Robert Lee Wins Game From Bronte Longhorns

Robert Lee Steers defeated the Bronte Longhorns 25-7 Friday on the Bronte field. It was a windup of the regular season schedule and gave the Steers a chance to represent District 6-B in the bi-district playoff against the champions of District 5-B.

Robert Lee was suffering from flu and injuries for weeks. Robert Lee presented a strong lineup Friday while the Longhorns were hampered badly by injuries. Dean had been out for several weeks and Aubrey Don Denman was out of his shoulder in scrimmage week. Tommy Latham, Bronte quarterback, had a bad knee, and was only able to play a part of the game against Robert Lee.

Robert Lee scored early after a Bronte fumble on the 38-yard line, with halfback Bub Burson skirting over the end for 20 yards and a touchdown. Freddie McDonald carried the ball to convert.

Another touchdown resulted at the end of the first period when Robert Lee got through right tackle for 20 yards to score. McDonald's conversion effort failed. The second quarter was scoreless as Robert Lee was ahead 13-0 at half time.

Freddie McDonald made good yardage in the third period and carried 7 yards for a touchdown. Tom Sawyers' kick from placement was good. Bronte took the next kickoff and a 62-yard march was culminated with Robert Moore going over the end for 8 yards and a Longhorn touchdown. He plunged into the end zone to convert and the score was: Robert Lee 19, Bronte 7.

Robert Lee's kickoff gave Robert Lee possession on their 45 from which they made a steady drive to the end zone, with McDonald scoring on an 8-yard end run. A line play converted. Bronte was unable to put on another effective drive and Robert Lee had the ball in the end zone as the game ended. Final score: Robert Lee 25, Bronte 7.

Robert Lee was superior throughout most of the contest, leading 16 first downs compared to 8 for Bronte.

Robert Lee girls suffered a trip defeat when they opened the ball season at Winters Friday night. Scores were: J. W. High, 38-9; B team, 33-31; A team, 38-22. Three games will be played when Winters comes to Robert Lee next Monday night.

River Indians closed out the ball season with a 14-0 junior victory at Colorado City Tuesday night. They are reported to have played their best game of the season.

Senator Yarborough will return to San Angelo after stops in Bronte and Robert Lee.

A reception for the Senator is being arranged here at the court house, with Mayor Cumbie Ivey, Jr. and county officials and their wives serving on the reception committee. Coffee will be served.

Everyone is invited to come out and shake hands with Senator Yarborough. This is his first trip to Coke County but in all his campaigns he has had good support from Coke County voters.

Long Time Coke Resident Buried Here on Monday

Mrs. John F. Robertson, 77, long time resident of Robert Lee, died at 1 p.m. last Friday at San Angelo where she had made her home the past few years.

Funeral services were held Monday at 2 p.m. at Johnson-Cox Chapel with burial in the Robert Lee cemetery. E. A. McMillan of the Jehovah's Witnesses church officiated.

Mrs. Robertson was a resident of Coke County for 51 years, but gave up her home in Robert Lee a few years ago and had since resided with her children.

Born Nov. 25, 1879, in Cook County, she married the late John F. Robertson in October, 1895, in Gainesville. Mr. Robertson died in February, 1947.

Survivors include a son, Ernest A. Robertson of San Angelo; four daughters, Mrs. Guy C. Saunders of McLean, Mrs. S. E. Shipman and Mrs. Thomas Miller, both of Dallas, and Mrs. Lois C. Ruckman of Lubbock; 17 grandchildren and 16 great-grandchildren.

Two vocal selections were given by the popular Bronte twins, June and Jean Moore. Linda Taylor 11-year-old Bronte girl, also sang a popular number. DaNell Dixon of Bronte, this year's girl Gold Star Award winner, gave an address of appreciation and the entertainment was concluded by Jerry Jameson giving one of his highly interesting pantomimes.

A highlight of the evening was the presentation of the Santa Fe Award to Mary Beth Schooler. Leland A. Turner, Santa Fe agricultural director, came from Amarillo to present the award in person. Miss Schooler, who is a student at Texas Tech, was on hand to accept the award. She will be the railroad's guest on an all-expense paid trip to Chicago the first week in December.

Notes From The Oil Field Humble Drilling I. A. Bird No. 2

Potential test is being run on Humble No. 1 McKinley, three-quarters of a mile southwest outpost in the new I A B field, 10 miles northwest of Robert Lee.

The project flowed 72 barrels of oil and water during a three hour test and was shut in while rig was moved off.

Empire rotary equipment was moved to Humble No. 2 I. A. Bird, an east offset to the discovery well. It spudded early this week.

EDITH WILDCAT

C. L. Norsworthy Jr. of Dallas will drill a 7,200-foot wildcat in Coke County, two miles north of Edith and approximately four miles southwest of the I. A. B. multipay field. It will be the No. 1-B J. J. S. Smith.

Operations are to begin immediately.

Location, on a 560-acre lease, 2,810 feet due north, thence 1,050 feet due east of the most northerly northeast corner of Winfield Scott survey No. 5 but in Winfield Scott survey No. 4.

Robert Lee Steers meet the Wink Wildcats in a bi-district playoff at Bronte Friday night. Winner of this game will then be pitted against either Baird or Rochester for the regional title. They tangle at Abilene this week.

The Steer 25-7 victory over Bronte gave Robert Lee a tie with Hermleigh in the 6-B District standing. However, Robert Lee defeated Hermleigh 18-6 Oct. 18, and thus earned the right to represent the district in the playoff. Wink won the championship of District 5-B with three conference victories and no defeats.

Arrangements for the playoff game were completed at a meeting of Robert Lee and Wink officials in Midland Saturday. Representing Robert Lee were Supt. Frank Coalson, Coach C. D. Manire and J. F. McCabe, school board president.

When neither school was willing to put up a sizeable guarantee, a toss of the coin gave the site to Robert Lee. The Bronte field was preferred since it has more seating capacity and is enclosed. Previous arrangements for use of their field had been made with Bronte school authorities in case Robert Lee won the toss.

Wink's squad of 29 players and its coaching staff will travel by bus and is due to arrive in Robert Lee by 2 p.m. Friday. The team will take a brief warm up on the Steer field. Wink's high school band is coming also and will be entertained here in the afternoon by members of the Robert Lee band. Both will take part in halftime activities at the game.

Game time will be 8 o'clock. Supt. Ira Hutchinson called Supt. Coalson the middle of the week and reported that Wink was closing up for the big game and would have a big delegation on hand to back the Wildcats. It's quite a jaunt, too—about 175 miles.

Admission will be \$1.00 for adults and 50c for students. Wink gets \$100 for expense money and after officials are paid the receipts will be divided equally between the two schools.
