Deer, Turkey Season Opens In Coke Nov. 16

For the first time in a number of years Coke County will be op-

son starts Saturday, Nov. 16, and continues through Dec. 31, both dates inclusive. The quail season extends from Dec. 1 through Jan.

Bag limits are two bucks with pronged horn per season and three turkey gobblers per season. Shooting hours are from 30 minutes before sunrise to 30 minutes after

There are no restrictions on the type of guns which may be used, except that shotguns used in hunting turkeys must be plugged to a 3-shell capacity.

All persons hunting deer and turkey are required to have a license. The license costs \$3.15 and may be purchased at the County Clerk's office, from C. D. Vann, game warden at the Sheriff's office, or at the Percifull Hardware Store in Robert Lee.

Hunters under 17 years of age are advised to secure an exempt license on which there is no charge. This also applies to adults hunting on their own premises.

Each hunting license has two coupons and one of them is to be attached to the ear of a buck after it is killed. Game Warden he advises hunters to observe these instructions.

Mr. Sheppard came here in February, 1948, when the Coke County Soil Conservation District was established, and is officially known as work unit conservationist and supervisor of employees. He will carry on similar work in Mitchell County.

The transfer was made by state officials of the Soil Conservation Service and is an apparent promotion for Mr. Sheppard, who has made an outstanding record.

He graduated from Texas A & M College in 1939 and then was with the PMA and other farm agencies at Crowell. He spent 31/2 years with the ground forces of the Air Force during World War II, being attached to the first wing of B-29 bombers that went to China and India. He was back on Tinian in the Marianno Islands when the war ended.

After his discharge Mr. Sheppard returned to Crowell and then to Big Spring where he became associated with the Soil Conservation Service and later accepted the Coke County appointment.

In 1942 he married Waltina Boyd of Jacksboro. They have two daughters, Martha Kaye, 11, and Melinda, 21 months old. The family own their home in Robert Lee. He will make his headquarters in Colorado City but his family will remain in Robert Lee for the present.

"Shep" has done excellent work with the soil conservation program, and he and his family have been fine assets to the community. He has served as president of the school board, and has taken an active part in community affairs and is a lay leader in the Robert Lee Church of Christ.



New Potential Field By Sun At 1 Menielle

Sun Oil Co. has worked over its No. 1 Menielle and the well remains a dual producer after a lower section in Canyon lime, around 6,200 feet, was abandoned.

No. 1 Menielle is a south offset to Humble No. I. A. Bird, discovery producer, about 10 miles northwest of Robert Lee.

New potentials filed by Sun for No. 1 Menielle are as follows:

Lower pay section: Menielle Pennsylvanian reef lime (IAB Zone), perforations from 5,578-97 and 5,704-50, flowed 158.18 barrels of oil, no water, during a 21½ hour test. Gauge was through a one-eighth inch tubing choke. Casing pressure was 1,040 pounds, with packer on the casing. Gasoil ratio 1,163-1.

Upper aone: Pennsylvanian sand (IAB) perforations from 5,-070-88 feet. During a 24-hour potential test it flowed 135.87 barrels of oil, trace of water, through a 10-64ths inch choke. Pressures were 675 pounds on tubing, 500 pounds on easing and gas-oil ratio

Wells in the new IAB Field are allowed to produce 120 barrels every day for a period of 18 months or until more than 5 wells are brought in.

Humble No. McKinley cemeted 5½ inch casing at a total depth of 6,175 feet.

Latest drillstem test was at 6,135-75 feet with the tool open two hours and 43 minutes. Recovery was 450 feet of salt water below the circulating sub. Gas surfaced in three minutes, and oil flowed in 20 minutes.

It produced gas at the rate of 629,000 cubic feet per day. The project flowed 56 barrels of fluid in 2 1/4 hours. The last hour it flowed 31 barrels of oil with a shakeout of 16 per cent water. Another test was taken at 6,110-

32 feet with the tool open 90 utes. Gas surfaced in three utes. Recovery was 1,980 fee clean oil, and 18 feet of salt wa

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
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

Chairman L. T. Youngblood of Bronte called the directors together after being requested by the state board to submit its contemplated future program as a basis for some state-wide planning.

Both Mr. Youngblood and Gerald Allen of Robert Lee, UCRA secretary, state that a long proposed Colorado River Dam below Robert Lee is still in their plans.

All but 270,000 acre feet of the Colorado River runoff has been appropriated to other agencies, Mr. Allen said. Smaller dams and conservation projects are also in the UCRA planning.

Attorney Carl Runge is compiling the UCRA program which will be presented to the Water Engineers next week.
