Game time will be 8 o'clock, Supt. Ira Hutchinson called Supt. Coalson the middle of the week and reported that Wink was closing up for the big game and would have a big delegation on hand to back the Wildcats. It's quite a jaunt, too-about 175 miles.

Admission will be \$1.00 for adults and 50c for students. Wink gets \$100 for expense money and after officials are paid the receipts will be divided equally between the two schools.
