operation of the BCD members in presenting new projects for the betterment of the community.



Production was through a quarter inch choke and perforations between 6,408-20 feet. Tubing pressure was 125 pounds, with packer on the casing. Total depth was 6,-680 feet where 51/2 inch casing was set. The pay section was treated with 6,000 gallons of acid.

Location is 660 feet from the south and east lines of 323-1A-H&TC.

Operators were making MER tests before staking another location in the area.

Wiring Short **Caused Blaze** suffering a heart attack during At Hospital



Damage was covered by insurance and repairs were immediately made to the wiring, while burned and water soaked sections of the ceiling are being replaced and will be redecorated.


The hospital was filled with patients at the time, but there was no panic and all doors were closed to keep out the smoke.
