Steers Had Fine Year; Squad To Lose 8 Seniors

Robert Lee high school wound up the football season Friday night as the Steers were defeated 26-0 by Wink in a bi-district playoff game on the Bronte Longhorn field.

Wink was favored to win and the Steers proved to be the best team that Robert Lee met throughout the year. They were well coached, well coached and alert. The Steers looked good during the first half, but fumbled when they were getting near pay dirt. They didn't have too many opportunities. The heart breaker occurred as the second half opened when a Wildcat broke through and ran 53 yards for a second Wink touchdown.

Tom Sawyer's punting was below par. Although behind he punted several times on third down and yardage in kicking the ball out of bounds.

Don Stewart was not allowed to play, and that hurt the Steers, too. He had a broken hand in a cast. Coach Truman Nix of Wink filed a protest on the grounds that some of his boys might get cracked with the hard cast. Don would have added much to the defensive strength of Robert Lee.

The team suffered a blow in mid-season when Troy Walls was declared ineligible. He was playing in a pickup game at end, was a good receiver and a demon on defense.

The Steers had a good year, winning 7 and losing only 3 contests during the regular season. They finished in a blaze of glory with a 25-7 victory at Bronte and previously had looked good in wins from Menard, Eldorado and Hemleigh. Robert Lee defeated Wink 13-6 early in the season, and Wink went on to take its district championship and the bi-district playoff against Rochester. Wink was favored to defeat Baird in their regional game at Big Spring this week.

The Steers will be feted at a banquet on the night of Dec. 10. Seniors on the squad are Bub Burson, Dale Dean, Tom Sawyer, Frankie Wojtek, Charles Calder, Freddy McDaniel, Tommy (Hoot) Burson and Don Stewart.

There is a lot of good material coming on and prospects are bright for another outstanding club next season.

Walden McGinley of Robert Lee suffered a broken forearm last Friday morning while working on a dual rotary rig on the I. A. Bird lease. The accident occurred when pipe tongs flew back and struck McGinley's arm. His brother-in-law, Ralph Blair, was the driver in charge.



Steers Lose 26-0 In Wink Playoff

UCRA Officials Made Report At Austin Meeting

Directors of the Upper Colorado River Authority were in Austin last Thursday when they presented a written progress report to a joint meeting of the State Board of Water Engineers and representatives of the Federal Bureau of Reclamation and Corps of Army Engineers.

Combined hearings are being held as the basis for initial work on state-wide water studies recently authorized by the Texas Legislature.

The board, headed by chairman L. T. Youngblood of Bronte, did not elaborate on future plans but stated that various surveys had been made to find a suitable site for the construction of dams on the Colorado River in Coke County. Reports of surveys are in the files of the Bureau of Reclamation and Corps of Army Engineers.

Water supply systems for Miles, Winters, Rowena and Ballinger and a supplementary supply for Abilene are also under consideration, it reported.

Engineering studies and plans of the authority in Tom Green and Coke are up to date and will fit in a statewide plan without revision except for requests that might be made from towns north of Robert Lee, it was reported.

Gerald Allen of Robert Lee, secretary to the board, recalled that the UCRA had pledged its full support at one time to Snyder and other towns north of Coke County. He said a number of these towns have since called the authority directors into conference and told them it might not be too long before their help would be sought.

Wink Wildcats defeated the Robert Lee Steers in their Class B district playoff at Bronte Friday night.

Near freezing weather held the crowd down to 450 paid admission, but the field was good after an inch of snow had melted. Snow and rain prevailed most of the afternoon.

Plainly outclassed by the Steers in the first half, Wink managed one touchdown near the end of the second period after a fumble, then scored on the first play of the third quarter, added two more quick ones and coasted into the Region 2 finals.

Wink was scheduled to meet Baird for the regional title in Big Spring Thanksgiving Day at 2:30 p. m. Baird won a decisive 26-6 victory over Rochester in their playoff tilt in Abilene Saturday afternoon.

Neither team hurt the other much in the first quarter. The hard charging Steer line checked Wink's sweep, and the Robert Lee offense failed to click.

Midway in the second quarter a Wink quick kick put the ball on the Robert Lee 19-yard line. Two plays later the Steers fumbled and Wink recovered on the Robert Lee 17-yard line.

It took the Wildcats five stabs at Robert Lee's forward wall before Negro Halfback Cleveland Robinson hit left tackle and stumbled over from the 5. Harold Russell, 205-pound Wink tackle, converted the extra point by a kick from placement. Robert Lee had possession on the Wink 44 as the half ended.

The third period opened with Wink recovering a short kickoff on their 47. On the first play from scrimmage halfback Charles Wilhelm flashed through a gaping hole in the middle and went 53 yards for the TD. The extra point try was blocked.

Wink threatened again on its next series, moving to the 20 before a trio of ill-timed passes sent the ball over on downs. After two plays, a 6-yard punt by Steer quarterback Tom Sawyer set up the next Wildcat marker.

Quarterback Jesse Marshall's jump pass to end Buddy Roark set the ball on the Robert Lee 4, and end Joe Green went around end for a touchdown. Russell's kick converted.

Playing in desperation, Sawyer let a pass get away only six plays later, and Green snared it on his own 27 and crossed the goal line untouched. Russell's kick was blocked and the final margin stood 26-0.

Deepest Robert Lee penetration came late in the first quarter. After Sawyer's 25-yard pass to end John Walker carried to the Wink 43. Bub Burson and Freddy McDonald made another first on the 31. McDonald picked up 7 yards on two plays, but a 15-yard holding penalty went against the Steers and their hopes faded.

Robert Lee made 7 first downs compared to ten for Wink. The Steers were penalized five times for a total of 55 yards. Wink's nine penalties amounted to 75 yards. Robert Lee lost the ball five times on fumbles, while Wink fumbled and lost one time.





Early Mailing Helps Speed Up Xmas Delivery

Postmaster H. S. Lewis, Jr. said this week, "Early mailing of all Christmas cards and gifts is the biggest single factor in getting all of the mail delivered before Christmas."

The Postmaster urged special care in preparing gift packages for the mails and asked that all addresses be legible and complete.

"If you have any articles of unusual size or bulk, better check with the Post Office before attempting to mail them," the Postmaster warns. The limits on size and weight of packages varies, depending on where the package is mailed.

Lewis said that when wrapping gifts for mailing, it is always better to use corrugated cartons, especially where there are a number of various sized objects in the shipment. Use plenty of wadded tissue or newspaper, he said, for extra protection against shock and securely wrap each package or carton in heavy paper, and then tie it with strong cord. Be sure to include an extra label with your return address and the recipients address inside the carton or package before it is wrapped.

Another good idea is to place a piece of transparent cellophane tape over the address portion of the label on your package to prevent defacing in transit, and always make sure to include the recipient's full name, street address, city, zone and state.
