according to County Clerk J. L. (Chilly) Tinkler.
- All three amendments were approved in the state-wide voting.

Last football game of the season will be played in Robert Lee Friday night when the Steers entertain the Bulldogs from Loraine. Kickoff time is 7:30 and there will be special halftime activities, including crowning of the 1957 football queen.

This will be a do or die contest for Robert Lee to hold on to its tie for first place in District 6-B standing. Loraine hasn't won a game this year, but they are liable to this week if the Steers don't put up a better game than they did at Trent last week.

Loraine has a young club and the Bulldogs have shown improvement. Last week they held Hermleigh on even terms, only to lose by a heart breaking 12-7 verdict. Loraine jumped to a 7-0 lead in the first quarter when Halfback Gary Parnell skirted right end and rambled 63 yards for a touchdown.

Hermleigh made touchdowns in both the second and third quarters. Loraine drove to the 2-yard line in the fourth period, but lost the ball on a fumble.

Things brightened up a bit in the Steer corral the middle of the week with good drill sessions being held Tuesday and Wednesday. Sam Ed Skipworth received a foot injury at Trent and will be out of the lineup, but should be ready for the Bronte contest next week.

Skipworth is one of the Steer's strongest linemen, playing center on offense and a linebacker on defense. Bobby Cowley will take his place at center, but was having a light attack of flu Wednesday and went to the hospital for an overnight stay. Other players are in good shape.

Bronte Longhorns knocked off Class A Santa Anna Friday night 14-13. Bronte plays at Wylie this week. Another important conference scrap will be the Trent-Hermleigh battle at Hermleigh Saturday.

Bronte, Trent, Hermleigh and Robert Lee each have a shot at the conference co-championship. The first three have district records of 2 wins and 1 loss, while Robert Lee is 1 and 1. A victory over Loraine will put the Steers even with the other leaders.

Either Trent or Hermleigh will be eliminated this week, while the other co-champion hinges on the Bronte-Robert Lee contest at Bronte Nov. 15.

CAFE CHANGES HANDS

Mrs. V. T. McCabe, Well Known Here, Is Cancer Victim

Mrs. Victor McCabe, 41, resident of the community northwest of Silver for a number of years, died at 6 a. m. Sunday in the Sterling County Hospital at Sterling City.

After an exploratory operation late in the summer it was discovered she had a cancer and she later took X-ray therapy in Houston. She returned to her home in Colorado City and seemed to be making a good recovery.

Three weeks ago she was admitted to the Sterling Hospital where her condition took a turn for the worse Friday night, but her death came unexpected.

Services were held at 2:30 Monday p. m. in the First Baptist Church in Colorado City. Burial followed in McKenzieville cemetery, five miles northwest of Silver.

Mrs. McCabe was born Oct. 6, 1916, in San Angelo and was married there to Victor McCabe of Robert Lee Nov. 3, 1934. After ranching in Coke County they moved to the ranch they purchased near Silver. They moved to Colorado City in 1949, but continued to spend part time on the ranch.

"Pick," as she was familiarly known, had a wide circle of friends in this area who mourn her untimely death.

Survivors include her husband; a son, Truett McCabe of Andrews; a daughter, Vicki, of Colorado City; her father, Jack Matthews of Carlsbad; two sisters, Mrs. Edwin Aiken of Sweetwater and Mrs. Forest Foster of Sterling City; and a brother, Jackie Matthews of Abilene.

And you'd be dead by morning."

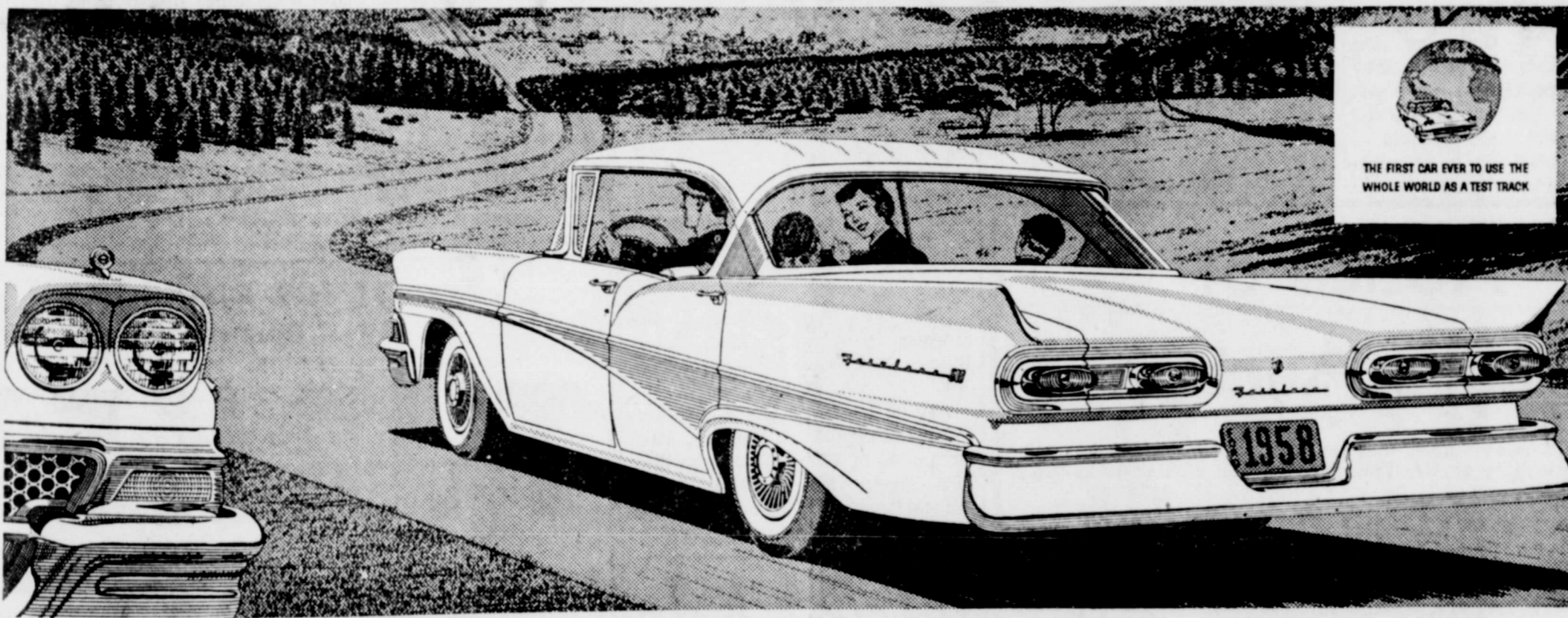
MRS. PUETT HERE

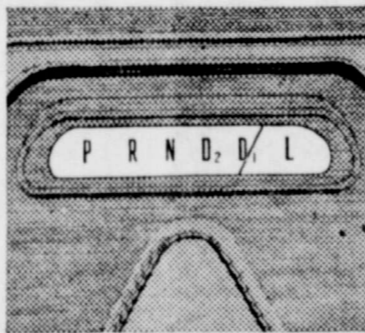

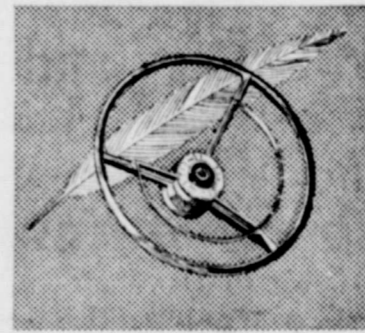

Notes From The Oil Field

Humble Finds Oil In McKinley Test

Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 1 A. F. McKinley, in 482-1A-H&TC, 3/4-mile southwest outpost to the I. A. B. (Menille Pennsylvanian and Strawn) field, 12 miles northwest of Robert Lee, has indicated production in the Pennsylvanian, possibly the Menille sand, with the flowing of gas and recovery of oil on a drillstem test between 5,663-5,710 feet.

On the 180-minute test, gas surfaced in six minutes and flowed at the daily rate of 106,100 cubic feet. Recovery was 2,700 feet of 41.3 gravity oil with a shakeout of two-tenths of 1 per cent basic sediment and water.

The project, scheduled for 6,300 feet to test the Strawn, was pulling a core below 5,758 feet.

Upper Pennsylvanian production was indicated earlier with the recovery of 330 feet of oil and gas-cut mud on a test between 5,482-510 feet and slightly oil-cut mud on tests between 5,560-5,610 feet and 5,507-5,560 feet.

The project is 1 mile southwest of the Menille sand discovery and lone producer from that pay.

NEW WILDCAT

Coke County gained a location for a deep wildcat and an outpost recovered oil in the Pennsylvanian.

Pan American Petroleum Corp. will drill an 8,000-foot Ellenburger wildcat, 16 miles northeast of Sterling County line. It will be drilled as the No. 1 J. E. Bynum.

Located on a 1,426-acre lease, it is 1,991 feet from the south and 660 feet from the east lines of 192-H&TC.

Shell Oil Co. No. 1 A. N. Rawlings, C. Rubio Survey 23, wildcat six miles southwest of Bronte, early this week was drilling below 4,346 feet in sand and shale. It has a proposed depth of 6,700 feet.

DRY HOLES

United States Smelting, Refining & Mining No. 1 Homer L. Carver wildcat, 2,310 feet from the north and east lines of 183-2-H&TC, 12 miles north of Edith, plugged abandoned at 6,828 feet after intensive tests in the Ellenburger through perforations between 790-813 feet and open hole between 6,813-28 feet.

The project indicated Ellenburger production on a test between 6,305-20 feet with the recovery of 450 feet of clean oil and 210 feet of oil and gas-cut mud. Ellenburger was topped at 6,790 feet in derrick floor elevation of 1,200 feet.

Murray Petroleum No. 2 Paul Roe, wildcat in J. Biwer Survey No. 502, eight miles west northwest of Robert Lee, plugged and abandoned at 6,733 feet. On a two-hour drillstem test between 6,711-741 feet in the Ellenburger, topped at 6,700 feet, recovery was 40 feet of drilling mud and 50 feet of salty sulphur water, which was slightly gas-cut. Flowing pressure was 90-215 pounds; one-hour shut-in pressure, 1,200 pounds.

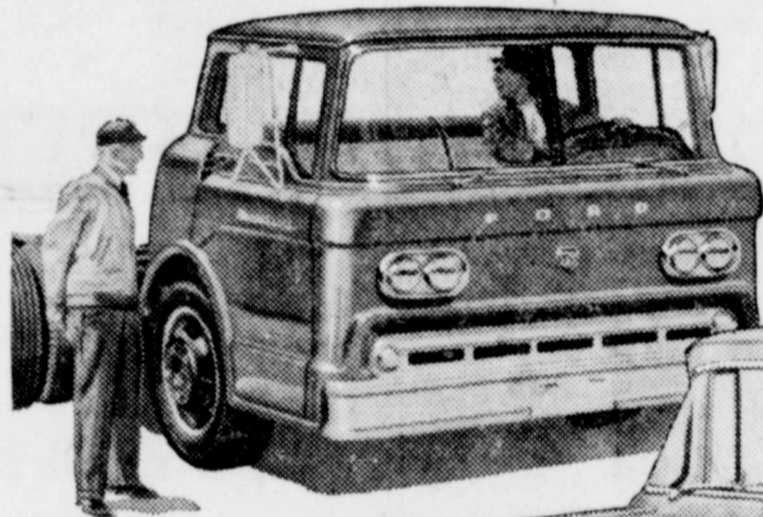

Taking the kickoff on their 25, Trent reeled off two 1st downs and were in possession on the Steer 45 as the quarter ended. Clayborn got loose around end for a 1st on the Robert Lee 10 and a moment later went for a touchdown. Jerry Williams converted the placement. Score: Trent 13, Robert Lee 7.

Robert Lee failed to cover a punt and Trent recovered on the Steer 36. Bright couldn't get off his pass and was dropped for a 12 yard loss. Ronnie Sims intercepted Clayborn's advance around end. Bright was thrown for another big loss, this time 15 yards. He got off a punt, but it was called back and a 15 yard holding penalty went against Trent. He finally got rid of the ball with Gary Ledbetter downing the pigskin on the Robert Lee 30.

Sawyer passed to McDaniel for 25 yards. A similar play was made for 6, but the Steers were penalized 15 yards and Sawyer passed to the Gorilla 32. This play was called back and a 15 yard holding penalty set the Steers back farther. Sawyer then punted

to the Trent 49. Trent lost 3 yards and three plays and a punt was taken by Robert Lee on their 30. McDonald picked up 10 yards in two carries and then made 14 around end as the half ended.

THIRD PERIOD
The third period opened with Trent taking the kickoff on their 38. They couldn't gain and punted to Stewart, who returned 25 yards to the Steer 48. A 15-yard clipping penalty set Robert Lee back to their 33. McDonald and Burson gained 9 yards in two plays and then Trent recovered a fumble on the Steer 36. Four line plunges made it a 1st down on the 26.

Clayborn got 9 around end but the play was nullified by a 15-yard holding penalty on Trent. The Gorillas were throwing passes in every direction and McDonald broke up the fourth attempt and the ball went to Robert Lee on their 25. Burson gained 8 and then carried to the 43 for a 1st down. McDonald got around right end for 20 yards and a 1st on the Gorilla 36. McDonald was good

for 5 yards in each of two tackle smashes, and a 15-yard penalty on a personal foul gave Robert Lee possession on the Trent 10.

They were stopped cold. Burson failed to gain around end and McDonald got only a yard over the left side. A short pass was incomplete. McDonald was stopped at right tackle and the ball went to Trent on their 10 as the third period ended.

FOURTH QUARTER
The Steer line held and Trent punted out to their 44, but Robert Lee was penalized 15 yards for roughing the kicker and Trent had a 1st down on their 25. The Gorillas marched to the Steer 38 in two series of plays, then lost the ball on downs when McDonald tackled Williams for a 5-yard loss.

Taking over on their 34 Sawyer connected with a pass to Burson who was downed on the Trent 15. But the play was called back when the referee ruled an illegal Robert Lee receiver was down field. Sims gained 10 yards thru the right side and Sawyer threw to Burson on the Trent 39. The pass allowed because of interference.

Sawyer lost 15 yards when he couldn't find a receiver. He then completed an aerial to McDaniel good for 18 yards. Sims got 4

yards at right tackle. Sawyer failed to connect with McDaniel on another pass and Trent took possession on their 36.

The Gorillas picked up short yardage in three tries and punted to the Steer 32. A gain of 5 yards by McDonald failed to stand up when the Steers were penalized 5 yards. Sawyer completed a 25 yard pass to Sims, but it was disallowed because of another offside penalty against Robert Lee. Bright then intercepted a pass and got back to the Steer 30. A 15-yard penalty on Robert Lee placed the ball down on the 15.

Bright and Williams were stopped in two plays, then Bright got 10 around end. It was nullified by a 15-yard holding penalty against Trent. Brown then circled his left end for a touchdown. A line play failed to convert and the game ended with Trent leading 19-7.

Mrs. Ed Hooten, Former Coke Resident, Dies

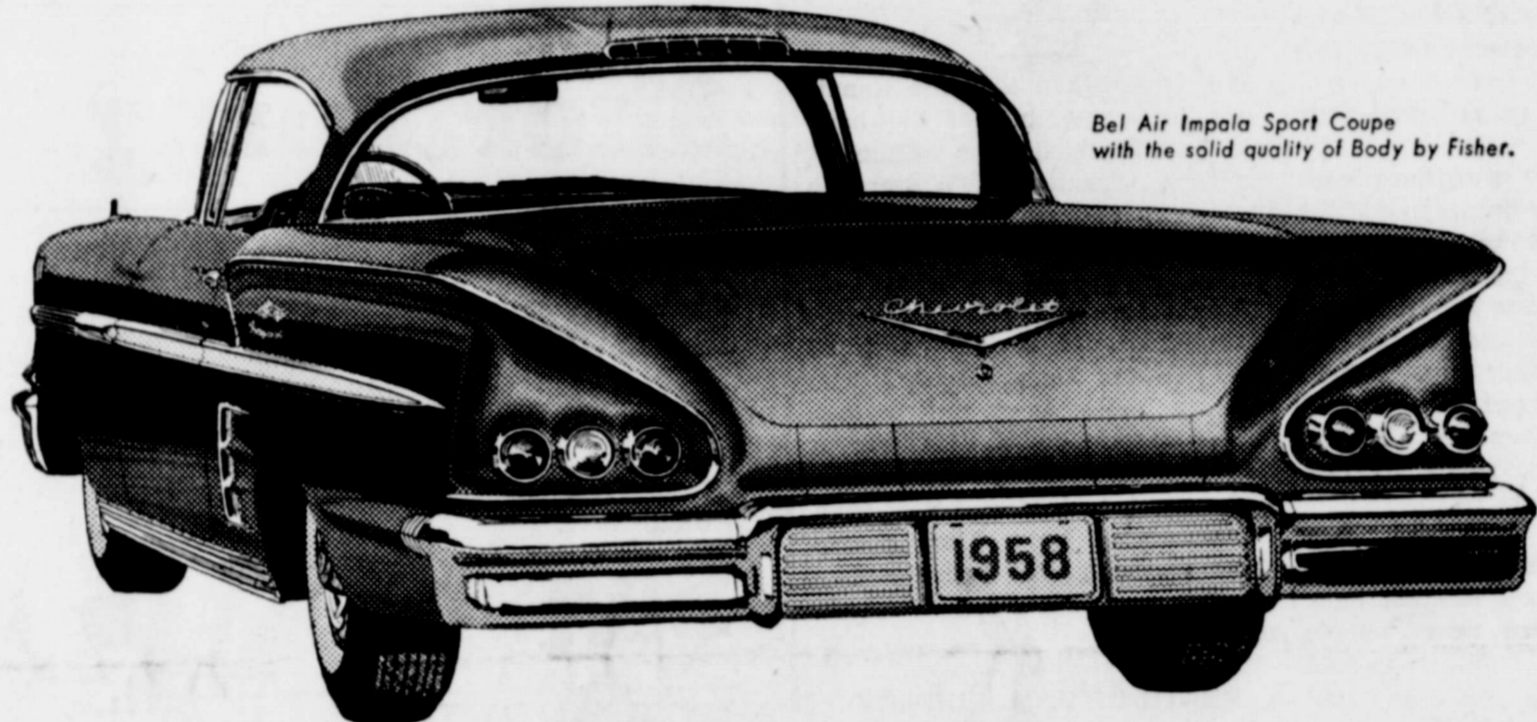

Mrs. Hooten was born in San Angelo in 1896 and married Ed Hooten at Robert Lee in 1928. Mr. Hooten died in 1934.

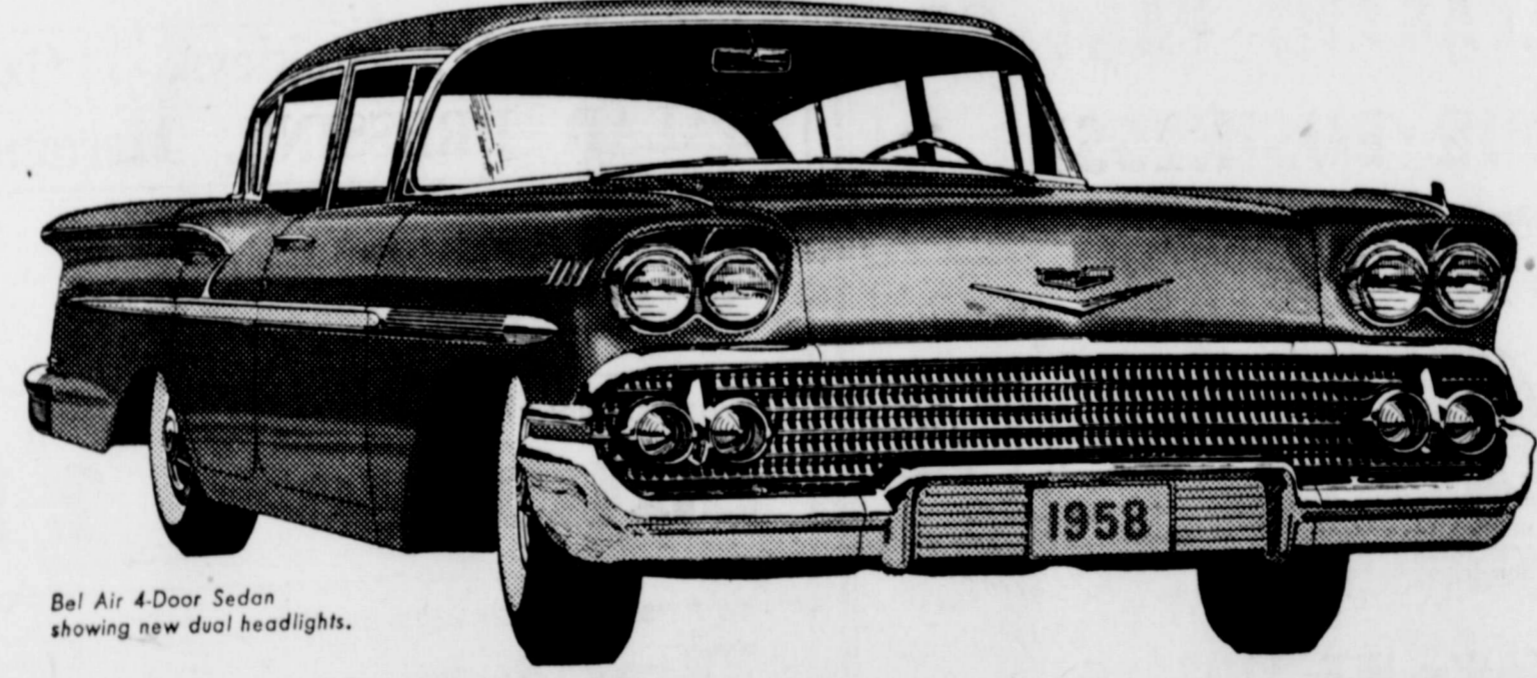
Mrs. Hooten had lived in Coke, Runnels and at Christoval in Tom Green County most of her life, but she was residing in San Angelo at the time of her death.

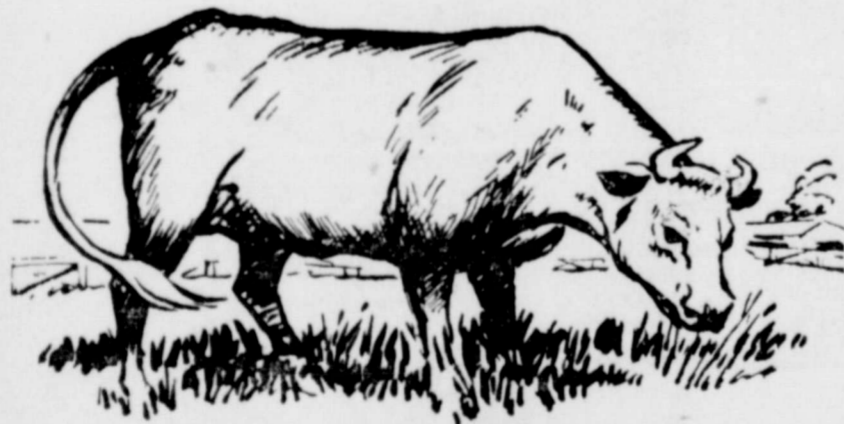
