DO NOT SHOOT MORE THAN TEN DOVES PER DAY

Austin, Aug. 25. - Don't be confused, it may cost you a fine for killing too many doves, according to the director of law enforcement of the Game & Fish Commission. The North Zone season opens Sept.

This year's hunting regulations, approved by the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, permits a possession

GOOD HUNTING IN SIGHT

Game Warden Gitnn Crooks reports an excellent crop of doves are to be found in Coke County this year. The dove hunting season opens Monday, Sept. 1, and hunting is permitted daily between 12 noon and sunset. No license is required if you hunt in your own county. Hunting Licenses costing \$3.15 are now on sale and are good for one year. Fishing lecenses are also due Sept. 1, Mr. Crook advises.

limit of 20 birds after the first day. This does not mean, the director warns, that a hunter can go out and kill 20 birds in one day and get by with it.

The daily limit is still 10 birds. However, after the first day a hunter may have two days' possession, provided he doesn't have them on his person or in a manner to indicate they were all killed on the same day.

Phone Company Will Use Co-op **Electric Poles**

General Telephone Co. has signed a contract with Concho Valley REA to string telephone lines on the electric co-op poles leading to farm and ranch families in this

The agreement was reached at a public meeting Monday night. Banker-rancher G. C. Allen presided at the gathering in the district court room at a session which had been arranged by the Robert Lee Board of Community Develop-

Present were Carrol Land. manager of the REA Co-op, and J. P. Willows acting for John Robbins as division manager of the telephone company. Other General representatives on hand were Al Holcomb, field engineer, and Carroll West of the Commercial department. About 50 farm and ranch people were on hand.

The phone company advised the group that it had appropriated funds for providing rural dial service to every subscriber who is now being served. Mr. Willows pointed out that it would be cheaper to rent pole use from the REA co-op. Proposed rates were discussed setting out a \$4.50 per month figure for persons within 5 miles of Robert Lee, and an extra 25 cents for the next five miles and \$1.00 per month ertra for those beyond ten miles from town.

The company will also build at its own expense tap lines a distance of 3,000 feet. Beyond that the subscriber will have to pay for the line. New subscribers will be served in all cases where there is Dr. and Mrs. J. D. McDaniel room on a line. A limit of eight are expected to return Friday persons on a party line has been

> Silver people will also continue to be served, and a survey is being made with hopes of running more lines in that area.

Mr. Land said directors of the REA co-op were interested in seeing that everyone get phone service, and a contract with General would be signed if the people out here favored such an arrangement. The matter was put to a vote, and the result was a unanimous "yes".

Mr. Land then advised the telephone representatives that they would receive immediate authority to proceed with the joint-construction plans.

Mr. Willows authorized The Observer to make a statement that actual work on running the new lines and installing dial service would be started within 30 days.

One rural line at a time will be completed and cut over to dial service, he said.







Infants to 40 **Should Have** Polio Vaccine

The viruses can remain in circulation in the population, and are passed from person to person by carriers.

You are not adequately protected unless you have all three shots, properly spaced. The second shot is given two to six weeks after the first; the third, seven to 12 months after the second. It is important that we have that third shot!

No vaccine ever has been 100 percent effective, however, the Salk vaccine has proven 60 to 90 per cent effective. That is reason enough to get your shots

The vaccine is in plentiful supply and inexpensive, so the decision is up to the individual. No one is safe without the protection of the Salk polio vaccine.

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

Sun Pipeline **Now Extends** Across River

Sun Pipeline has run a line a cross the Colorado River and installed a gathering system to pick up crude oil production in the southwest end of the new I. A. B. (Menielle Penn) field. Previously oil from this area was hauled in transport trucks to Sun's pump ing station at Silver.

The extension includes approximately four miles of 6 and 4-inch pipe. It crosses the river back of the A. F. McKinley ranch house where Humble has a low water crossing.

Five storage batteries are now connected with the pipeline. The oil is produced by Norsworthy on the J. J. S. Smith place, and Humble has production on the Harris Ranch. At present Norsworthy has 16 producers and Humble has 3 across the river.

80-Acre Drilling **Rules for New** Coke Oil Field

Eighty-acre spacing has been established as the drilling rules for the I. A. B. (Menielle Penn) field northwest of Robert Lee.

These rules, which are made by the oil and gas division of the Railroad Commission, were announced Aug. 20.

At the same time daily allowable production was boosted to 178 bar-

The allowable has been 82 barrels daily and the big increase will result in more production in the field than if drilling spacing had been set at 40 acres.

At a hearing in Austin last June 3 royalty owners asked for 40-acre spacing, while a request for 80 acres was made by the operators. sentatives said it would mean a saving of 3 million dollars for them to get 80-acre spacing.

They have by far the biggest acreage in the new field. Other operators affected are Sun Oil Co. and C. L. Norsworthy.

There are now more than 30 producing wells in the field which was opened less than a year ago. A few wells are dual producers. The new allowable ruling, which goes the Pennsylvanian lime pay section. Daily production from the sand section has not been announc-

When operators requested the 80acre spacing, they also told royalty owners they would seek an increase in the allowable. However, it was a general surprise that the 178 barrel figure was approved.

Under the new rules only eight wells can be drilled on a section of land, while 40-acre spacing permitted 16 wells. No proof was submitted that the field can be drained by the wide spacing, but it will be possible to change the rules and adopt 40-acre drilling at any time in the future.

West Texas wells have been permitted to produce 11 days during August, and it will be 12 days in September.
